CONTRACTOR LUCAS DISCHARGED

Part of the Money Belonged to Him.

He Could not be Held on Charge of Embezzlement.

James S. Lucas was today released from the county jail, the charge of embezzlement against him being dismissed by Judge Judah at 10 o'clock this forenoon.

The trial has been warmly contested and is a victory for Mr. Lucas and his counsel Ford and Kaiser. The authority upon which Judge Judah finally decided the case is the Minnesota decision holding that property must belong entirely to other persons before a charge of embezzlement will stand.

At 10 o'clock this morning City Recorder Judah reconvened his justice's court, for the purpose of disposing of the Lucas embezzlement case. The state was represented by Deputy District Attorney McNary, and the defendant, Lucas, in person and by Mr. Ford as counsel. Before giving his decision, Mr. Judah stated in explicit terms that the case of the case upon which his decision was to be rendered, was never presented to the court or to the district attorney prior to the taking of testimony before the court, viz: That Mr. Lucas had a right interest in the money alleged to have been embezzled. In the original presentation of the case it was held by the private prosecutor that the money taken was wholly the property of Pugh & Van Patton. The testimony adduced the contrary circumstances that Lucas did have a definite interest in the fund made his discharge by this court obligatory in the light of all pertinent authorities under the code of Oregon. He was therefore discharged from custody.

After court had adjourned a reporter of Triadocal asked the justice for an expression upon the moral element involved in the case, to which he replied: "The immorality of the transaction was entirely manifest, but had to be waived in view of the wholly technical rulings under which the defendant attained his release. The principal of law that permits a man to convert any amount of money, the property of another, to his own use with impunity born of the fact that he has a right interest in the fund so converted is radically bad and can only be obviated by the strengthening of the Oregon statute for embezzlement by the introduction of an amendment that shall make him legally responsible for so much of a given sum as he shall deliberately steal."

other of the crime and acknowledged that they mistook young Morrow for a well known gambler, that he resisted and they shot him. As soon as the news of the capture became known a great crowd gathered at the jail and for a time mob law was imminent. But the authorities placed the murderers at the Armory for protection. On Monday, November 25th, Wade and Dalton were arraigned for murder before Judge Frazier and granted until Wednesday to plead. When brought before the court on Wednesday Wade pleaded guilty, to the surprise of the spectators, with the evident purpose of assuring the death penalty to Dalton, who pleaded not guilty. The case of Dalton was set for trial December 9th, at which time he declared that Wade was the man who did the killing. The 9th and 10th were taken up with securing a jury, and trying the case and at 11:45 on the morning of the 11th Judge Cleveland charged the jury who returned a verdict of guilty in ten minutes. The trial of Jack Wade was ordered for the following day, Thursday. The trial of the case occupied but two hours, during which time Wade made a statement that he was willing to atone with his own life for his crime. He was found guilty of murder by Judge Frazier and taken from court. On December 24th they were sentenced to be hanged.

Wade's Confession.

On Thursday, January 17th, Wade made the following confession: "I have known all along that there was no chance for me, and have wanted to see Dalton punished, too, because he gave us both away. But I have thought it over and concluded it is right for me to tell the truth. I fired the shot, but I did it accidentally. I did not want to kill Morrow, nor anybody, and would not have done it intentionally, even to save myself. I hope this will save Dalton. I am doing this because it is right and not because I am afraid to die. I can't see anything in it for me. All is true."

The scaffold was erected in the north west corner of the court yard and surrounded by a high board fence. There were two trapdoors and the condemned men stood side by side.

There were three cords, one of which sprung the trap, but which one the three men who cut them did not know. The two men were brought in from the rear and faced the spectators who occupied the space in front of the scaffold.

There has been some comment on the fact that two men were hanged for the same crime. Lying in wait for one man and killing another constitutes murder in the first degree, the penalty of which is hanging. Whether Wade or Dalton were principal or accessory cuts small figure. Both are murderers instinctively. The law in Oregon as interpreted by the State Circuit Court for the fourth judicial district has sent to the gallows at least three murderers who shot and killed persons whom they were not "laying for," notably Brown and Johnson in 1871, and Murray, the painter, some seven years later.

Portland's Last Hanging

The last hanging in Portland was nine or ten years ago, when Pello, an Indian, was hanged in the woodshed at the Courthouse for the murder of another Indian on the Umatilla Reservation at Pendleton. It was a United States case, and was tried in the United States Court here. Baron was United States Marshall at the time, and the hanging was conducted under his supervision. The execution was a complete success, there being no hitch in carrying out the order of the court. Pello took the affair stolidly, as with most Indians, although he had previously asked to be shot, saying that it was no disgrace to be shot, but a great disgrace to be hanged. His request could not, of course, be carried out, and the execution was conducted in the regularly prescribed form. Only 75 invitations were issued and the affair attracted comparatively little attention, the crime having been committed in Eastern Oregon, as the result of a quarrel the two Indians had. Hangings have been so scarce since then that people had almost come to believe there was no such thing possible.

BILL TO REPEAL WAR TAX

In the House--Taft Before the Senate.

Washington, Jan. 31.—A bill to repeal the war tax was introduced into the House this afternoon.

The measure was introduced by chairman Payne and is in accordance with the instructions made public yesterday. The bill repeals the Ways and Means committee was given rise to the charge that it was done for the purpose of reducing the revenues of the country to such an extent that it would be impossible or inadvisable to further reduce the revenues by granting any concession to Cuba. The measure is also said to be his purpose to send another message to Congress asking relief for Cuba. Payne denied both stories.

Governor Taft of the Philippines appeared before the senate committee on the Philippines this morning to testify as to the general condition of affairs in that archipelago and incidentally to tell what changes should be made in the present system of civil government in the islands. He began by dividing the islands into three classes. The provinces inhabited by Christians and the non-Christian provinces. He said a special form of government would be necessary for the Moro country.

The Municipal Governments, he said, were organized practically on the same plan as in the New England states. He said it was utterly impossible to put Filipinos over the Moros. The latter would obey his laws or chief but not a Filipino.

He said the committee would take up the Cuban question as soon as the testimony it had heard had been printed. He did not think the President will send another message on the matter as it might seem like an attempt to coerce or dictate.

DEMOCRATS FAVOR FUSION

May Put Up a Candidate for United States Senator.

S. L. Hayden returned from attending the Democratic State Central Committee meeting at Portland, and says there was a strong sentiment among those present for a Citizen's ticket for legislative, state and county officers, and in favor of placing a candidate for the United States Senate before the people.

Mr. Hayden says The Journal's plan of putting all state officials on a flat salary and turning all fees into the state treasury met with general favor and he believes it ought to be made a plank of the state platform.

HENRY GOES HUNTING

And Wilhelmina Sulks in Her Palace.

The Hagen, Jan. 31.—Rumors of renewed differences between Queen Wilhelmina and Prince Henry are current here. The Prince has gone to Mooklenborg on an indefinite hunt, while the Queen remains shut up in her palace and refuses to see anybody.

Kritzing's Case.

LONDON, Jan. 31.—The report that Commandant Kritzing, who was captured by General French, December 17, had been condemned to death, is not confirmed here.

It was announced from South Africa, January 29, that the trial would begin this week, but nothing has since been heard of his case.

European Oil Combination.

LONDON, Jan. 31.—A dispatch to the Central News from Amsterdam says that negotiations are proceeding for a general European oil combination, and that the Royal Petroleum Company has been approached by a London banking syndicate, which is financing the combination.

China Pays the Indemnity.

LONDON, Jan. 31.—The Treaty has notified the Bankers' Commission, cables the Shanghai correspondent of the Times that the first monthly installment of the Chinese indemnity to the powers will be paid tomorrow.

New York, Jan. 31.—A rumor that Charles M. Schwab had resigned as president of the United States Steel Corporation went through Wall street today, but it was denied by J. P. Morgan.

PARIS, Jan. 31.—Charles M. Schwab, president of the United States Steel Corporation, was seen here today in connection with the Wall street rumor that he had resigned the presidency of that concern. He refused to confirm or deny this report, saying, "I won't say anything."

Tawney's Bill Is Passed.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—The Tawney resolution which inquires into the right of the Senate and House to negotiate treaties with foreign countries affecting the revenues without acting as part of the House, passed the House this morning.
