FIREMAN'S PECULIAR DEATH

Leaned too far out of an Engine Cab.

And Smashed His Head on a Bridge Timber.

BAKER CITY, Jan. 5.—Nearly the whole top of the head of E. P. Corrian was knocked off by striking a bridge timber on bridge No. 8 near Baker City. The body was found in a sitting position on the floor timbers 40 feet below the track.

The dead man was a locomotive fireman by trade. His headquarters were at La Grande. He had been passing the holidays with his folks at Glenn's Ferry. Yesterday he started to return and as his pass was only good to Huntington he asked the engineer and fireman of engine No. 5 if he could ride to La Grande. They consented. He was wearing his Sunday clothes, but he put aside his overcoat and put on the jacket of the regular fireman so that he could help fire the engine.

After the bridge was passed the regular fireman who was at the lookout glancing ahead, noticed the smoke from the smokestack that the fire was getting low. He glanced around to see the cause. No sign of the extra-man was to be seen. The fireman then got down on the deck of the engine and told the engineer that his fireman was missing. The engineer who was keeping a lookout from the cab on his side told the fireman to look on the tender. But the extra-man was nowhere in sight. The engineer then stopped the train and notified the conductor. They backed up a ways but could find no trace of the missing man.

Word was left with the section boss at the rock switch and also with the section force at Durkee. The latter found the body under the bridge and notified the officials and the father. The engineer and fireman of No. 5 were stopped at La Grande and sent back to Durkee to attend the inquest. Dr. Snow was notified and proceeded to Durkee where he held the inquest.

From the testimony and verdict it was generally believed that the extra-man while crossing the bridge had leaned out too far and been struck by a projecting timber. In fact, some brain matter was splattered on one of the timbers. The bridge makes a sharp curve at that point and anyone not familiar with the road would be liable to such an accident.

Poetry By a Hoodlum.

Everybody should read Wallace Irwin's "Love Sonnets of a Hoodlum." The sonnets are in perfect form. The language is slang of the most pronounced sort. The effect of the form and the substance in conjunctive contrast is simply exasperatingly funny. The book has a mock-historic and philologic introduction by Gelett Burgess, himself neither a mean humorist, indifferent poet or inefficient patterer of the flash. The book, really, for all its absurdity, does reveal the truth of Mr. Burgess' dictum that slang is "the illegitimate sister of poetry." No one who reads these "Love Sonnets of a Hoodlum" will fail to pass them along. They are the high-water mark of patter literature, the evolution of "Chimmie Fadden," "Billy Baxter," "Checkers" and Geo. Ade's "Fables in Slang." They are issued attractively by Elder and Shepherd, San Francisco.

Caspar Whitney's Magazine.

Diversity is the key-note of the Gating policy. January is a special Army and Navy Number, containing some of Frederic Remington's most effective work, and several articles dealing with athletics in the Army and Navy. But the regular interests are not forgotten. There is plenty of stirring adventure: "On the Frontier with the Indians," illustrated by Frederic Remington; "After Kangaroos in Queensland"; "A Wild Horse Drive in the Australian Bush," and so on.

Of animal stories, "The Taking of the Beaver" is the first of a series of "The Story of the Trapper," by A. T. Lant, which begins with this number. "Do Animals Think" and "Collectors and Collections of Pistols" are both absorbingly interesting, and the latter is illustrated with six full pages of striking plates.

THOUGHT HE WAS INSANE

Astoria didn't "Savvy" Niemeyer's Methods.

The Astoria News in a recent issue says: "Harry Hunter Niemeyer, the New York author, artist and advertising writer, who has been in Astoria for the past week, will be surprised to learn just how close he came while here to being called up before a board of inquiry called to look into the question of his sanity. Mr. Niemeyer, for the past four months, has been very busy on his new play, which is to be produced in New York next season. This week he has been putting on the finishing touches and has at last completed it. The writer works in a very peculiar way. He has a small paper doll to represent each character in the play and a set of miniature scenery, furniture, and other 'props' that he spreads out on a table just as the stage is to be set. The paper dolls he brings in and cut and in that way keeps track of just where they are and when they should make their entrances and exits.

For the past two nights Mr. Niemeyer has been reading his play aloud and moving the puppet figures on the table-top stage. He boarded at a certain commercial street house not a thousand miles from the Western Union Telegraph building and the other boarders and the landlady have been growing more and more suspicious at the strange talk coming from his room. Their suspicions that there was a crazy man in the house were further confirmed when the chambermaid reported that she had 'seen the gentleman playing with paper dolls.'

Explanations were asked for and given and Mr. Niemeyer, when he leaves town tonight, will carry his paper dolls and toy furniture with him.

The play is called "The Other Side of the Hedge" and deals with a story of the American Colony in Monte Carlo, Nice and Paris.

Mr. Niemeyer is known as the author of "Yarns of Battery A," "In Bohemia," "Two Summers," "Bess," and other books and poems.

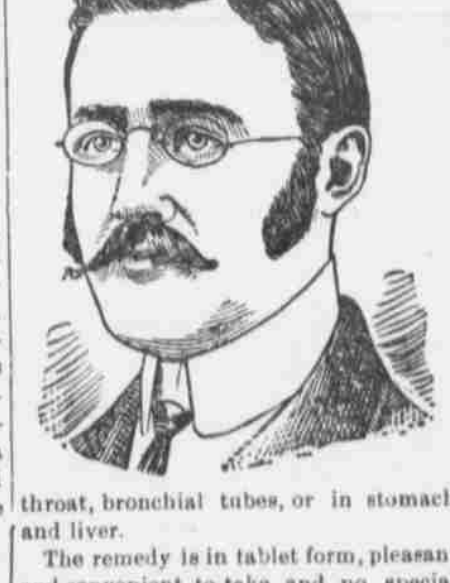

STATE TAXES HIGHER

Portland Squeals at the Raise

Citizen's Delegation Was a Fraud on That Name.

Multnomah County Has to Pay \$101,256 More than in 1900.

Portland Oregonian:—Indications are that taxes to be collected this year on the 1901 roll on City of Portland property will be one-third higher than last year.

The state authorities have announced that Multnomah County will be required to pay \$287,316 state taxes, as against \$186,059 for 1900, or an increase of \$101,256. The state tax levy last year for this county was 5.7 mills, on a valuation of \$32,000,000, and this year it is 5.96 mills on a valuation \$48,000,000. To raise \$287,316 on a \$48,000,000 valuation would have necessitated a levy of 8.81 mills.

According to an act passed by the legislature in 1901, each county pays its proportion of the entire state tax, calculated on the percentage of the whole taxable property of the state which is located in each county. The law provides that this result shall be obtained by taking the assessments for the past five years of each county and then striking an average. This is accomplished by dividing the total amount in each case by five. The average assessment in Multnomah county by this method was found to be \$38,400,000, and, estimating the percentage on the basis of these figures, Multnomah county was ascertained to contain 31.23 per cent of all the taxable property in the state, and therefore entitled to pay 31.23 per cent of the entire state tax. This assessment just completed in Multnomah county has nothing whatever to do with the state tax levy under the new law, and it makes no difference, so far as state taxes are concerned, if the present assessed value of the property in Multnomah county was \$10,000,000 or \$100,000,000.

The figures prepared at Salem disclose the fact that the state government needs \$250,000 more money this year than last, and the way it is figured out Multnomah county taxpayers have to contribute \$101,256 of the money. If Portland people think the last legislature made a bull, and that they are getting the worst of it, they can call for a change in the law next session.

There is considerable conjecture among posted ones regarding what the total tax levy will be on City of Portland property on the 1901 roll. One official thinks the levy will be as follows: State tax, 6 mills; state school tax, 5 mills; county and road tax, 5 mills; scalp tax, 1 mill; Port of Portland, 1.5 mills; city, 7 mills; park, .4 of a mill; school district No. 1, 3 mills; total, 28.9 mills. The total levy for 1900 was 33.7 mill s, on a \$32,000,000 valuation.

NOYES GANG CINCHED

Nome Crooks Get Their Just Dues.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 6.—In the United States Circuit Court of Appeals today Judge Morrow sentenced Judge Noyes to pay a fine of \$1,000 in the Cape Nome conspiracy case. United States District Attorney Woods was sentenced to four months imprisonment, and Assistant United States District Attorney Frost to twelve months imprisonment.
