DALRYMPLES

Mr. Elmer King

Who lives near Lewisburg, 14 miles east of Salem in the red hills, concluded some time ago that he had followed a walking plow about as long as he cared to, and desiring to find a milder plow that would save him the famous "red hills" land, was confronted with the old argument that "nothing but a chilled plow would work in the hills." Mr. King, however, is not so wedded to old theories that he is afraid to at least give any good implement a fair trial.

Saturday he took out one of our Moline "high lift" Blumkin" sulky plows, fitted with a 10-inch steel bottom. This is likely the only steel plow that is in use within cannon shot of the place and of course we are naturally interested in seeing it succeed. How well it succeeded is best attested by the fact that Mr. King was so well pleased that he decided at once upon keeping it, this after he had made tests and comparisons with the chilled plow in the same field at the same time.

Mr. King is satisfied, and is only doing what the progressive farmers all over the valley are doing, buying sulky and gang plows and thus placing themselves in a measure independent of the weather.

This particular plow is known as the "high lift," as the plow beam rises straight up, and in action the lift lever runs loose, so that in case the plow strikes an obstruction, it raises of its own accord, and settles back into the furrow the same way. It can be used with or without pole. The furrow wheels are known as "cater wheels," thus enabling the operator to make a square turn to right or left.

We have had a wonderfully good track this winter on all classes of sulky and gang plows, both mold-board and disc plows. We carry the Benicini rotary disc and the Moline and Syracuse sulky, and can please anyone no matter what the nature of the soil.

SALEM PUSH CLUB

Several Important Projects Are Pending.

At the next regular meeting of the greater Salem Commercial Club, on next Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock, the new date for the big club rally, will be announced, and active preparations for the same will begin immediately, as it is proposed to make the rally the event of the season. It will infuse new life into the business of the city, and be the beginning of a new era of prosperity for the Capital City and its surroundings.

Several important local enterprises are in the hands of the club. There is a proposition to locate a new sawmill at Salem. Two tax industry enterprises are before this community. The committee will report on the Silverton motor line. Formation of local improvement leagues is in the hands of a committee.

Suit for a Harvester

The McCormick Harvesting Company has begun a suit in the Marion county circuit court against J. B. Early. The suit is for the purpose of collecting money on two promissory notes, and some property has been attached pending the disposal of the case. The complaint states that J. B. Early made, executed and delivered to the plaintiff corporation on Sept. 12, 1930, his promissory note for \$70, with interest at 8 per cent from Nov. 1, until paid. This sum was to be paid before Nov. 1, 1930, and the only payment made was \$15 leaving \$55 due. Another note for a like sum was executed by the said defendant on Sept. 12, 1930, this note to fall due before Nov. 1, 1931. This sum was not paid and a judgment is asked for the total of \$125 and with interest as contracted for and \$35 attorneys fees. J. H. and C. L. McNary are attorneys for the McCormick Company.

Work on the Postoffice Stops

Work has been stopped on the new post office building on account of the supply of stone having been exhausted. Contractor Frank Campbell recently visited the quarry at Ashland for the purpose of making arrangements for securing stone in a more prompt manner. A carload of stone is expected today and under the new quarry management it may be possible to avoid any further delays. The heaviest and most important part of the work will be on the cornice. For this part larger stone will be used than anywhere else in the building. The program being made in the construction during the past few weeks has been comparatively rapid, and if the work can be continued without any delay in awaiting material, it will be but a few months until the stone work is completed.

He Favors Flat Figures

Hon. Henry E. Ankeny, the southern Oregon politician and Jackson county mining king, was in Salem today. He is not thinking of becoming a permanent resident of Salem with a view to occupying the executive mansion, although newspaper talk has connected him with the gubernatorial candidacy, and the state might do a great deal worse.

Mr. Ankeny is unfortunately a man of considerable means and cuts a small swath in practical politics as he is conducted in Oregon today. He said the fight to put state officials on a flat salary and all fees go to the state, met with his hearty support. "Let the state pay a respectable salary but all fees and perquisites belong to the treasury. Make the salary liberal enough so that a man of ordinary means can hold the office and afford to give a reception or entertain distinguished people who come to the state. Our system of state government is very loose and it is a wonder the state has not been lunched out of more than it has."

He expressed surprise that the suit to collect the Davis defalcation had failed. "How do you know but the state has been lunched out of hundreds of thousands?" asked the reporter. He didn't know but it had.

CONFERENCE OF EDUCATORS

Two Weeks Devoted to Willamette.

An educational conference will be held in Salem in February by the Methodist Episcopal church. It will begin on Sunday, February 2, to be carried on three days at Salem, and to last for about two weeks in the state. The new president of the Willamette University, Dr. J. H. Coleman, of Troy, N. Y., will have arrived by that time, and this convention is held in the interests of the University. During the convention the chief speakers will be Rev. W. F. McDowell, D. D., Rev. M. E. Mills, D. D., of Troy, N. Y., and Bishop Earl Cranston, D. D. Visitors from all over the state will be present. The conference proper convenes at 2 p. m. Monday, Feb. 3, and will close Wednesday evening. Bishop Cranston will be president of the convention. The program now prepared, arranged for a meeting Monday evening, at which time Governor Geer will preside and addresses will be made by Dr. Cranston and Mills. On Tuesday evening addresses will be delivered by Dr. McDowell and J. H. Coleman. The topics to be considered in the addresses and papers are:

The Duty of the M. E. church to Higher Education in Oregon.
The Importance of Christian culture in the educational system.
The value of the institution of higher learning to the municipality and the state.
The future growth and present outlook for Willamette university.
The alumni of Willamette university.
How to build up the student body.
On Thursday and Friday, Dr. McDowell and Gen. Odell will visit Albany, Corvallis and Hillsboro and Bishop Cranston and Dr. Mills will visit The Dalles and Walla Walla.

SIX HUNDRED KILLED

Earth Tremor in Mexico Yesterday

Cost Six Hundred Lives in Guerrero.

Only Meagre Details of the Catastrophe.

LAREDO, Tex., Jan. 17.—A City of Mexico dispatch received here says six hundred people were killed by an earthquake yesterday at Chilpancingo in the state of Guerrero.

CITY OF MEXICO, Jan. 17.—The Earthquake yesterday was general throughout the Republic. Many buildings were destroyed.

Delegates Started.
MEXICO CITY, Jan. 16.—The event of the day in the Pan-American Conference was, it may be said, the earthquake this afternoon. The Chileans had prolonged throughout the entire morning their dilatory tactics. The burden of their speeches was always the same:

"We are in favor of The Hague convention, but it must not pass through the conference without discussion." Mr. Buchanan, of the United States, Senor Macedo, of Mexico, and Senor Bermejo, of Argentina, made speeches asking in turn, "If we are all agreed, what is there to discuss?"

At the afternoon session the Chilean delegates resumed their speechmaking. Senor Alzamora, of Peru, had just risen to reply when a preliminary trepidation spread consternation through the assembly, and for nearly one minute afterward the gilded Hall of Sessions swayed and groaned like the saloon of an ocean liner. The delegates sprang from their chairs and grabbed their desks in alarm, but were reassured by the calmness of the Mexicans. The proceedings were interrupted for fully 10 minutes.

When Senor Alzamora resumed his speech he alluded in temperate though unmistakable terms to the difficulties which Chile had put in the way of the conference and the obstacles she is now making for the transaction of business. Bilingualism of Chile, made an effective answer. The session terminated at 6:30 o'clock without coming to a vote on the plan of accepting The Hague articles.

COUNTY EXPENSES FOR 1931

About Same as for the Year Before.

Marion County Has Small Basis for the State Taxes.

County clerk W. W. Hall has prepared his report of the expenses of Marion county last year and filed the same with Secretary of State F. S. DuBar. This is rendered necessary by an act passed at the last legislature. In accordance with this act the county clerk is required by Jan. 15 of each year, to prepare a concise tabulated statement of all the expenses of the county for the preceding year, excepting the expenses for roads and highways.

From the reports of all the county clerks, the Governor, Secretary of State and State Treasurer estimate the apportionment of state taxes among the several counties. This is done by ascertaining the average expenditure of a county for a period of five years, and each county pays such proportion of the state taxes as its average amount of expenditure for said period bears to the total amount of expenditures in all the counties of the state. This is done but once in five years. This act has not been in effect a sufficient time for these reports to be considered for the last five years.

The taxes until 1930 are based upon the assessments of the past five years. This fixes the proportionate share of the tax of Marion county at .0813 percent. The total expenditure for Marion county in 1931 was \$44,883.49. For the segregated accounts the expenses are as appended:

TODAY'S THEME ANARCHY

Attorney General Knox Would Make

Assault on President Capital Offense.

Pacific Cable is Again Being Discussed

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—The House committee on the judiciary today began the consideration of various anti-anarchy bills. A new bill was presented by Attorney General Knox which makes an assault on the President resulting fatally a capital offense to be tried in the United States court. An assault that does not result fatally may be deemed a capital offense within the discretion of the court.

The Pacific cable question was again argued before the House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce today. Vice-President Clark of the Western Union advocated a government cable on the ground that a cable laid by a commercial company would deprive the Western Union Co. of all land business resulting while a government cable would divide it. General Greeley, chief United States signal officer favored government control as a necessity in time of war and a thing beyond price in time of peace. He said Governments are realizing the necessity of controlling cables.

NEW YORK TUNNEL DISASTER

Engineer Blames Fog and Smoke.

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—At today's session of the New York tunnel inquiry commission, testimony in support of engineer Wickes, contention that the signal lights were frequently obscured was introduced. The report of an engineer was offered in which he said he had run a whole train length past a red light which was obscured by fog and smoke.
