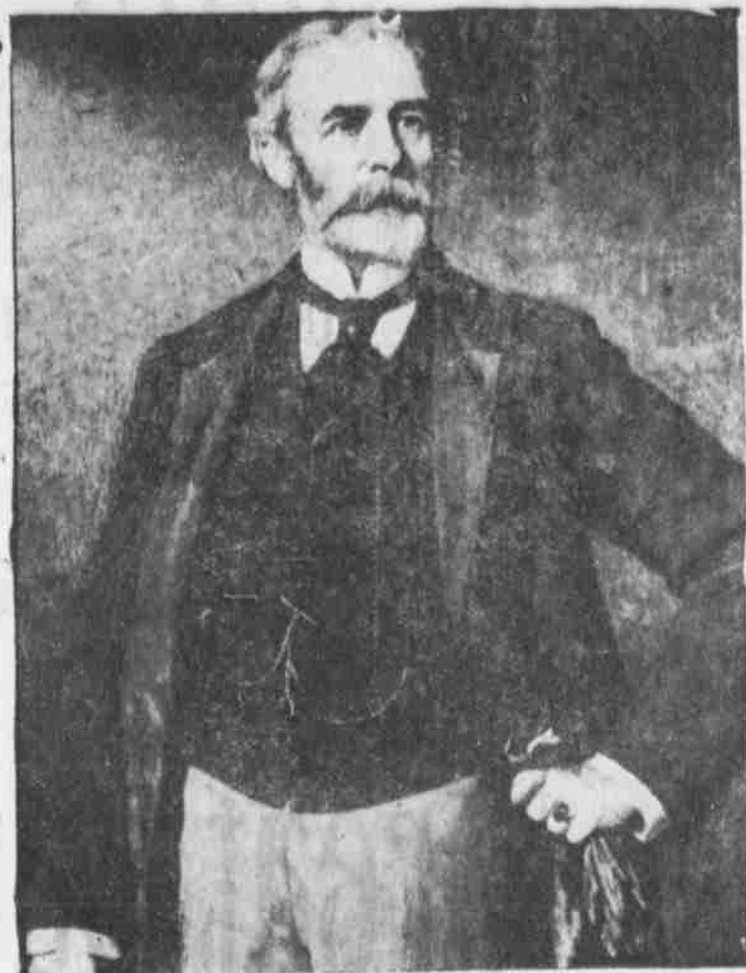


TO REPRESENT UNCLE SAM AT THE CORONATION GRAND

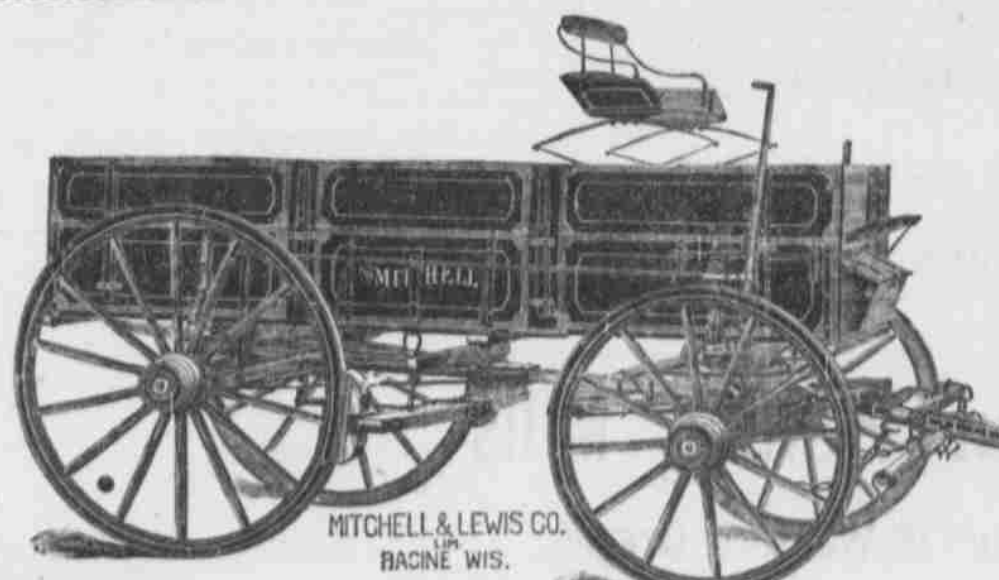

FOR MURDER

Lawyer Patrick. Accused of Killing His Aged Client. Now on Trial in New York—Famous Case Attracting Wide Attention Because of Sensational Details. His Friends Say it is Conspiracy.



The trial of Albert T. Patrick, lawyer for the murder of Wm. R. Rice, now going on in New York is one of the most sensational cases ever tried in this country. The accused is a prominent member of the New York bar. The dead man was his client and friend. He was at first supposed to have died a natural death, leaving most of his estate to Patrick. Afterward the valet Jones confessed to being an accomplice in the murder of his master, naming Patrick as the principal in the crime. Patrick's friends say a big conspiracy on the part of Rice's heirs to do away with the lawyer is the cause of the accusation. John J. Milliken, the famous New York millionaire, is a brother-in-law of Patrick.
