SUITS OVER INTEREST

Alleged to be Due Phil Met-schan on State Funds.

Loaned by Him as State Treasurer to the Williams and England Bank.

The trial of the first of the suits brought to restrain payment of interest on state funds loaned by State Treasurer Met-schan to the Williams & England bank, was begun on Monday afternoon before Judge Boise.

The books of the bank in the hands of the receiver were introduced as testimony. Among the witnesses are Edmund C. and B. F. Giltner, for many years employed at the State house, ex-Mayor Geo. H. Williams of Portland, one of the managers of the bank, ex City Treasurer E. J. Swafford, and others.

It is expected that some information of great interest to the people of the state will be elicited.

MODOC COUNTY COURTS

Are Scenes of Bullying and Abuse.

Below we give a sample of the many disgraceful court scenes that are witnessed daily in the Superior Court of Modoc county; scenes that would not be tolerated in any justice court in the land, and are surely beneath the dignity of a Superior Court says the Gold Hill News. It seems that John Hutton, a witness for the state was on the witness stand and under cross examination by J. E. Raker, one of the defendant J. W. Brown, when an all around row between the Judge on the bench and the attorneys was precipitated, the same being reported by the Plaintiff as follows:

Examination of witnesses continued no further, for at this point the most spectacular row that has disgraced Modoc county's court house commenced, and it was only through the presence of mind of Sheriff Street that one more page of bloody history is not to be added to Modoc's already bad record. Attorney Raker has during the whole trial, as has everybody else in Alturas referred to Don Miller as Danny Miller and as Don's body guard. During his examination of Hutton he repeatedly asked questions relating to Miller and things which have occurred since Miller's arrival here, and referred to him as Danny Miller. General Post at last jumped to his feet and exclaimed, "Raker you are speaking of a person who is in every way superior to yourself, and saying what you would not dare to say outside of this court room. You would not dare to insult Dan Miller if you were outside" Raker replied, "I am not insulting Danny Miller, he could never be insulted and I would say it to him outside as soon as anywhere else. What right has he to go around here carrying guns? He can't intimidate me."

Miller was by this time shaking his head and Raker said, "Oh! you needn't shake your head at me, I am not afraid of you."

Miller then jumped to his feet and drawing his gun exclaimed, "I will meet you anywhere." Raker jumped back and Sheriff Street jumped in between the two men, and grabbed Raker around the neck. The court room was filled with women and they began to scream and run to the door. Court demanded Sheriff to remove Raker from the court room and he was compelled to use force in obeying the order. Raker calling at the top of his voice, "He reached for his gun and I commanded you as sheriff of this county to search him." Court then politely asked Miller to leave the court room which he did. After putting Raker out, Sheriff Street came back and said, "This man Miller has caused enough trouble here and I am going to find out if he has any authority to carry arms."

His words were greeted with loud cheers. Judge Harrington said, "If you make such a remark as that again, I will have you in jail yourself." Affair ended here by court adjournment.

THE OREGON SUPREME COURT

Moore, J. - Feller v. Gates; Marion Co. affirmed. State v. Colestock; Washington Co. affirmed. Wolverton, J. - Brandt v. Brandt; Lane Co.; modified. Stone v. Ladd, Multnomah Co. affirmed. Motion to dismiss in Small v. Lu's, denied. Opinion by Bean, C. J. Petition for rehearing in Pacific Export Lbr. Co. v. Prescott, overruled. Opinion by Moore, J.

Petitions for rehearing were denied in Watson v. Columbia River L. & F. Co. Garner v. Wheeler. No opinions. The Marion county case in which the Supreme court affirmed the decision of the circuit court is one of an unusual nature. The parties are Francis Feller, a prominent citizen of Battleville, now in London as a representative of the Oregon Lumber growers, and John H. Gates, now in the penitentiary for forging H. W. Corbett's name. Some years ago Gates was constable at Woodburn and an action was brought against Feller in the justice court, resulting in a judgment against Feller in the sum of \$126.40. When Gates went to attach some of Feller's property to satisfy the judgment, Feller proposed to him that he did not make the attachment as he was going to appeal the case, and to secure him against any loss he gave Gates the sum of the judgment, which was not, however, to be applied on the judgment. He appealed to the circuit court and the decision of the lower court was reversed. Mr. Feller then called on the constable for his money, but Gates had spent it, and Feller sued his bondsmen, W. Cooley and L. W. Gates, to recover the sum. The circuit court held that they were not responsible, as the constable was not acting in his official capacity when he received the money. This opinion is affirmed by the Supreme court.

Desert Land Contracts

The state Land Board has been busy for several days considering the demands for action under the Carey law and the desert land act of the last legislature, under which desert land prospectors are proposing to take up large holdings and redeem them by irrigation systems.

The state law was gotten through hurriedly, passing both houses in a rush. In one house being read three times and passed the same day and not a vote against it in the legislature, yet it will create a lien on every foot of land that is taken up under it.

The state law provides that any person or company desiring to reclaim desert land can enter into a contract with the state land board by which this lien is created for all actual and necessary expense incurred for establishing irrigation systems, and interest on the capital required. The Carey law limits this to actual cost while the act of the legislature allows estimated costs to be included in the basis for a lien. The state board have under great deliberation in drawing a contract under which the state will not become liable, and in some respects prefer to follow the act of congress to the language of the state law.

The revised contract which they will submit to the desert land prospectors is quite different from that proposed to the state board but they believe it will be accepted.

Application for the reclamation of Eastern Oregon arid lands, in accordance with the Carey and state desert land acts, has been made to the State Board, as follows:

John F. Matthews and others.

Dewitt C. Brownell and others.

Wright Point Improvement Company.

Little Deschutes Irrigation Company.

Deschutes Reclamation and Irrigation Company.

Harney Valley Improvement Company.

Pilot Butte Improvement Company.

Oregon Development Company.

In each case a survey has been made and a list of lands embraced in the application has been forwarded to the United States Land office to have stricken on such as are exempt. Each of the above applications includes large tracts and in addition, 21 other applications have been made to the Board, by individuals, each application including from one to five or six sections. The largest tract covers over eighty thousand acres.

ACCUSED OF PETIT LARCENCY

On Friday morning he did not leave his room until about ten o'clock, after everyone else had gone. He then entered the room of Charles Wiseman just across the hall and helped himself to nearly every small article in sight. He took a suit of clothes, a brush, a razor and a gold watch chain.

A complaint was filed against Young Saturday morning and he was arrested Sunday night. The court and vest he had sold at the Shantz second hand store, and the razor he tried to sell at Long-corns, but they would not buy it.

When arrested he was wearing the watch chain. He has never been seen around here before.

When asked by Chief of Police Gibson how he would plead in the matter Young demanded a jury trial.

Mr. Wiseman, from whom the articles were stolen is employed by E. G. Cross in his meat curing house.

The trial was set for four o'clock. There is no doubt as to the outcome of the matter as there is a clear case against Young.
