Benicia Rotary Disc Plows Scour Every-where...

The question is still occasionally asked if these plows will scour in any kind of soil. Our best answer is to refer you to the men who are getting out of them. Among recent purchasers are Mr. Joe. Darrar, who was a single disc in use out south on the Anheuser bottom. He has a considerable "white land" which makes the hardest pulling of any we have struck yet, unless it be the Muck Land. Mr. Darrar intends using three horses on the single disc and will cut 12 inches of soil, 8 inches deep—with much less effort than the same team will draw a 14-inch chilled plow, which, as we all know, turns but 12 inches. Then too, as Mr. Darrar says, the ground is turned deeper, and left in much better condition, and besides he can get onto the fields in the fall immediately after the harvest, no matter how hard the ground and do good work, without waiting for the rains.

Mr. Clarence Simmer, near Mayfield, is using a two disc in the hills and fern roots. He is more than pleased with the work the plow is doing there. It makes a complete cut roots and all, leaving no part of the furrow to "break"—and by means of the specially shaped mold-board turns the soil completely under. Rocks, too, Mr. Simmer says, make no difference, the plow simply pushes them aside, if small, or raising over and going on, if large. We have yet to hear of a cracked or broken disc. Mr. Simmer has had to spend a considerable portion of his "plow days" talking to his neighboring neighbors, who are all interested in seeing how the plow works in the hills. There have been a number of other plows purchased, too—out in the hills, and across in Placounty. In fact, our sales have gone much beyond our best anticipations, and farmers from far and near are becoming interested. The plow sells itself. TOOK TOO MUCH OIL OF JOY

Albany Red Men Became Hilarious.

And Now There is Trouble all Round.

ALBANY, Jan. 3.—Wednesday night several Sisseton Indians who came over from Lincoln county to spend some of the money recently paid them by the government, secured a supply of liquor and proceeded to pour it down. They formed the acquaintance of several boys and treated them. The result of their night's hilarity, as taken from Recorder Van Winkle's docket, is about as follows: H. C. Callahan, an Indian, swore out a warrant yesterday morning for the arrest of Carl Zimmerman and Stanley Neelands. He claimed that they had carried his pocketbook containing over \$20 and had failed to return it to him. They were arrested but the evidence was so weak that they were discharged. Then Zimmerman, who is about 18 years old was arrested on a charge of obtaining liquor under pretense of being 21 years of age. He was bound over in \$200 bail to await the action of the circuit court. Callahan was arrested then on a charge of giving liquor to minors and put up a cash bail of \$100. James Guiley, the last Chance saloon keeper, was arrested for selling liquor to minors, and his hearing will come up at 10 o'clock this morning. It is said that the Indians gave the boys money to buy the liquor and they procured it at the last Chance. The Indians, who are citizens and voters, would probably have the right to buy the liquor themselves, but in this case they claim that they had the boys as purchasing agents. The arrests were made by Policeman McClain. It is a good sized mixup and all sorts of stories are afloat. The Indians and the boys were drunk and it is difficult to learn just what did happen.

TOUCHED UP THE MARSHAL

Cottage Grove Thief-Catcher is Robbed.

The Thugs Got More Than \$31.00.

COTTAGE GROVE, Jan. 3.—Bert Nunn, city marshal, says he was held up by two men last night near the old livery stable on the West Side, and robbed of \$31. The money was water rents the marshal had collected and had not yet turned over to the town.

An old man named Rudolph was held up near the Adams place on New Years eve by two men who found 90 cents in his pants which they appropriated and let him go on home with \$19 tied up in a handkerchief in an inside coat pocket.

There are no clues to the thugs. But some people are having fun at the marshal's expense saying that so brave a man, and one who handles shooting irons so deftly, should have dog up the money and never let anybody know he had been held up.

WANTS LIGHTHOUSES SUPPLIED

With Wireless Telegraphic Instruments.

NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—During a discussion before the American Institute, Prof. Small of Columbia University, said that it was not necessary to wait for more development before equipping every lighthouse with apparatus for sending wireless messages to sea, for notifying ships of their proximity to rocks and breakers. Fog, according to Prof. Small, being a better transmitter of the waves than pure air, the lighthouse could still save the lives of those headed for the rocks no matter how dense the day. Another interesting question during the discussion was that in all probability the method of sending and receiving wireless messages from poles or towers would be done away with as the curvature of the earth makes no difference in the waves.

FRISCO MANILA LINE

To be Established in the Near Future.

Three Vessels on the Trans Oceanic Run.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 3.—The California line of merchant steamers between this port and Manila will soon be established by the Empire Steamship Company, acting in conjunction with the owners of the steamer Albion. The Company will put on the trans-Pacific route the steamships Ohio, Indiana and Pennsylvania, while the Albion will run in the inter-island trade.

The three steamers first named have been engaged in the transport service until recently. They are of the same dimensions, but vary somewhat in tonnage, owing to the difference in their fittings. They are 343 feet long, 43 feet beam and 24 feet nine inches deep.

PLAN TO STOP BOER WAR

Noted French Diplomat Fathers the Scheme.

BRUSSELS, Jan. 3.—The Count de Turenne, who holds the grade of minister plenipotentiary in the French diplomatic service, but has no post at present, has sent a remarkable letter to the independence of Belgium, suggesting a basis for the settlement of the South African war. The count asserts that in view of the present situation he is confident that Kruger will accept autonomy for the countries south of Beuchanaland without any restrictions except the sovereignty of Great Britain over their relations with foreign governments.

MAUSERS FOR THE REBELS

Venezuela Torn by Revolutionary Forces.

NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—Venezuelan revolutionists have landed 15,000 Mausers and 180,000 rounds of ammunition at Coro, in Guayana, where the Commandant of the government force has revolted with 500 men and has joined General Urbina, Fernandez and Garcia, whose troops are in the state of Barcelona, says the Port of Spain correspondent of the Herald.

The revolutionary Generals, Guzman, Monroes and Platero are operating in the districts of Carabobo and Guairico. General Botella and Fernandez Cadenas have taken the field against Castro.

FOUGHT PITCHED BATTLE

But Safe Blowers Got Away. One Wounded.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., Jan. 3.—A telephone message to the Daily News from Camden Point, Mo., forty miles from St. Joseph, says at seven o'clock this forenoon four robbers dynamited the vault of the bank, at that place. The explosion aroused the citizens, and a pitched battle ensued. The robbers escaped on a handcar. One is known to have been injured.

Beat Ancient Egyptians.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Jan. 3.—The Memphis Medical College has for several weeks been experimenting with an embalming fluid for which great possibilities are predicted. It is asserted that this discovery is superior to the embalming preparations used by the Egyptians, for while the infusion will preserve the subject for all time, humanly speaking, as did that of the ancients, it prevents the shriveling up that was inseparable from Egyptian embalming and does not call for the swaths and bandages in which all Egyptian mummies were encased.

Redmond Scores Unionists.

NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—Nothing could be more interesting or instructive as an indication of the attitude of the Nationalist party at the next session of Parliament than John Redmond's speech at Sligo, as the Tribune's London representative. The Irish leader devoted some of the choicest flowers of his rhetoric to describe those Liberals, who like Lord Rosebery, are a little tired of the Irish Alliance. The Nationalists have received an intimation that the alliance is to be thrown over with scarcely veiled contempt, and Redmond advises Lord Rosebery to rally round him "all those rotten members of the Liberal party who call themselves Liberal Imperialists." Apparently the meaning of all this is that the Irish party will again carry out the policy adopted by Parrell in the days when Gladstone was warring Ireland, and will fight for home rule without the slightest regard for the feelings of their former English allies.
