SALARY CLAUSE OF THE CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE XIII. The Governor shall receive an annual salary of fifteen hundred dollars. The Secretary of State shall receive an annual salary of fifteen hundred dollars. The Treas-urer of State shall receive an annual salary of eight hundred dollars. The Judges of the Supreme Court shall receive an annual salary of two thousand dollars. They shall receive no fees or perquisites whatever for the performance of any duties connected with their respective offices; and the compensation of officers, if not fixed by this constitution, shall be provided by law.

The Salem Journal has done a good work in compiling the salaries and fees of Oregon State officials. While the emoluments fixed by the constitution are ridiculously inadequate, the fee system intended to supplement the salaries has been abuted and in some instances carried to the other extreme.

The most notorious instance is that of the secretary of state, who during the last fiscal year drew \$14,6S3,01 in fees besides the annual salary of \$2,850. During the same time the state paid \$8,983 55 for clerical aid in the office. The Journal makes no mistake in demanding that all state officials be put on a flat salary and that fees be covered into the state trepsury.

these fees down would probably appropriate the \$50,000 for some special graft, and the state would be no better off than at present, Give the PEOPLE direct legislation and let them settle these matters of economy by the referendum system. The Journa! may be, and probably is in earnest, but it is trying to raise a "tempest in a teapot." If it would spend half as much energy on the Direct Legislation amendment it could do much good. 

STATE. Eugene State Journal.

The Salem Jonrnal Capital Journal is advocating the abolishment of all fees and perquisities for state officers and the establishment of fixed salaries. [Mr. Kincaid then reproduces THE JOCHNAL'S showing of expenses of each office and does not call them in question, but eave :]

Whether State officers receive fees, as now (only Secretary of State and Treusurer and Supt. of Pablic Instruction do receive any) or should receive a little more or less, the present amounts or nothing at all, is not a question of any practical importance to the people, although it was made the standing hobby of a few unscrupulous demagogues connected with the press for four years previous to the prasen* term when the fees were much less than now. Whether there be fees or no fees allowed the Secretary of State and State Treasurer, and whather these officers and the Governor should receive more or less than now, would make no parceptible difference in the revenues and expenses of the State. It is the useless and extravagant appropriations made by the Legislature, all demanded by the people themselves, and for which the people who elect Legislatures are to blame, that make large expenditures and high taxes, such appropriations as were made by the last Legislature, almost doubling the amount by adding \$400,000 to the already large. amounts of former years, These are the mountains.
