WHAT THE DECISION BY BELLINGER MEANS

Full Text Presented in This Paper With Interview.

HAD WITH THE JUDGE AS TO THE EFFECT
AND MEANING OF THE DECISION

The Court Says the Question of the Insolvency of Gilbert Brothers Was Not Decided in This Case.

Judge Bellinger when seen by a JOURNAL representative explained his decision as follows: "The question of insolvency was not decided. That question depends on the weight of evidence as to values to which witnesses equally capable have opposite opinions. If Gilbert thought himself solvent when the transfers were made, it is enough in such a state of the case. The presumption must be in favor of good faith in making of transfers. The question of good faith in making transfers was also affected by the amount of alleged preferences compared with the total assets, such amount of \$7000 making a difference to other creditors of less than one percent. Transfers to Ladd and Bush and First National Bank of Portland were conceded by petitioners on the argument to preferences. Nothing is to be obtained on costs."

PUSH CLUB PRODS

The Silverton Motor Line Project a Little.

Has a Committee at Work on a Sawmill Site.

The Push Club meeting Wednesday night added a little steam to the Silverton Motor Line project. Good suggestions were made and several increased subscriptions were hinted at. The sawmill site is in the hands of the committee and the Journal is of the opinion that all the energies of the club should be bent upon this small matter of locating a little 15,000 foot a day capacity sawmill in our city.

There are persons in Salem so narrow that they will secretly plot to prevent a competing industry in any line. If the committee do not look out this little project that asks no bonus will be thrown down and let slip.

One little thing accomplished well would do more for the life of the club than pages of wind work.

The club through its energetic secretary is distributing literature and answering all correspondence. It hopes to land the little sawmill project for a starter, and has not given up the matter.

Story of The Storm

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 30.—A high northeast wind which blew over the bay between midnight and daylight Wednesday morning, inflicted damage to the amount of probably \$50,000. Vessels at anchor and moored to wharves were thrown about with violence. One life was lost. While trying to throw a line to a steam launch, Joseph Blackwell, a quartermaster on the transport Warren, at anchor in the stream off Folson street, lost his balance and fell into the bay.

The only vessel wrecked as a result of the gale was the bay schooner Fannie, which had taken on cargo of 70,000 feet of lumber for Stockton, and was lying at section A of the seawall. The Fannie now lies submerged, with a great part of the lumber floating in the bay.

The worst damage to any wharf was inflicted by State Pier Driver No. 2 upon Meigs' Wharf. The waves carried the pierdriver against the wharf with such force that the big stringers were quickly smashed, and a hole at least 15 feet deep through piles and heavy timbers was made before the gale subsided. The new Filbert-street wharf, now under construction, was damaged to the extent of about \$10,000. The barkentine City of Papete and the schooner Alice collided in Mission Bay, and dragged their anchors.

At Oakland long wharf, the force of the blow was hardly less severe than on this side of the bay, through few vessels were there to feel its effects. The bay schooner Carrie Bove, laden with 40 or 50 tons of scrap iron from the wreck of the May Flint, was capsized and went to the bottom with her load.

Mountain Peak Fell

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., Jan. 30.—The predicted storm did not materialize with the force expected here. Strong winds prevailed but as the shipping was warned no disasters are reported, though high seas are running off Cape Flattery. Meagre reports were brought in by Indians of a disastrous snow and landslide in the Olympic Mountains in the western portion of Jefferson County during last week's storm.

The earth trembled for fifteen minutes, followed by a rumbling noise and one of the peaks broke off, completely filling a small valley. It is not thought there was any loss of life, as the prospectors left with the first snow.

NEW ARMY RULES

For the Organization of Volunteer Forces.

Large Forces Reserve Volunteers to be Registered.

Adjutant-General Gantenbein is in Salem today, having returned Wednesday from Washington, D. C., where he appeared before the Auditor of the War Department in behalf of the Second Oregon Volunteers. By a recent ruling the volunteers are to receive pay from the State for their services, as well as from the government. During their service they were paid 52 cents per day, the regular government rate, and the rate for this state is \$1.50 a day which the men will now receive.

General Gantenbein was also to attend the Interstate National Guard Association at which was discussed and prepared a bill for presentation to the present congress. The main object of the bill is to increase the efficiency of the militia of the various states.

Provisions of the Bill. It provides that the regularly organized and uniformed active militia in the several states who participate in the apportionment of the annual appropriation provided by Congress shall constitute the active militia, and the organization, armament and discipline shall be the same as that of the regular and volunteer armies of the United States.

That whenever necessary the President may call forth such number of the organized militia as he may deem necessary, for a period not exceeding nine months.

That the Krag Jorgensen rifles shall be exchanged for the Springfield rifles at no cost to the state, the expense to be paid by the government. (This item means a saving of about \$24,000 to Oregon.)

Whenever the organized militia is sufficiently armed, equipped and uniformed for active duty in the field, encampments can be held in the various states, the expenses of which will be paid by the War Department. While in such camps or field service the men are to be allowed the same remuneration as received by corresponding officers and men in the regular army receive.

Reserve Volunteer Force.

For the purpose of securing a list of persons specially qualified to hold commissions in any volunteer force which may be called for by Congress, other than the active militia, boards of officers shall be convened at army posts in various parts of the United States, to examine National Guard officers and others as to their qualifications upon reports of these men being received and the positions to which they are best suited the secretary of war shall keep a register of the names. Such persons, having necessary physical requirements, shall be entitled to commissions in above named volunteer force, provided no such persons shall be entitled to receive a commission as second lieutenant after passing the age of 35; captain after the age of 40, Major, 45; Lieutenant-Colonel, 50 or Colonel after 55 years. Such appointments are to be distributed equally among the states contributing to the volunteer force available for immediate service when called for, the Secretary of War is authorized to enroll, not exceeding 100,000 men, who shall have served in the regular or volunteer armies or in the organized militia. The enrollment in each case shall continue for five years. Each person shall report at a specified place once a year, each so reporting to receive \$10 out of the appropriation for the pay of the army.

Salem Justice Court.

Justice of the Peace J. O'Donald decided Wednesday that in the case of John Wills versus Sing On, the garnishee of the funds in the hands of Ladd & Bush belonging to the Horst & Lachmann Co., should hold. He decided that this company is identical with Paul R. G. Horst & Co., and judgment for the sum demanded \$33.40 was

given. F. A. Turner and C. M. Inman were counsel for Wills and Geo. G. Bingham and W. H. Holmes for the defendants. The case will be appealed to the circuit court.

WADE'S LAST DAY

At 8 a m He Will Die With Dalton.

PORTLAND, Jan. 30.—At 8 o'clock tomorrow morning Jack Wade and William Dalton will pay the penalty imposed by the law, and the murder of James B. Morrow will have been legally avenged. Sheriff Frazier does not regard it as probable that Dalton's illness will be sufficiently serious to make it necessary to ask the Governor for a reprieve. In case such action is necessary the date of Wade's execution will also be postponed, and the double hanging will take place at a subsequent date.

In the office of the jailer are two plain black suits, which will be furnished the condemned men the morning of the execution. Tonight an extra guard will be placed on duty. He will spend the night directly in front of the cells occupied by the two murderers, and will not relax his vigil until the procession forms for the gallows.

If Dalton wishes, a spiritual advisor may accompany him to the scaffold. County Physician Harry McKay and Dr. Littlefield will be present, and will determine when life is extinct. After the bodies have been cut down they will be delivered to the Coroner. It is understood that Wade's body will be shipped to relatives in Pennsylvania, money having been deposited for that purpose with the Sheriff.

While Dalton is more or less ill, and suffers considerable pain from swollen tonsils, he is in a state of nervous prostration, and has all but collapsed. The fact that there is no hope has been forcibly brought to his mind, and it has unnerved him.

Despite the consolation Dalton professed to have found in religion, he never abandoned a forlorn hope that intervention by the Governor would commute the death penalty to life imprisonment. On the other hand, Wade gives every indication of going to the scaffold bravely, and no trouble is expected from him.

Marion County Courts.

An order has been made authorizing the sale of 200 acres of land belonging to the Thomas Palmer estate, for the purpose of meeting the claims against the estate, which amount to over \$700.

In the matter of the guardianship of Willie Juanita, Grace, Salina, and Clifford Eoff, the minor children of James T. Eoff deceased, a petition was filed asking the appointment of Mary E. Eoff to that position.

G. A. Fishburn administrator of the estate of Joseph Fishburn deceased has filed his final account.
