DAWSON IN AN UPROAR

Miners Condemn Canuck Government.

CHICAGO, Feb. 18.—Advices from Dawson, via Skagway, according to a Seattle special to the Chronicle, state that an order which arrived from Ottawa recently gives to the Treadgold Water & Mining System possession of all vacant ground and all ground to become vacant in the richest portion of the Klondike. Canadians have joined Americans in expressions of indignation, and will leave for other goldfields.

This includes Eldorado creek, the richest in the world. This leaves of the paying creeks only Dominion, Gold-run, and Sulphur, and Indian River, that will remain open.

ALBANY CHAIR FACTORY

Construction will begin at Once.

ALBANY, Feb. 19.—Yesterday the deed from A. Hackleman to R. F. C. and R. A. B. Veal was filed, transferring 4½ acres of land on East Sixth street. This property will be used by Veal & Sons for the site of their new chair factory. The work of constructing the buildings will commence at once and will be superintended by the firm. The plant will consist of three large buildings, one 60x120 feet, and two others 50x100, a dry kiln 30x60, office building, engine room, boiler room and lumber sheds. A saw mill with a capacity of 12,000 feet of hardwood lumber per day will also be erected.

The buildings will be painted and finished in good shape, the interior of all structures to be thoroughly painted with fire proof paint. They will be specially constructed so as to prevent a large loss by fire. A complete waterworks system and electric light plant will be operated at the factory. A tank with a capacity of 20,000 gallons of water will be erected, and every building will be connected to it with mains. The buildings will be ready for occupancy within 90 days. The entire plant when completed will employ nearly 150 hands, and will be the largest chair factory west of Chicago.
