Pelota for New York

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JIM HILL TELLS THE REASON

The Merger was Made. For the People's Good.

FARGO N. D., Jan. 10.—Prest J. J. Hill, President Great Northern Ry. this p. m. addressed the Tri State Association of grain and cattle growers, explaining the reasons for the Northwestern Ry. consolidation. The crowd was very large, including farmers and business men from all parts of Minnesota and both Dakotas. In the course of his speech he said:

"Our object in acquiring Burlington jointly with the Northern Pacific Railway was to insure an outlet to the best markets for grain, livestock and lumber for the northern states and to increase the volume of our traffic and that we might at all times be able to establish the lowest rates and most favorable conditions under which traffic must be carried."

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FARMER'S CONGRESS CLOSED

Most Successful Session Held for Many Years.

The Oregon Farmer's Congress closed a four days' session at the Capitol Thursday night. Throughout the meetings great interest has been shown, and the attendance is much greater than last year's. The assistance of the various agricultural associations of the state, aided greatly in attracting a wider interest than previously. These associations were the Dairyman's, Live Stock, Hop Growers, Board of Agriculture, Board of Horticulture, Grange, Agricultural College and the Poultry association. Two of those on the program last night did not respond, B. C. Leedy and Mrs. Judge Waldo. J. B. Early was present and was asked to speak on the subject of Angora goats. He said that the farmer could make more money by raising but a few goats. They are a profitable animal to raise on account of their good fleeces and the large fleeces produced. The only natural way to raise them is to allow them free range. There is a wonderful demand in the East for Oregon bred goats, and every farmer should keep a few.

A number of vocal selections were rendered by Mrs. Anna B. Scovell. She sang "Mid the Green Fields of Virginia," "On the Road to Mandalay" by Kipling, and a sweet lullaby song. She possesses a voice of rare sweetness and the music was thoroughly enjoyable.

Judge R. P. Boise read a paper on "What the Grange has done in legislation." He spoke of the Grange advocating the interests of agriculture, that in fact being its first object, to raise agriculture to its original position, that of the noblest vocation on earth. The Grange deserves credit for the action taken in congress in relation to the pure butter laws, and it was also the first to advocate the free rural mail deliveries. An important action taken by the Grange is that for over fifteen years it has passed resolutions urging the election of State senators by a direct vote of the people, in order to do away with the corrupt practices, that now demoralize public service. No laws should be created to construct monopolies, and it is an object of the Grange to elevate the social position of the people so that better legislation can be enacted. The entire address was full of interest and the same ideas were presented by W. M. Hillary, past master of the State Grange, in his paper on Education. He spoke especially of the advantages the Grange has given the farmers' wives and families, by its attention to the educational features.

The meeting closed by the audience singing "America."

INSANE MAN'S SUICIDE

He Leaps from a Third Story Window

Thomas A. Wilson of Alaska, admitted the Asylum August 18 1901, committed suicide at 5:30 p. m. by jumping from the third story window in the passage way in the gallery to the chapel. He was assisting at the time by carrying chairs in the gallery for an entertainment to take place in the evening.

He had recently greatly improved and was distressed at finding himself in the insane asylum. He had not exhibited any suicidal intent before. He lived until 12 p. m. He has a brother in Australia and relatives in England who will be notified.

Coroner Lane has been notified.

Poor Farm Expenses

The Marion county poor farm is conducted along economical lines, and at the same time kept in good order. It is estimated from bills ordered paid by the county commissioners court that the total expense for the period from July 1 to Dec. 31, 1901 was \$1051.81. The total number of weeks that inmates have been cared for in that time is 262, thus making an average expense of \$4.02 per week. This is principally due to the efficient management of the superintendent of the farm, Mr. M. M. High.

Morgan Bank for Canada

New York, Jan. 10.—Chicago and Boston interests have purchased a controlling interest in the Sovereign Bank of Canada, now being organized with a capital stock of \$2,000,000. New Yorkers having stock in the new bank are: J. P. Morgan, the Standard Trust Company and Wilson & Stephen. J. P. Morgan & Company will represent the bank in London and Paris. The head office of the new bank will be in Toronto and the executive office will be Montreal, while a chain of branches will be established throughout America.

Fired on by Spanish

New York, Jan. 10.—Captain James A. Crossman, who was in command of the steamship Altamira, when on March 9, 1895, she was fired on by a Spanish cruiser off Cape May is dead at his home in Jersey City. Three shots were fired at the ship by the cruiser, but Captain Crossman kept on and brought his ship to New York. The incident caused considerable excitement and diplomatic adjustment was required. During the Civil War served as an Ensign in the navy. He was born at Hudson, N. Y., 28 years ago.

Train Wreck Near Roseburg

ROSEBURG, Jan. 10.—The Southern Pacific Southbound passenger train was wrecked near Myrtle Point near Roseburg last evening. The engineer and fireman were slightly injured, but as the train simply piled up on a ditch no passengers were hurt. An open switch was the cause of the accident.
