DALTON STILL DENIES

That He Murdered Young Morrow

Swears That Wade Fired the Shot.

Arguments for a new Trial. Yesterday.

Arguments on the motion for a new trial in the Dalton murder case were heard yesterday in Portland by Judges Cleland and Sears, and a decision will soon be rendered. If the motion is denied, Dalton and Wade will be immediately sentenced to be hanged. Dalton was present in court during the argument but there were few spectators, because the fact was not publicly known that the proceeding was to occur. Clarence Vesiz, defendant's attorney, devoted considerable time in attacking the court's instructions to the jury, particularly the instruction that only one of two verdicts could be returned—murder in the first degree or acquittal. Counsel also argued that the confession of Dalton introduced in evidence was inadmissible, because it was procured by promises. It was also argued that Wade could not legally testify. The indictment was alleged to be defective. It was urged that it does not properly charge an attempt to rob, and for that reason does not charge murder in the first degree. Dalton was tried under the section of the statute which provides that if in the commission of the crime of robbery etc., a killing results, it is murder in the first degree. The indictment sets forth that Dalton and Wade did feloniously make an assault on James B. Morrow, with intent to take his personal property. Mr. Vesiz contended that this is not a statement of the facts constituting the attempt to rob, as it does not say what was done. It does not say they put their hands on him nor describe what their actions were. He said the jury should have found two counts; that the defendant was attempting to commit robbery and committed murder. The answer of District Attorney Chamberlain to the argument was short. He said the tendency of the courts is to instruct juries as in this case, and it was done to prevent juries

from letting a man escape hanging by returning a life-imprisonment verdict where a man might have been guilty of murder in the first degree. He admitted that the information might have been changed, but declared that the time to make the objection was at the opening of the trial by a demurrer. Both attorneys have filed briefs. Dalton seems to bear up well, but he fully realizes what is before him. As he was being returned to the County Jail yesterday by Deputy Sheriffs Matthews and McMillan, he raised his hand in the air and swore before God that Wade had sworn his life away by false testimony, and that Wade fired the fatal shot. Dalton also asserted in a dramatic manner that District Attorney Chamberlain and Detective Day both promised him that if he would make complete confession they would see that he was not punished according to the full extent of the law. Dalton appears to have received religious consolation, as he frequently made biblical references while talking.

NIEHART MINER KILLED

By a Peculiar Accident in Shaft.

NIEMART, MOnt., Dec. 21.—Jacob Jacobsen, a miner of this city, was instantaneously killed this evening by an explosion of giant blasting powder. He had worked all day and had put in six shots. He was being hauled up in a bucket when the rope broke, and he fell 400 feet to meet the explosion. He was blown to pieces.

BUENOS AYRES ABLAZE

With Excitement Over the War

Which is now Thought to be Near at Hand.

Practically all South America May be Involved.

BUENOS AYRES, Dec. 20, via Galveston. —In order to commemorate the formation of the League of Patriots here, tens of thousands of young men paraded the streets last evening cheering for Argentina, the Argentine army, President Roca and ex-president Mitre, now president of the committee to settle the frontier dispute with Chile. Thousands of manifestos, estimated to have numbered as many as 60,000 persons, stopped and cheered before the offices of the various newspapers, where fiery addresses were made. The crowds then marched in the direction of President Roca's residence before which the national hymn was sung. The president responded with an energetic speech, which was enthusiastically applauded. Then for about an hour the crowds engaged in the patriotic demonstration, marched past the President's residence shouting "No more diplomatic notes." There were also some cries of "Death to the Chileans." The Nation, referring to the international complications, says that the Republic of Uruguay is much concerned, in view of the possibility of a conflict between Argentina and Chile, about her neutrality. Brazil is also said to be considering the same subject. In this connection it is reported that Brazil contemplates appropriating from \$5,000,000 to \$10,000,000, for the purchase of new warships, showing, it is said, that Brazil, which up to the present has succeeded in confining herself to a state of armed peace, is finally getting mixed up in the diplomatic complications and is feeling compelled to guard herself against the threatened trouble between South American countries. Peru and Bolivia are also strengthening their armaments, and incidentally are ruining themselves by so doing. President Roca and Senor Taigoyen,

A HOT SCRAP IN COURT

California Solons Come Together.

ALTAHUS, Cal., Dec. 21.—There was a sensational scene in the Superior Court here today during the proceedings in the case of the People vs. Brown, otherwise known as the Lookout lynching case. Considerable feeling has been exhibited by both sides ever since the case came up for hearing a week ago. Today Attorney Harris, for the defense, was endeavoring to break down the testimony of Agnes Wilson, a witness for the prosecution, when the court objected to the line of questioning, saying: "There will be no such conduct in this court while I am on the bench." "Well, you won't be there long," retorted Attorney Harris. "I will be here until my term is up," replied the court, "unless some of you assassinate or shoot me from behind." At this point Attorney Baker, of counsel for the defense, remarked: "Well, that's a nice remark for a man to make on the bench. There is no man here that wants to assassinate you." "I can prove by a dozen witnesses that Courtwright (a previous witness) said that he came down from the stand to kill me, and he would have done so had the sheriff not interfered," replied the Judge. After some further heated remarks from both sides, the whole subject was dropped, without apologies from either of the contending parties.

WRECK NEAR TACOMA

One Engineer Thought to be Dead.

TACOMA, Dec. 21.—Extra 154 west collided with extra 133 east on the Northern Pacific Railroad about one mile west of Weston, about 5:30 p. m. Both engines were damaged, ten cars derailed and the track blocked for several hours. Wrecking outfits from Tacoma and Ellensburg were sent to clear the track. The cars damaged were mostly loaded with coal. Conductor C. A. Fisk, on extra east, was slightly injured. Engineer Kelly on extra west has not yet been found, and there is a possibility that he may be found under the wreck. The cause of the accident is being investigated.

STRIKE NEAR BAKER

Remarkably Rich Ore is Found.

BAKER CITY, Dec. 20.—A very rich strike has been reported at the Phoenix mine, in the Greenhorn district. The new find, it is reported, consists of a pocket of exceedingly rich ore which runs up into the six figure list. The lowest estimate placed on the assay value of this pocket is \$100,000 per ton, but there is not a large quantity of it. The owners are very reticent in regard to the strike, and so far have declined to give out any statement in regard to it. The Phoenix mine was recently purchased by Messrs. Parker and Crawford, of Chicago.

MARION CIRCUIT COURT

One Decision Reversed and One Case Appealed to Supreme Court.

Judge Boise of the equity department of the circuit court, on Friday heard the case of W. F. Dunlap, appellant vs. H. E. Bruce respondent, on writ of review. The case was appealed from a decision given by Justice of the Peace O'Donald whose decision was reversed by Judge Boise. The suit was brought to collect \$3 road poll tax, for 1901, which had formerly been paid to Street Commissioner J. F. Frizzell. As Dunlap lives in road district No. 18, Supervisor Bruce claimed that the tax should be paid to him and to no one else. C. L. McNary represented the plaintiff and H. J. Bigger the defendant. Notice of an appeal from the decision of Judge Burnett to the supreme court, has been filed in the case of the State vs. John Kelly. Kelly is now serving a sentence of one year in the penitentiary, being convicted of assault with a dangerous weapon. Two months of the term has already been served. The trouble arose last June, when John Kelly shot Frank Lambert, marshal of St. Paul. Unless the case is rapidly advanced on the dock of the supreme court, the entire term of servitude will expire before the court reaches a decision. In department one J. W. Ransom has filed a suit against Robert McFarlane and E. McGinnis. It is for the purpose of collecting money to the amount of \$165, with interest at 7 per cent. from August, 1901, due on a promissory note, and \$50 attorneys' fees. Carson & Adams represent the plaintiff. In the case of the State vs. Penney et al, for the recovery of the amount of the Davis defalcation, another action has occurred. A recent decision of Judge Boise was to the effect that the State Land Board were not responsible for the doings of its clerk, and the motion was sustained striking out the part of the complaint that related to Davis as clerk of said Board. This released the board from paying the sum demanded by the state, and yesterday a demurrer to the remainder of the complaint was filed.
