SALEM FARMER'S CONGRESS

Practical Questions Only are Discussed.

Three Days Devoted to the Dairy Interests.

At the Tuesday afternoon session Dr. Wm. McLean, the State veterinarian, addressed the assembly on the subject of Veterinary Obstetrics.

Wm. Schulerich of Farmington took up the subject of what is the proper animal to keep for dairy purposes. He spoke of the various types of cattle, the best types and dairy type. Other items treated were as to the raising of calves, how they shall be fed, and how cattle should be stalled. He pictured a modern barn and the results to be obtained from the proper methods keeping cows clean and dry. He does not recommend the idea of cattle feeding together, better results being obtained from their eating one at a time.

"Profit from a Dairy Herd" was the subject treated by L. Douglas of Eugene. He referred to his own experience in cattle raising. Ten years ago he selected the best cows of an ordinary kind, but did not obtain satisfactory results from them. He said that by selecting full blood animals one would realize a better financial profit and have a larger herd.

Mr. Rice of Albany spoke on "Prize Butter from a Hand Separator."

In the evening Prof. E. L. Keut of Corvallis treated the subject of the variation in milk tests and cited facts to account for this. The reasons he gave were the changes in the weather and in the feed at different seasons of the year. These effect the nervous system, thus varying the secretion of milk.

Thomas Withycombe of Scholls read a paper on the Channel Island cattle, relating their history and advent into the country.

A paper on opportunities in dairying prepared by F. S. Towneend was read by Scott Bonorth of Salem.

Wednesday has been given up to getting the farm products to market, and prominent railroad men have had the floor.

MARION COUNTY COM'RS

Select Clerks and Judges of Election.

The Marion county commissioners court continued in session on the fifth judicial day of the January term of court yesterday and the following business was transacted and orders made:

The annual report of W. J. Culver, county roadmaster, for the year 1931, showing the total expense on roads and bridges to have been \$18,024.44, and showing the total number of days work done by the supervisors and under their direction to be 13,136 days and recommending the purchase of a rock crusher, three rock graders and three wheel scrapers, was accepted and placed on file.

Mr. Culver was re-elected county roadmaster for the year 1932, to succeed himself.

Judges and Clerks.

The court also selected the judges and clerks for the state election to be held next June. Under the new law, large precincts have two sets of judges and clerks, the court finding three of these in Marion county—Salem No. 2, Salem No. 4, and Woodburn. Another change in the law is that providing three clerks for every precinct election, instead of two as in the past, and three judges and three clerks are, therefore, chosen for every precinct.

FATHER ADAM GOODE

Career of a Gray Beard Veteran.

Who Served His Country in the War of the Rebellion.

Father Adam Goode, the subject of this sketch, was born to Jacob and Sarah Goode Dec. 27 A. D. 1818, and departed this life Jan. 2nd, 1902, aged 83 years and 6 days. His birth place was in Cumberland County Tenn. During his 16th year his parents removed to Richland County, Ohio, while that county was yet a wilderness. While living there, and in his 20th year his father died. He then removed to Coheon county where he was married to Miss Della A. Wycoff Oct. 3rd 1839.

Their union was blessed with the following named offspring: Eliza J. James F., David J. Adam P., Henry J. Mary A. Malinda A., Ida A., and Wilmer E., all of whom are living except Mary A. who died in infancy, and Malinda A., who died in womanhood. From Ohio he, with his little family, emigrated to Lawrenceburg, Lawrence Co., Ill., thence to Evansville, Vanderburg Co., Ind., where they remained about 7 years, at the expiration of which time they moved to Jefferson Co., Iowa, at that time a new country. He and his sons built a good home, remaining there until the year 1874, then following the rush of emigration westward to Phillips county, Kansas, at that time the border of civilization of the state. There again making a good home. In the year 1890 he brought his family to Salem, Oregon, where he has made his home until his decease. Father Goode was raised by Quaker parents, and under their teaching a solid foundation for a moral character was laid. About the year 1850 he united with the M. E. Church, and in the year 1869, he was wonderfully converted to God and united with the Free Methodist Church at Cross Lane church, Jefferson county, Iowa, under the labors of Rev. W. F. Manley. Feeling the call of God upon him to labor for souls he began preaching the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, was ordained an elder by the Rev. B. T. Roberts at Almena, Kansas, in the year 1889. Many there are who will rise up and call him blessed who were saved under his labors. Of his family living, his wife, the bride of his youth, Della A. still survives him and only awaits the summons to again meet her departed husband. Their eldest daughter, Mrs. W. B. Gould of Lacombe, Oregon, Mrs. J. F. Goode a merchant of Salem, Oregon, Rev. D. J. Goode of Stayton, Oregon, Rev. A. P. Goode of Eureka Junction, Wash., Rev. H. J. Goode of Fruitland, Oregon, Mrs. Ida Orey of Fruitland, Oregon, and Rev. W. E. Goode of Roseburg, Oregon. During the civil war Father Goode enlisted in the 6th company 37th Regiment Infantry Iowa volunteers, gray regiment troops, and while engaged in active service became disabled and was discharged.

Just 20 years previous to his decease he was stricken with paralysis and since that time has been helpless but has proven by practical experience, that the same grace he so often preached to others was able to keep and satisfy even to the shadows of death, as verified by his triumphant shouts and spirit baptized words of consolation, admonition, and comfort. His numerous friends and progeny found it to be a heavenly benediction while gathered around his couch where his soul was taking on its plumage for the skies, and when the hour came, the messenger found him really, yea anxious, to be translated. "Halleluiahs" was among his last exclamations to his sorrowing friends around. Speaking of the Power of the grace of God to keep, he said: "Let your faces show it, let your faces tell it." With a blessing for all his children, grand children, great grand children, a smile upon his face he sleeps in Jesus. He leaves behind a wife, five sons, two daughters, 50 grand children, and 30 great grand children, one an Christian merchant, four sons are ministers of the gospel of Christ, the aged companion and both daughters are living for heaven, both sons-in-law are enjoying salvation.

The funeral services were held in the Free Methodist church of Salem, Ore. The writer spoke to a large and attentive congregation from Psalm 37:37.

Rest, Father Goode, thy warfare's o'er. Thy bark now rests on the evergreen shore. Thy battles are fought, thy victory won; Thou shalt hear the Lord say "child, well done."
