EDITORIAL

ONE ON THE OTHER SIDE

While there is a great deal published in the partisan papers about General Odell and the abuses of the school land department—abuses by private citizens more than by officials—there is one on the other side.

There was once a Wagon Road corporation that was trying to steal 200,000 acres of land grant lands and he exposed the job and sprung a resolution in a Republican state convention exposing the steal.

He followed it up and after the campaign opened he went all over the state and denounced the steal and finally went to Washington and showed it up after it had passed the lower house and beat it in the senate.

The state was saved that land and it was worth a million dollars to the state and so far as we know he is the only prominent Oregon Republican who ever did interfere with land frauds at the national capital.

This paper will not defend any public official caught doing wrong or even if it believes he is doing wrong and has not been caught and exposed.

But it believes in treating such veterans as General Odell with a little consideration, especially as the people need the most conservative and religious Republicans to the front to get any reform.

A FARICAL ELECTION LAW.

In Portland all voters are urged to register, as they will not be permitted to vote at the primary election unless registered according to law for the June election.

In Marion county it is not proposed to enforce registration prior to attending the primary. The primaries will be rather free and easy and many will help nominate who will not be legally entitled to vote for the candidate they help nominate.

The whole present registration law is a farce. It compels citizens who have been voters for a life time to register each year at the county seat or before a notary or justice.

It is a grand good law to cut down the number of persons who will vote or take any interest in elections. It is a law to keep the largest number of citizens possible from voting.

The law should be repealed and the provision for registration in the original Australian ballot laws enacted in its stead. That brings out the fullest vote without expense or trouble to the citizen to register.

STATE BOARD IS NOT EASY

The promoters of large irrigation schemes have not found the present state school land board easy to work, and if this paper were purely mercenary it would keep still about this.

Companies asking title to tracts from ten to eighty thousand acres of arid lands in Oregon have been besieging the state officials for an easy contract under the Carey law.

The state officials out of a conscientious regard for duty have insisted on a contract that would protect the state and the future home maker on the irrigated lands.

The land-operators want to put in constructive and estimated expenses incurred or not incurred in putting water on the land, and under the law that would become a lien against the land forever.

The arid land operators are huffy because the state land board insist on a contract that will protect the state of irrigated lands against extortion. They undoubtedly think such men unfit to hold office.

A POLICY OF NON-ABUSE.

Published at the state capital and interested only in getting the best possible service out of public officials, The Journal cannot engage in blackening men's characters when they do well at least part of the time.

It will not engage in the partisan and

fractional warfare on state and county officials simply for the purpose of driving them out of office to make room for other aspirants.

Few men are so prone to bad work but that they are right at least part of the time. Why not give them credit for doing some good and get them to do better?

Occasionally there is an official who has few if any redeeming features and such must be used as a horrible example to keep others from wrong-doing.

Take even Jos. Simon. His severest critics must admit that he had the courage and the nerve to vote against tariffs on the Philippines and Porto Rico, and the supreme court of the United States upheld him.

Those who seek to blacken men like General Odell and Governor Geer forget their long service in public affairs. They deserve at least kindly treatment at the hands of their fellow Republicans.

The people want the best service possible out of their public officials. They want a free press to show up the evils in the public service. It is possible to do the latter and yet treat men with courtesy.

So THE JOURNAL will not join in the continuous newspaper detraction so familiar in Oregon, so long as the good record an official makes overbalances the bad even a little bit.

There may be better men for all these offices and there no doubt are, but so there might be worse. Where will you get off at?

SUPPORTING FORTY CENT REPUBLICANS

WILL POOL ON SUGAR SALES.

The preliminaries of a combination of northern jobbers who will maintain the price of sugar were arranged at San Francisco this week. Prominent jobbing houses of Spokane, Seattle, Tacoma and Portland were represented and the probabilities are that they will be able to control the price of the sweet commodity throughout Oregon and Washington.

The northern dealers have combined with the pool already formed by the California jobbers. It is the purpose of the pool to regulate the price along the entire Pacific slope as far east as Utah in order to do this the jobbers controlling this territory have entered into an agreement to maintain such schedule price as shall be adopted by the pool.

The price as heretofore will be determined by the refineries, but it is the intention of the jobbers to add an additional one-eighth to one-quarter of a cent per pound in order to reimburse themselves for the expenses of handling. The jobbers claim that they have handled sugar on such a narrow margin that for not only ceased to be a profit in its sale for them, but that it had even become a source of expense.

In many cases sugar had become a "leader" to induce the retailer to buy other commodities.

Whether or not the pool will succeed in its undertaking remains to be seen. This is not the first comb nation which has been formed among the jobbers for this purpose, but it is the largest and strongest one so far, including every prominent jobbing house in the territory covered.

The date for the intended raise in price has not yet been determined.

When the price is finally fixed and the pool closed a sugar stock for jobbing purposes will be kept at Salem. This is a case where Salem profits by a trust extending its operations.
