BUSINESS OR RECKLESSNESS, WHICH?

With the economical management of the state institutions the past three years there was no excuse for the legislature appropriating nearly a half million dollars more than its predecessors for seven years.

But the last legislature was lost in the rack of a bitter senatorial fight and the many well-meaning men who went there to do what was right were unable to accomplish anything. The next assembly may be worse.

The majority in the last one were after boodle.

They wanted more offices and more plunder, and got it.

There was not a redeeming feature about that body.

They increased taxes, appropriations, offices, grafts, robberies and corruption.

They heaped up new permanent burdens and in their haste and greed did not even take the trouble to repeal old laws in cases where they passed new ones making heavier cuts on the people.

So it happens that there are two taxes standing in favor of the state university amounting to \$97,000 per annum. There are two appropriations for the soldiers' home.

All the bad work of the legislature has not been unraveled. A great deal of litigation and extravagance has not yet been unraveled.

What use is a business administration of state affairs when a reckless legislature scatter half a million that the state departments must levy and collect and send out to the agencies of the legislature to disburse?

These people must decide whether to sustain business principles in their state government or continue recklessness in the legislature that is transferring the state government over to agents of boodle.

OFFICES THAT SHOULD BE ABOLISHED.

The offices of Attorney General and District Attorney should be abolished. The former is not constitutionally required and the latter could be supplied by a county attorney with salary fixed by the commissioners.

The state hires thousands of dollars of legal service in the course of four years, besides paying the Attorney General. A politician usually gets the office on a convenient combination, not for legal ability.

The state should be free to hire the best legal talent when it needs it to protect its interests, in place of getting its advice as result of a political deal and then having to hire lawyers besides.

The city of Salem has just won a suit against a powerful corporation in the Anson bond case. The state has just lost on the suit in the Davis school land defection. The city hires a good lawyer when it needs one. The state has political counsel to serve it on a salary. The state might have won its cases under the same system the city has.

HOW TO PREPARE HALIBUT

A lady asks THE JOURNAL editor how to prepare halibut. This is one of the richest, most nutritious and most delicate sea fishes, and there are many ways of rendering it unfit to eat.

One way the editor can recommend is to have your market man slice the fish not over half an inch thick. Make a batter of two eggs, spoonful of flour, plenty of salt, and some finely chopped shives or parsley.

Dip the fish, after it is cut in pieces to fit the mouths you have to feed (but do not remove the skin or bone or you lose the flavor and sweet juices) and fry quickly.

The lady is kindly but firmly informed that this is the only proper way to fry halibut, but we are not going to discuss the matter with her.

EXAMPLE OF TRUST GRASPINGS.

In the bids for state institution supplies it was noticed that all firms offering thread asked 50 cents a dozen spools. The trust fixes the price at which dealers must sell to everybody.

A carload of 19 tons of salt was delivered to Salem dealers Tuesday to dealers and packers at about \$30.00 a ton, that formerly was sold here at wholesale at \$5.00 to \$6.00 a ton—an advance of \$25.

These robberies may be required to produce prosperity in certain quarters, and to pay laboring men good wages. But certainly no one imagines that the trust managers do not take about 95 cents on the dollar advance.

Following explanation is asked of the Baker City Herald by the Union Republican: Several months ago agents of the Baker City Herald were in Union representing that that paper would publish a large special edition of 100,000 copies the first of the year, and collected money in advance for the paper. The edition was to be devoted to giving a description of Eastern Oregon and its resources. Up to date the special has not yet appeared nor has the money been refunded. Some explanation of this matter should be forthcoming by the Herald, and the money returned to those who advanced it.

Market Quotations Today

"Make Salem a Good Home Market"

The Hop Market
Kola Neis returned Tuesday evening from a business trip through the north end of the county. Speaking of the hop market, Mr. Neis says the general market conditions are fair although but few sales are being made. He reports growers are all holding for higher price and reject offers of even 11 and 11 1/2 cents for their hop legs. He estimates there are not over 2000 bales remaining in the hands of growers. Contracts for the 1922 crop are being written at 10 and 11 cents which is a better figure than has been offered for several years.

Salem Hop Market.
The hop market is showing greater strength as a result of Eastern advice. Monday several important sales were made. The Horst & Lachmund Company purchased two lots of hops at 12 1/2 cents—71 and 73 bales respectively. Other lots were in the market also and 12 cents was freely offered.

Sale of a lot of 91 bales to a local dealer for 12 1/2 cents was reported.

The New York market is firm with an upward tendency, and choice Oregon hops are quoted at 16 1/2 to 17 cents, as against 13 cents a month ago.

Local produce dealers find the potato market dull at present. They have large supplies on hand and will not meet the price asked by the growers at present. There has been no change in the price for some time as there is no large demand for this vegetable; and consequently stocks are heavy. The growers, it is said, hold to a stiff figure, and late in the season it will doubtless be necessary to meet it.
