Collamarini Indorsed.

An extract from a Los Angeles paper says that Repetto and Russo have the training and art that lift them above their forerunners. Repetto is a florid singer of marked ability and sweetness, conscientious and capable. Her performances were the most brilliant ever seen here. Following the traditions of her school in the matter of discounting the dramatic requirement yet her mad scene in Lucia was far more pleasing than was Melba's presentation of that well known incident of the opera. She lacks Melba's velvet but in tone attack, vocal di voice, legato, articulation, pronunciation and the other things that enter into the best sort of voice production this young singer is of such distinct and high merit that it is more than enough to make her stand up by our foremost impersonator. She is artistic and highly trained in florid work yet she controls her powers with infinite skill.

Domenico Russo, though a young man, for his ability has done superb work, and has placed himself at the very head of the lyric tenors. His intonation is always certain, differing in this respect from other great artists that we have heard. He is a master of tone production, and has the most perfect control of his beautiful voice, alike entrancing in both forte and pianissimo passages. Russo does not have to depend entirely on his singing for success, for his acting is the very perfection of art. Russo's Rigoletto was a great triumph for the little singer. His beautiful voice showing to great advantage in the La Donna E Mobile which is one of the gems of the opera. He introduced a cadenza in this number which added great to its beauty. REPETTO AND FERRARI

With the Collamarini Repetto Co. at the Grand Tonight.

Musical people of this city are regarding with pleasurable anticipation the engagement of the stellar aggregation of artists comprising the Collamarini Repetto Company which is to appear at the Opera House this evening.

The company is composed of Signora Italia Vittoria Repetto, Soprano, Signor Stefano Collamarini, Contralto, Signor Domenico Russo, Tenor, Signor Giuseppe Ferrari, Baritone, Mons. Andre Benoit, Pianist. Collamarini and Russo are so well known as to require no further mention the mere fact that these great artists will be with us is an assurance of a splendid performance.

Repetto is a Lyric Soprano and as such stands at the very head of her class. She was given the name of the Italian Meibla by the public of Milan where she achieved a triumph. Since coming to America Repetto has substantiated all the good things said of her in Italy. Her Lucia is considered superior to that of any Grand Opera prima donna who has essayed that difficult role, the way she does the mad scene is a revelation and fairly takes the audience off its feet. During the late season of Grand Opera at the Grand Opera House it was necessary for Impresario Maurice Grau to call this gifted Italian songbird to his aid, and the manner in which she sang Musetta in La Boheme stamped her as having no equal in Grau's high priced organization. Repetto could hardly miss being a singer for heredity and environment both have bent her in that direction. Her father and two brothers have both won fame in Italy as musical directors, five other members of her family are now recognized artists in Europe and her eldest sister REPETTO TRESOLINI will be remembered by the older generation as the greatest exponent of the Italian school preceding Patti. Today her sister, our Repetto, the dainty little song bird is no less great for in encountering the Lyric Soprano of the world Repetto stands at the very head. She made a life long study of coloratura work, and her perfection in singing amazing cadenzas is readily understood. Her voice is of amazing flexibility and gratifying certainty, never a note slightest nor the least departure from perfect purity of tone, and the bird like quality of it is fascinating.

Giuseppe Ferrari the Dramatic Baritone is one of the greatest Artists that Italy, the birthplace of song, has ever sent us. In quality of voice, purity of intonation and ideal execution Ferrari is in a class all by himself. Just picture to yourself a great big baritone with a bell-like clearness which fills the largest house and you have an idea of Ferrari's organ.

His voice has that mellow flexibility coupled with ringing vigor which gives such satisfaction that one could sit and listen for hours to him.

In addition to being well equipped vocally, Ferrari is also an excellent actor. His Sir Henry Ashton in Lucia has never been equalled in this country.

The program for this evening is the best that has ever been presented in this city, the very gems of the favorite Italian Grand Opera being heard in one evening, and being rendered as they are by artists such as Repetto, Collamarini, Russo and Ferrari, the thinking music lover can readily perceive the great treat in store.

Will Exchange no More Passes

C. W. Bullen, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Trunk Line Association makes by authority of the Executive Officers of the Trunk Lines the following statement:

The exchange of passes between railroads which began many years since in a very limited way, has grown to such proportions as to have entirely outrun its original purposes and had become so burdensome and unworkable, that at sundry conferences of the Trunk Line Presidents, continued from time to time during the past year, material reforms in the matter had been unanimously advocated; and at a final conference held shortly before January 1st, 1902, it was unanimously and harmoniously agreed between them, that exchanges of passes with other transportation companies, should be discontinued after December 31, 1901.

This agreement has gone into effect and is being fully kept by all of the parties thereto, the impression that has been widely circulated that it was especially advocated or instigated by, or that any particular Trunk Line President is responsible for the inception or construction of the agreement or of any of its terms is without the slightest foundation in fact.

State Is Now Paying Interest

The state is now paying interest on warrants on the general fund. The money in the treasury has been exhausted and until about the middle of May or the first of June, when the county payments on the state assessment will be paid, all warrants will draw six per cent interest. Beginning with Thursday all warrants presented were endorsed "not paid for want of funds." This excepts amounts under \$50. In anticipation of this state of affairs in the treasury, several brokers have been buying up warrants for the last two months. Warrants are above par at present, as the state paper is considered a better investment than the usual gilt edge security. At present a \$50 warrant can not be purchased for less than \$51. It is possible that the county taxes will be paid earlier than usual this year on account of the 6 per cent rebate allowed when they are paid before March 15.
