REPLY OF LADD & BUSH In the Matter of the Williams & England Bank.

Ladd & Bush have replied to the answer of W. H. Odell, ex-clerk of the school land board in the case of J. A. Baker vs. the Williams & England Banking Company. The reply admits that Mr. Odell, in his capacity as clerk of said board, received many drafts and checks on account of the school fund and that all were drawn to himself personally or as clerk of the board. They deny however, that the checks or drafts were endorsed or deposited with the bank for collection. At the time the bank closed the deposits of Odell amounted to \$5047.27 which the bank was unable to pay. To reimburse the land board, Odell borrowed money on his own credit and paid the sum into the state treasury. He then presented his claim for the amount to the receiver of the bank, W. T. Slater. They deny the allegation that the claim was allowed by the receiver, or that the court adjudged that the claim should be paid.

CONGRESS ACTS ON NICARAGUA CANAL BILL

The total distance from ocean to ocean of the Nicaragua route is 180.9 miles, including 110 miles of Lake Nicaragua which reduces length of cutting to 70.9 miles.

The length of the Panama Canal is estimated at 46.14 miles, the canal being practically finished from Colon to Bufo, a distance of 14 miles. It is estimated that the cost of completing the Panama Canal would be \$100,000,000, a sum of \$275,000,000 having already been expended on preliminary operations. While it is estimated that the Panama Canal would take ten years to complete owing to the great engineering difficulties to be overcome, the Nicaragua Canal can be finished in about seven years, at a cost of \$125,000,000, according to the report of the Committee.

Railroad experts who have examined the ground differ considerably from this point of view and instead of \$125,000,000 place the estimate of cost for the Nicaragua route at \$250,000,000.

It seems to be a plain, indisputable fact that as a business proposition the Nicaragua Canal will for a long time be a dead loss and that the proposition is defensible only on the ground that it is necessary as a strategic step on the part of the United States government and for the development of our own coastwise commerce between the Atlantic and Pacific coasts and in other directions.

Comparisons in regard to the possible tonnage which would pass through the Isthmian Canal are sometimes made, but in these there is one important fact generally lost sight of. While the Suez Canal has no railway competition to consider, the Nicaragua route would be a competitor of a line of trans-continental railway.

Grave engineering difficulties are suggested by the fact that there is a total difference to be overcome in canal and sea-level of 220 vertical feet.

Unfortunately another drawback of a much more serious nature confronts the project of this undertaking.

The most difficult engineering work in connection with constructing the canal will be the building of a dam across the San Juan River, a feature which is specified in the new Hepburn bill as an integral part of the plan. There are engineers who say that such a dam cannot be constructed with any certainty of its permanency or safety. Nicaragua has always been the seat of seismic convulsions. There is scarcely a month during which some kind of disturbance is not noticed. These disturbances always center near the line of the Nicaraguan volcanoes. Should such a cataclysm occur as that which inundated Nicaragua with lava and ashes in 1835 what would be the effect upon the dam, and consequently upon the canal? The explosion lasted two days and the mass ejected into the air was sufficient to have covered a surface equal to about half the continent of Europe, ashes being carried fifteen hundred miles out to sea. As late as 1883 there was an eruption of a volcano located in the very center of Lake Nicaragua.

The engineers who raised these points asked how, if it were ever completed, a dam 1-1/2 feet high could be maintained in the face of the fact that these seismic convulsions are a regular feature of Isthmian conditions and that a cataclysm may at any time be expected.
