PUSH CLUB PROGRAM

Number of Important Measures Under Way.

A Condensed Milk Factory is Offering to Locate here.

The Push Club met Wednesday and pushed a number of matters in an intelligent manner.

The executive committee had a meeting during the week and recommended raising \$1000 for a special purse for the State Fair races. Referred to the committee on Business Opportunities, E. C. Cross, Chairman.

W. H. Bellwood asked aid to help to hire a first class band instructor and establish a first class military band. His proposition was to build up a good, strong musical organization, capable of giving good open air concerts. The matter went over for further consideration. Several spoke favorably upon the subject.

J. B. T. Tutill was named as chairman of committee on numbering streets and erecting names of same.

Chairman Hansen of the committee on securing a sawmill site reported that they had a meeting with Mr. D. S. Lively & Sons of Woodburn. He wanted a lease for twenty years, with the option to buy at end of that time. Messrs. Stout and Hackett of the committee were authorized to look over sites and asked further time to report. Granted.

Mr. Borzoth of the Literature committee reported on getting out a small book to enclose in a common envelope, containing statistics and information. The committee has further time to complete its work. The committee are preparing a pamphlet and ask for material for same.

A letter was read to the club from H. A. McRobert of Northville, Mich., asking about the feasibility of establishing a condensed milk factory at Salem. O. V. Allen stated that he had answered the letter and would work with this club to establish such an industry here. Referred to committee on Manufactures.

None of the committee on the Salem and Silverton motor line were present and so no report was made. It was the generally expressed idea that the committee were meeting with considerable encouragement and would make it a success.

There was an earnest protest on the part of members of the executive committee at the absence of interest on the part of several hundred members who could not find time to attend the meetings. These business men and property owners ought to feel a deeper interest—or enough interest at least to put in an afternoon in the month for the development of the community.

A rousing, snorting, meeting is desired at the next session more suggestive of push than of drag and pullback.

Dr. H. C. Epley moved that a special meeting of the club be called for Wednesday evening at 7:30 to consider the question of the Silverton motor line. Carried.

GOOD SETTLERS COMING

Moneyed Men Will Come this Year

Railroad men say that they expect a great movement of settlers to Oregon this year, in fact many are already coming. A. M. Cleland, a railroad man of St. Paul, says:

"The movement of bona fide home-seekers and settlers last year was very satisfactory and all indications point to even better results this year. The conditions are natural. Frequently the migration of settlers arises from crop failures or untoward circumstances that reduce the homeseeker's means and force him to look for a better land in the West—they always look to the West for better land. But now everybody is prosperous. The people who now move West to better their condition, to find a more genial climate and a more fruitful soil, are by no means dead broke. They have money and know how to make good use of it. They come among people who are also prosperous and disposed to give them a kindly welcome. Then they settle down contentedly, keep themselves in easy circumstances and establish homes that are a blessing to themselves and a credit to the country. This movement is exceptional in this respect. The cheap rates of the past three or four years gave everybody an opportunity to make personal examination of the great Pacific Northwest, and these examinations are now bearing fruit."

The Marion County Courts

Earl Race, Administrator of D. E. Shepard estate secured an order to sell \$155 personal property.

Mrs. Lizzie Roppel has been qualified as executor of the John Roppel estate. Madison Scott, plaintiff, in the \$20,000 damage suit brought in the circuit court against the Southern Pacific Company has made reply to the defendants' answer to the plaintiff's complaint.

M. J. Adams and Alfred Down, joint executors of the estate of James Down, deceased, have petitioned the county court for an order to mortgage certain property. They have sold all the personal property of the estate, with the exception of three warehouses, which cannot at present be destroyed. They realized from the sale of the property \$31,613.95 which sum was expended for claims against the estate. The claims now due are a promissory note for \$3,341.44 with interest, \$940 due the administrators, and the attorney's fees are yet to be paid. They ask to borrow \$5,000 to meet these, to do which they must mortgage some property.

TOOK DEADLY DRINK

Two McMinnville Women Take Poison Together.

Death of a Telephone Girl and Her Companion.

A McMinnville special says. Despondent from reasons unknown to their families or friends, tired of living and determined to die, Nanna Ungerman, night telephone operator at McMinnville, and her chum, Mrs. Ollie Gaunt, a divorced woman, drank arsenic in deadly quantities, in the telephone office last night, both succumbing today to the effects of the poison. Miss Ungerman called up several operators along the telephone line and told them that she and her companion were tired of living and were taking the poison at the time the message was sent. The grim announcement was not believed and those who received the message thought the McMinnville central was indulging in chaffing over the wire.

Both were prominent and popular young women, from the leading families of the town, and had pleasant homes and, so far as known, no reason existed for their untimely self-destruction. Mrs. Gaunt had been separated from her husband for several months, but none of her friends suspected that her domestic troubles weighed sufficiently heavy on her mind to cause her to contemplate suicide.

The poison was taken about half past 8 o'clock last night. Miss Ungerman had been acting as night operator in the telephone office. She was accompanied to her work by Mrs. Gaunt, and both seemed to be in the best of spirits when Mr. Hembree, the proprietor of the store where the telephone office is situated, left his establishment early in the evening. Mr. Hembree returned to his store about 9 o'clock and found Mrs. Gaunt standing in the rear door of the building ill. As she became worse at once, a physician was summoned. Under his direction Mrs. Gaunt was removed to the home of her stepfather, T. A. McCourt, while Miss Ungerman walked out unaided and apparently in normal health. In a short time Miss Ungerman was taken ill.

Miss Ungerman is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. P. Ungerman, highly respected citizens of McMinnville. Mrs. Gaunt was the daughter of Mrs. T. A. McCourt, of this city, and was a general favorite. Mrs. Gaunt formerly lived in Hillsboro, where she was well known.

GOVERNOR GEER'S APPEAL

For Funds for the McKinley Memorial.

In response to a five-lined word telegram from Governor Nash of Ohio Gov. Geer today issued the following to the people of Oregon: "As a suitable memorial to the affectionate regard in which the people of the United States hold the memory of the late President McKinley, 'The McKinley National Memorial Association' was organized several months ago for the purpose of raising the necessary funds for the erection of a monument at his tomb in Canton, Ohio. The estimated cost of this monument is \$650,000, of which sum his native state of Ohio proposes to raise \$100,000.

"I have been requested by the sub-committee of Ohio, of which Governor Nash is chairman, that Wednesday, the 29th of January, which will be the 50th anniversary of the birth of William McKinley, be set apart by all the schools as 'McKinley Day,' to be observed with some kind of special exercises, and that the children be given upon that day an opportunity to contribute whatever they may feel disposed and able to the memorial fund. It is also requested that on the Sunday preceding the 29th of January, all the churches have special services and that they give an opportunity to all persons attending to contribute to the fund.

"William McKinley was a life-long friend of the poorer people of this country and they will not doubt manifest their appreciation of this fact, by availing themselves of this opportunity to contribute, no matter how small the sum, toward the construction of this monument to his memory. He was an especial friend of the children, which was not only evidenced in his affectionate home attachments, but on all public occasions where our little folks were a factor in the exercises.

"The people of Oregon, for whom the late President always had a high regard, should respond cheerfully to this proposal to contribute their share to this memorial fund on two designated days, in order that it may not be neglected or allowed to further lag. Large sums are not expected, since the smaller the sum the more people will have an interest in and be a part of this national tribute to one of our great Presidents.

"I do not feel disposed to urge this matter, for all offerings should be prompted by the heart, and especially the children are hereby merely notified that on the anniversary of McKinley's birth day the opportunity will be open to contribute whatever small mite may be at their disposal, if no more than a penny each. While some of our best people may not feel able to contribute anything to this fund, we have thousands who should respond with cheerful liberality. Our own fair state should not be lagging in this very patriotic movement."

Life Insurance Record Broken

The Largest Yearly Premium Ever Paid Received by the Metropolitan.

Indigestion Food.

The recurrence of the flavor of food for some time after eating is always an indication, writes a physician in a medical journal, that the food is not being properly digested. "I can taste it," we say after eating canned fruits and vegetables preserved by adding salicylic acid or formaldehyde, substances that curdle and neutralize the digestive juices as completely as they protect it from the microbes of the outer air. And "I can taste it" would probably be the report of one who had made a hearty meal on a turkey kept several months in cold storage. "A man trying to live on such meat would simply starve to death or die of blood poisoning," adds the physician.

He does not fail to remind us that the storage warehouse is generally a convenience and a benefit and only when misused a source of danger. But neither he nor any one else could find a good word to say for manufacturers who put slow poison into a food product. The fitting punishment for them would be to give them nothing to eat but their own excrement stuff.

The Bird That Flies Longest.

Mr. J. Lancaster, naturalist, who spent five years on the west coast of Florida studying birds there, came to the conclusion that of all the feathered tenants of the air the frigate bird can fly the longest without resting. He has seen one flying for a whole week night and day without repose.

The frigate bird can feed, collect materials for its nest and even sleep on the wing. Apparently its wings can be controlled automatically, without the power of its will, and it probably adapts itself to take advantage of the upward or bearing force of the wind. The spread of the frigate bird's wing is great, and it can fly at a speed of ninety-six miles an hour, without seeming to flap its wings much.

The albatross—that "king of the high seas," as it has been called—is larger than the frigate bird, but if it follows a vessel for four or five days it has to rest on a rock or on the ship itself.
