OREGON CRIMP KINGS

Practices of the Sailor Boarding House Men.

Sailors are Herded Like Cattle and Sold Like Slaves.

PORTLAND, Jan. 16.—Almost every one in the state has heard more or less about Portland "crimps" or sailor boarding house men, but not a great many know just how they operate and how absolutely they control the sailor market; how they make the agents and captains of sailing vessels bow to them when they wish a crew; and how they make a sailor ask their permission before seeking employment. But some day the people all over the state will find it out and then—if all their finer feelings and sympathy towards mankind is not dead—something will be done to drive this unholy business out of our state.

The proprietors of some of those boarding houses are the lowest type of humanity, and have in their employ the worst gang of thugs and would be prizefighters that ever lived outside of a state's prison, who obey their employer as a slave his master, even to the committing of the foulest crimes.

Every incoming vessel is watched for, and every means resorted to, to induce the sailors aboard to desert. As soon as a sailor sets his foot ashore he is enticed to the boarding house. Some go readily, others may not, but they all get there in the end, for nine tenths of them like whiskey and whiskey is the long suit of the boarding house man. If a sailor can't handle sober he can be handled drunk. Sailors naturally drift there anyway, for that is where they are apt to find acquaintances and fellow sailors; and then there is no place else for them to go.

When once they are in the hands of the "crimps" they are herded like a lot of swine. They are fed on poor food, given enough rotten whiskey to keep them in a drunken stupor, and an opportunity to associate with the vilest women until they can be shipped again. A crimp has no more feeling for a sailor than the lowest slave driver that ever cracked a whip had towards the black he was driving to market.

When agents and captains of out-going vessels want sailors they are obliged to go to the crimps and buy them like they were buying horses or cattle, for so much a head. The price is usually from thirty to sixty dollars.

If the captain of a vessel attempts to hire men independent of the crimps, he is blacklisted. He will find to his sorrow that he is "up against it," and will never get sailors enough to get out of port until he bows to the King Crimp and atones for his offense.

People ask why sailors submit to be ruled as they are. Sailors know what happened to others who got gay and showed their independence:

A bill in the ear.
A smash in the jaw
A kick off the pier—
"To hell with the law."

Many of the sailors that come ashore are foreigners, who do not understand our language and are easily taken advantage of; and then again they are more or less used to a kind of slavery at home and take it as a matter of course over here.

The other evening a schooner, outward bound with a cargo of lumber from Portland, dropped anchor in the river in front of Astoria. The captain, being short-handed, sent the first and second mates ashore to see if they could hire three or four sailors. They walked up town, and, like any men would be expected to do in a free country, an-

nounced that they wanted to engage some sailors. The news soon reached the crimps, who thought that any one who offered employment to sailors without their consent ought to be punished. So they sent out a number of their gang to hire out to the two mates as sailors, and to offer to take them where other sailors could be found.

The mates were decoyed down to the water front where they were assaulted by a gang of cut-throats who knocked the second mate down with a club and would no doubt have served the first mate the same way but he pulled a six-shooter and blew out the brains of his assailant. He was arrested for murder but after a preliminary examination was discharged, and boarded his ship with the blessings of all the good citizens of Astoria whose only regret was that he didn't have a repeater shot gun and so that he might have bagged more of them.

The legislature can pass a law that will drive these people out of business, but it will have to be introduced and passed by members who do not live in our sea-port towns; for the crimps are a power in politics, and office seekers from the same towns are too anxious for their support to do anything to antagonize them.

Frank T. Butler, the English author, who wrote the "Cruise of the Cachetol," and other sea stories, devotes a chapter or two in one of his books to the telling of his adventures with the "Crimps" when his vessel visited the Columbia River. This was in the days when Jim Turk ruled our ports. Jim Turk is dead but his disciples are all alive and are carrying out the teachings of their master to such an extent that the sea ports of Oregon have become notorious all over the shipping world.
