SCHOOL LAND BOARD

Makes Statement On Johnson Loan.

Admits There Was a Mistake As to Amount of Land.

The State School Land Board has made public the following statement in relation to the Johnson School Land Board:
 "The whole thing is only one of several little tempests in a local hysterical tempest which boils spasmodically for political effect only. The business of the State Land Board is all done publicly and always with the intention of promoting the public welfare. We are glad this question has come up because it has disclosed a mistake of which we were not aware. We have never in the past and do not now pretend to be infallible.
 "Mr. Johnson's first application was rejected, the same as we often reject applications when the information seems inadequate, but which upon a further showing is allowed. This loan in this respect does not differ from many others, because we often, where there seems any doubt as to the value of the security offered, reject it altogether, or until some further showing can be made. In this case, after something like two years, the application was renewed, accompanied with a list of some seven actual sales in that vicinity, furnished by an abstractor, certifying that one tract, for instance, of twenty acres had sold in 1890 for \$3,700, another of 46 acres sold for \$12,782 and another of four acres sold for \$2100 in 1893. These tracts in actual sales brought from \$275 an acre to \$525. One tract of forty-six acres, being three acres more than we supposed this security contained, sold for over \$275 an acre. Although these figures may be somewhat above what the same land would have sold for since, yet, as is well known, Salem has never had a boom, but making this allowance, the valuation we made on this supposed forty-three acres was only \$175 an acre to cover the rules of the board, whereas, the instances furnished from the records reach as high as \$525 an acre.
 "The application as furnished on declares there are 43.28 acres under cultivation. We accepted this statement as true because it was sworn to. The tract had originally contained that much land and was so described in former mortgages, but eleven acres had been sold off, and this fact in some way escaped the attention of the county attorney and abstractor. The state is in no danger of losing a dollar on the loan because the thirty-two acres are worth much more than the loan, but the security is not within the law which requires three times the value of the loan. The intention of the board was right and the error is simply a mistake that better men than we often make. We have loaned over \$1,300,000 since we have been handling the school fund, and while this mistake will result in no loss to the school fund, it is to be regretted, the avidity with which it is seized upon merely testifies to the excellence of a management which has not been excelled by any banking firm anywhere doing a similar volume of business. We have been frequently abused by men for refusing them loans, charging that it was through a desire to keep money in the treasury, but here is a case where censure comes for making one. It is always a question of judgment, and the public officer is to be congratulated who does not catch it going and coming.
 "The board has never instructed an agent to make any particular kind of report upon an application. His judgment is always left perfectly free so far as the board is concerned. In this case the attorney's recommendation was based, no doubt, on the list of actual sales that had been made, as was the board's conclusion to allow the loan to be made. The only mistake was in the matter of the amount of the security, but not a dollar of loss will result from it, although it is to be regretted. We very often disallow applications even when recommended by the attorney."

SMALL STRIP OF LAND

Sued For in the Marion County Circuit Court.

James Finney has begun suit against William H. Egan to establish boundary and title to 71 acres of land, being a strip off the south side of a 308 acre tract belonging to the plaintiff. He alleges that this strip has been in the possession of himself and predecessors for over 31 years.

He asks judgment for the recovery of the land, \$100 damages for having withheld it and \$100 special damages for having destroyed some grain planted there by the plaintiff and also for costs and disbursements. Caron & Adams and P. H. D'Arcy are attorneys for Finney.

THE QUESTION OF SKILL

Billy Dunn Says Oregon Horsemen Can Ride Well.

Relates Instance of How Newt Jones, of Heppner, Stumped the Boise "Broncho Busters."

 Will Dunn, one of the O. R. & N. conductors running between Pendleton and Portland remarked upon a recent article appearing in this paper, anent the fact that Montefiore Brothers have imported "broncho busters" into the Malheur country to break horses for the South African cavalry service. Mr. Dunn formerly lived in Wyoming and has seen much of this western region in which horseback riding is a fine art, and it is commonly supposed that as good saddle men live as are to be found anywhere in the world. Said he:
 "I believe that right here in Umatilla county and over in Morrow are the best horsemen in the world. If there are any men anywhere who can ride anything that wears hide, it is right here. I heard about an affair at Boise, one time, when Newt Jones, a son of James Jones, of Heppner, came along. There was to be a 'broncho busting' contest, and cowboys who profess excellence in that line of work had gathered from all over the west. They were there from Idaho, Oregon, Washington, Utah and Nevada, and the crowd comprised as fine saddle men as ever wore a pair of chaps.
Newt Was Blooded.
 "Young Jones looked over the prospects, and decided that he wanted some of the fun himself, but he was anxious to see to it that no one said that he had easier horses to ride than the others. Hence, when he drew the first chance to select his animal, he hunted up the man who drew the best chance, and traded with him, giving all the other fellows the advantage, and allowing them to pick out the best horses, and he took what was left.
 "Newt won the honors of the contest, and convinced the crowd that Oregon men could ride some. He stayed in the saddle while his horses plunged and reared and bucked, as only wild rangelanders will do, and not one of them was able to unseat him.
 "He was brought up in the Heppner hills, and learned all he knows about horses from the experience in the country surrounding that little town. I believe he can ride any horse ever born.
Some Other Nervies.
 "Up in Laramie, Wyoming, one day, a fellow named Sam Collins offered to do something that scared the major portion of the life out of a band of cowboys that had assembled there. A band of horses were in a corral, and a dispart arose as to who was the best rider. Collins made a proposition to the most offensive one that caused him to crawl, and gained for Collins a name for nerve of an unusual nature. He laid a \$20 gold piece on the ground and said to the other one: 'Now if you will agree, we will stand up here on this board that we will place place over the opening of the corral. We will jump onto the back of the first horse that comes out, without saddle or bridle and ride as he runs with all the others running with him. The other fellow did not accept the offer.
 "Another cowboy came through one time driving stock from Oregon into Wyoming, and gave an exhibition that made the horsemen of that region think they had never seen any one before who knew how to stick in a saddle.
 "In fact, I guess that Oregon need not import horsemen, and that Malheur matter of bringing in riders was due to the temporary trouble between the local men, or to some other cause than inability of Oregonians to ride as well as those of other states in the west."
