COLLEGE CONFERENCE CLOSES

Local Talent and Churchmen from the East.

More Big Subscriptions That Speak Well for Salem People.

The sessions of the Educational Convention in the interest of Willamette University closed with the meeting Wednesday night. The speeches by local talent and churchmen from the East proved a treat to all. The speakers introduced new ideas, new enthusiasm, and that succeeded in arousing some new interest in the welfare of the University. This fact was evidenced by the large contributions made toward the debt unsolicited, an aggregate of \$3000 being already pledged without conditions. A contribution of \$1000 was made by Rev. D. E. Watters, D. D. presiding elder of the Salem district. Mrs. D. H. Leach of East State street also presented \$100 to the fund. She is the wife of Rev. Leach, who has the North Yamhill charge. Previous to these gifts were the ones announced before: Gen. Odell \$1000; Mrs. W. H. Odell, \$500 and Dr. Coleman has secured \$1000.

A session of the convention was held at the church Wednesday afternoon, which was well attended.

In the evening Gen. W. H. Odell presided at the convention and the speakers were Gov. Geer and Dr. W. F. McDowell. The Governor's address was heard with close attention. His subject was the relation and benefit of education to the State.

Dr. Mills will deliver a lecture Monday night on "The Age in which we Live." Dr. Coleman is expected to arrive on Sunday.

Wreckage from Condon.

VICTORIA, B. C., Feb. 6.—Further wreckage, although of meager dimensions, has been found here. Today a small board, seemingly the lid of a box or some such article, together with the rim of a bluejacket's cap, drifted onto a beach near here. The point on the board is all but obliterated, but the letters "C. O. N." can be distinguished, and dots of white paint show that there has been other lettering. Naval men say it is the top of one of the Condon's provision chests. The steamer Queen City is expected tonight or tomorrow from the Vancouver Island Coast, and the cutter Grant is due to return.

Rush to Klondike on.

PORT TOWNSEND, Feb. 6.—The early rush for Klondike has started. The City of Seattle sailing north today carried 75 passengers most of whom are old timers. They had a number of dogs and their return North this early is due to the fact that they have word that new and rich diggings have been found and they want to be among the first to reach them. They refuse to give the locality of the new strike, but say it is quite a distance from Dawson, and this is the reason they are taking in a large number of dogs so as to lose no time in reaching the district.

Sybil Sanderson Sued

PARIS, Feb. 6.—The Civil Court today heard the claim of a Parisian lace manufacturer against Miss Sybil Sanderson for 18,951 francs for lace purchased in 1897. The defense of Miss Sanderson today said that she had been promised all the time she wanted in order to pay this amount, and as her income was only 50,000 francs, she wanted 10 years. The defendant also declared the prices on the lace to be exorbitant. The court will render judgment next week.

BLACK MAILING SCHEME

Worked by an Oregon Ex-Convict.

Upon an Unsuspecting Marion County Farmer.

It is believed there is another phase of the story of the arrest of Long and Darwitt of Butteville Tuesday than has yet appeared. It was first claimed that they were charged with the seduction of two Portland girls. Then the warrant of arrest charged Long with rape and Darwitt with lewd cohabitation.

Further light on the matter shows that it is probably nearly a black mailing scheme. Darwitt, or Davis, as he is known to the police, is from Portland and has been working for Long, who is quite a prosperous farmer in the north part of Marion county. From appearances it seems a scheme had been arranged between Davis and his partner in Portland to secure money from Long. The girls in the case are sisters, Minnie Bagley and Cecelia Ellingsworth, the latter having been married. They are honest hardworking women and support their aged parents. Davis represented to them that they could easily get work in Butteville, and while looking for a place could stay at Long's place, and the girls were entirely innocent, it is believed, of any complicity in the matter. Soon after their arrival in Butteville, complaint was filed with the Portland police, probably by Davis' partner charging the men with the crime. The girls said there could be no charge of seduction as they went there to find work and nothing was said about them marrying either of the men. Long has suffered from mental debility, having been released from the asylum only a year ago, and he probably was considered "easy money" in a blackmailing proposition. Davis was released from the penitentiary about six months ago and has a record for being a "tough customer."

S. L. Hayden of this city was engaged by Long as counsel and visited the county jail before they started to Portland to see Long. Davis called him to one side and told him he could easily make about \$500 out of Long if he wanted to do so, the suggestion going far to prove his idea of working a "graft."

Detectives Ford and Cordano took Long and Davis to Portland Wednesday evening in handcuffs. The women also returned home.

To any close observer it would look as though the Police Department of Portland was being used for some very nefarious purposes—at least occasionally.

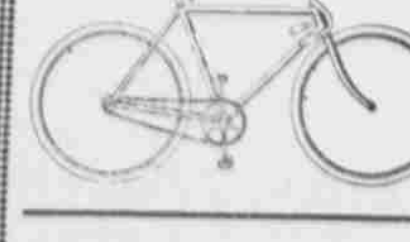
