Death of an Oregon Pioneer.

Mrs. Theresa Anna, wife of John A. Shafer, died Dec. 29, 1901, at her home near Turner, Or.

Besides her husband, she leaves seven children to mourn her sad demise. They are: Francis E., of this city; Dayton, of Sisters, Or.; Mary McKinney, of Turner; Nellie I. Loftis, of Wasco; Verner C., of Nome, Alaska; John H. and Joseph W., who reside at home. She also leaves one brother and a sister, Mrs. A. H. Cornelius, of Marion. She was 54 years, 10 months and 15 days old, and was born Feb. 14, 1847, in Manar, Co., Ill. In 1851 she crossed the plains with her parents, Noah and Mary Powell, and settled in Linn Co., Or. She was married to John A. Shafer Feb. 15, 1863, and then moved to Marion Co., where she spent the remainder of her life. Her desire and wish was to see her family together once more.

When 14 years of age she became a member of the Christian Church. She was a faithful wife, a loving mother, a devoted Christian to the last. Her supreme thought was ever upward, believing that good was ever present, enabling those around her to lead a better life, and always having a kind word for every one.

The remains were laid at rest in Twin Oaks cemetery, near Turner, Dec. 31. The funeral services were conducted from the late home of the deceased by Rev. Gardner, of the Christian church.
