There will be programs Tuesday morning at 10 a. m., afternoon and evening, and three programs daily each day until Friday.

GREATER COMMERCIAL CLUB

Has a Sawmill Proposition Before it.

Some Reasons for Supporting Such an Organization.

The Greater Salem Commercial Club has received a proposition to locate a sawmill plant either above or below the city. Details of the matter will be laid before the club at the City Police court Wednesday at four p. m., when a large attendance is desired.

A Live Club Needed

A live, hard-working Commercial Club is a blessing to a community. A dormant or dead organization is a curse. A town afflicted with an organization which has ceased to produce results is helpless until freed from the incubus.

There are lots of communities even in the stirring, bustling West which are afflicted with a sort of dry rot; and half a dozen Commercial clubs will not help such a town. In other words, a club will be effective in its work for a town in exact proportion to the capacity and the interest of the men who direct it.

More than two hundred cities in the Pacific Coast States have a regularly organized public body of some sort. They are variously called Chamber of Commerce, Board of Trade, Commercial Club, Improvement Club, or some other less common but similar name.

We will venture the assertion that no other group of States has a proportionate number of such organizations. But such an organization is the community expression of the publicity idea, and it is to be expected that the far Western country would lead the older and more conservative sections.

Now a Chamber of Commerce or Board of Trade stands as the concrete representative of a community which desires to do something for itself. Therefore the natural inference is that any community which has not organized in some form to further its interests is not determined to push itself forward.

So far as mere figures go the Pacific Coast therefore is strong in the idea of community promotion, but when we examine the work actually accomplished there is a keen feeling of disappointment. Too many of these organizations were effected upon the impulse of some passing fancy. Quite likely some of them were organized by men who had no right conception of the work they should take up. The Salem Club is well on its feet and desires the best thought and energetic support of our men of life and brains.

State Board of Education

The quarterly reports from the Reform, Binal and Deaf-Mute schools were made to the State Board of Education today. In all of these institutions the Board is instructed to inaugurate a sufficient system of fire drills.

Supt. Jones of the Blind School and Supt. Wentz of the Deaf-Mute School presented reports, which were filed.

The report of Supt. Bickers of the Reform School, gave a list of boys who had been paroled, as follows: Bennie Claggett, George Stavin, Fred Taylor and Archie Singer.

Regarding the destruction of the Industrial Building by fire, the report states that it was a total loss, except as to engine and boiler building, which was damaged to the extent of \$125. The loss, net including the building, was \$7,500. New tools for the tailor and mending room have been purchased, and these now occupy the large library room in the main building. Contracts have been let for the rebuilding of the engine and boiler building and a dynamo with fixtures has been purchased and they expect to have electric lights by Jan. 15.

ANOTHER TRAIN WRECK

Overland Saved by Brake-beam Heroes.

Who Earned a Free Ride to Their Destination.

Roseburg, Jan. 6, Special. Just before daylight Sunday morning our South-bound overland train was brought to a sudden halt by meeting a wrecked freight train at Round Prairie, just beyond Dillard, or about 15 miles south of Roseburg.

The freight train was going south when at a good speed the first car back of the engine jumped the track, the result of spreading rails, it is claimed, and fourteen other cars followed suit. Strange to relate the engine and the caboose remained on the track, while all the intervenin' cars went off end and virtually plowed up the track for a dozen rail lengths. Two tramps who occupied observation seats under the caboose enjoyed the shake-up and got off with their lives. They went back and notified on train of the wreck, and this earned a ride to Roseburg in a Pullman besides incidentally saving our train. "God bless the brake beam tourists!" was the sentiment inwardly if not audibly expressed by the 250 passengers on our train. Nobody was hurt in the wreck but all travel south was delayed about twelve hours. A substitute train was made up at Roseburg for the north bound overland which was held at Dillard for the wreck to be cleared up.

Linn County Tax Levy

ALBANY, Or., Jan. 6.—The Linn County Court made the annual tax levy for Linn County, as follows:

For the state..... Mills.

For schools..... 7.4

For indigent soldiers..... 1

For general county expenses..... 3.0

For roads and bridges..... 2.0

Total..... 17.5

This is 1.5 mills lower than the levy of last year, which was 19 mills, including the scalp bounty tax, and it is thought will be the lowest levy in the state. The levy for the state tax is 1.7 mills more than last year.
