Benicia Rotary Disc Plows Scour Everywhere...

The question is still occasionally asked if these plows will scour in any kind of soil. Our best answer is to refer you to the men who are using them. Among recent purchasers are Mr. Jos. Darrar, who was a single disc in use on the Ankeny bottom. He has a considerable "white land" which makes the hardest pulling of any we have struck yet, unless it be the Mack Land. Mr. Darrar intends using three horses on the single disc and will cut 12 inches of soil, 8 inches deep—with much less effort than the same team will draw a 14-inch chisel plow, which, as we all know, turns but 12 inches. Then too, as Mr. Darrar says, the ground is turned deeper, and left in much better condition, and besides he can get onto the fields in the fall immediately after the harvest, no matter how hard the ground and do good work without waiting for the rains.

Mr. Clarence Mineral, near Madras, is using a two disc in the hills and fern roots. He is more than pleased with the work the plow is doing there. It makes a complete cut root and all, leaving no part of the ferns to "break" and by means of the specially shaped mold board turns the soil completely under. Rocks, too, Mr. Mineral says, make no difference, the plow simply pushing them aside, if small, or raising over and going on, if large. We have yet to hear of a cracked or broken disc. Mr. Mineral has had to spend a considerable portion of his "plow days" talking to his inquiring neighbors, who are all interested in seeing how the plow works in the hills. There have been a number of other plows purchased, too—out in the hills, and across in Polk county. In fact, our sales have gone much beyond our best anticipations, and farmers from far and near are becoming interested. The plow is doing. Every man who has bought one does so only after seeing the work in his own or his neighbor's field.

New York, Jan. 2.—In conducting the anniversary services in the crypt of the cathedral of St. John the Divine, on Cathedral Heights, yesterday morning, Bishop Potter of the Episcopal church said:

"I do not believe in watch night services. While people may be repentant at the time, the solemnity of the hour and the good resolutions are soon forgotten in the justification which comes with the birth of the new year. Nothing is ever gained by spasmodic emotion."

Down on His Luck.

New York, Jan. 2.—Sir Edward Watson, the young English knight, cousin of Designer Watson of the Shamrock, who attempted to end his life with acid in a Brighton Beach car late Tuesday night, will recover.

At the Seney hospital, Brooklyn, the Doctor said the man would be out in a couple of days. Watson failed to explain why he took the poison. He has been arraigned in the Butler street court on a charge of attempted suicide.

Watson is a son of an English clergyman and is himself an educated man. He is a mechanical engineer. He came to this country six months ago to make his fortune. He had the friendship of Miles Bronson, superintendent of the Harlem branch of the New York Central road. Bronson is Sir Edward's cousin.

The young knight at first refused the offer of a position with the Central. Three months ago he accepted a position with Dunn & Richards. He lost this place and has since been unable to get work.

Probate Orders:

In the matter of the estate of Emma G. Charlesworth, deceased, the first account of the administrator, Edward I. Charlesworth, has been filed. It showed the present amount of cash on hand from the estate to be \$554.84.

In the matter of the guardianship of Nellie Palmer, a minor, a petition has been filed by Henry L. Palmer. He is father of the minor and asks to be appointed her guardian. She is ten years of age and possesses an estate to the value of \$500. The petition was granted and a bond for one thousand dollars filed.

Bound Over for Assault.

W. R. Smith was tried at Silverton Tuesday afternoon, charged by the State of having committed an assault with a dangerous weapon upon the person of C. M. Hinkle.

The crime was committed on Dec. 23d. Deputy District Attorney J. H. McNary appeared for the state and W. H. Holmes for the defendant. The preliminary hearing resulted in the defendant being held at \$1000. In default of this sum, Smith has been placed in the county jail.

Hinkle is said to have but an even chance for recovery, he having been stabbed in the body three times.

Four Hundred Millions.

New York, Jan. 2.—Canada is being congratulated on the progress made last year, says the London correspondent of the Tribune. The fact that public deposits in Canadian banks amount to \$400,000,000 is considered remarkable, and the Morning Post looks to the time when the little acres of the Dominion will solve the whole question of the British food supply which is the nightmare of so many zealous politicians in England.

"Here surely," says the Post, "is room for British capital and energy to solve a problem not merely of the greatest importance to the internal development of the Dominion, but also to the welfare of the empire. As a whole, its solution would be facilitated by the conspicuous loyalty of Canada, where so many examples have recently been afforded."

HOLD-UP ON STATE STREET

Three Highwaymen Go Through a Salem Man—On His Way to His Home on New Years Night.

Because He was a Workingman They Refused to Take His Waterbury.

Robert Crum, a cook at the Eckerlin restaurant, was held up on the evening of Jan. 1, 1902, as he was going home from his work and relieved of \$4.50.

As he stepped on the crossing, corner State and 12th streets, at 6:30 p. m., he was halted by three men, who suddenly appeared out of the rain and fog.

One grasped him on either side and held him from either side and with his right arm over his head and with his left hand he held the man's pockets. Crum tried to get away to the other side of the street, where there was more light and he heard some one coming.

"No you don't," said the robbers, and they held him like a vise.

Don't squeal or you're dead in your tracks," said the one behind cooking a gun.

The main robber had a red handkerchief over his face and hesitated when he pulled out Crum's nice silver watch. He handed it back with: "You poor devil, you seem to be a working man and we don't want your Waterbury. Money is what we are after."

Two of the robbers had on overcoats and all had hats pulled over their faces and kept themselves concealed as much as possible, keeping their victim looking straight ahead and keeping their eyes peeled for any possible interruption of their game, which was a very bold one at a busy time of the evening on one of the main streets of the city and within two blocks of the state house. But there was no house or store lighted up near by and Mr. Crum could not have made himself heard.

When the robbers were through searching for Crum, Crum wanted to go towards his home at corner 24th and Waters street, but they would not let him. At the muzzle of a revolver he was ordered to go back to the S. P. Co. station, which he did and then went up Mill street, and home to his family and notified them of his experience.

The highwaymen disappeared in the other direction. Mr. Crum told a reporter he was never so glad to part company with anyone in his life. He thinks they were tramps but very desperate characters and thoroughly understood their business.

LEGAL QUESTIONS RAISED

Perfection of Descriptions of Land

For Tax Sale—Must be made to Make Tax Sales Valuable at Law.

The "Exports" Resume Their Labors in the Sheriff's Office.

The task of compiling a consolidated delinquent tax roll, representing unpaid taxes due Marion county for the past ten years, was temporarily suspended by the county court Tuesday evening.

As the work progressed, Judge Scott discovered, upon a careful investigation of the rolls, that the property descriptions of the land liable to sale for delinquent taxes, particularly for the year 1890-1-2, were, in many instances, imperfect and incomplete and would render the sale thereof of doubtful effect without a revision of such property descriptions. The correcting of the descriptions necessary to make this property saleable, raised the legal question as to the authority of the court or other county officers to perform the work.

The court now has the question under consideration and will submit it to legal authority from whom a decision will likely be received within a few days. In the meantime, Experts Clark and Buchanan have resumed the examination of Sheriff Durbin's books.

Blame for the incomplete and carelessly prepared rolls in the early nineties, as to property descriptions, can be directly traced to the assessor who completed the rolls. The blame should also be jointly shared by the members of the county court who at that time accepted the rolls in such condition.

Judge Scott says some newspapers have given out an erroneous statement in representing that he, as county judge alone, had ordered the compilation of the consolidated roll. He says the other members of the court were consulted before the work was begun and both of the commissioners endorsed the plan and authorized him to take such action in relation to the collection of such delinquent taxes as he might deem necessary and effective. When the court has made a thorough investigation and an honest endeavor to collect upon the delinquent delinquent rolls, it feels that it shall have performed its duty.

The compilation of this delinquent roll which requires the use by the experts of the tax rolls in Sheriff Durbin's office, has brought about a renewal of the recent controversy between that officer and the members of the county court. Requisition was made on Sheriff Durbin by the experts for all tax rolls for the years 1890 to 1900 inclusive but he refused to surrender all of the rolls. He delivered the rolls to and including 1894 but will not permit the 1895 and 1896 rolls to leave his department until his collections on those rolls have been duly checked. Sheriff Durbin asserts that he will not allow the rolls for 1897-8-9 and 1900 to be taken from his office until after the experts have completed the examination of his records. He feels that the work of examining the accounts of the various officers should not be interrupted and side tracked by any other proceeding and will resist the effort so far as the removal from his office of any other tax rolls is concerned.

Closed For Invoicing.

S. Friedman's Racket and auction store, opposite Ladd & Bush's bank, has been closed for a few days. During this time the goods on hand will be invoiced, and the stock assorted.
