FLAX INDUSTRY PROJECTED

Proposal to Establish Mill at Once.

Eugene Bosse of Belgium Makes Definite Proposal.

One of the most important propositions which has come before those who are working for the development of a Greater Salem is now before the people. Mr. Eugene Bosse, a flax manufacturer of North Belgium is in the city and proposes to establish a flax mill at once, provided a site can be secured. What Mr. Bosse asks is that the old wooden mill belonging to the Salem Flouring Mills Co. in North Salem, with power, be secured for his enterprise when he will at once procure seed from Belgium and proceed to put in a crop. Mr. Bosse does not desire any financial assistance whatever from the people of Salem. He merely wants a site and will at once proceed to institute a business which in proportion to the amount of money invested will do more to make Salem a live town than any other one industry which it is possible to locate here.

Mr. Bosse says: "the people with whom I am associated have determined to locate in Oregon. If Salem will give us the small inducement requested we shall locate here. If not we shall locate at Albany or perhaps Corvallis. And I may say also that the growth and manufacture of flax fibre, while it is the first thing to which I should turn my attention, would ultimately be a mere incident of the business, for in a short time we intend to establish linen mills, which I need hardly say would be of immense benefit to the city."

Mr. Bosse has been all through Canada investigating the conditions there and goes to Seio in a few days to look into the flax industry now operating there. An effort is being made to get the executive committee of the Greater Salem Commercial Club together that they may meet Mr. Bosse this evening and endeavor if possible, to arrange some means of securing to Salem this valuable industry.
