CONFESSES TO THE DEED

Valet Jones Tells How Rice Died.

New York, Feb. 21.—Chas. Jones, the valet of millionaire Wm. Rice, for whose murder lawyer Albert Patrick is being tried, continued today his confession, the climax of which came yesterday when he said he chloroformed the aged man while he lay asleep.

Jones began today's testimony by recounting the number of telegrams he had to send to friends of Rice after the old man's death. The telegrams simply announced that Rice was dead and that death was due to a weak heart and old age. He said to his knowledge Patrick had never met Rice but had seen him twice.

Oklahoma, Arizona and New Mexico

House Committee Reports Favorably.

Indian School Said to be Immoral.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—The House committee on territories by a unanimous vote today decided to report favorably on the bills for admission to statehood of Oklahoma, Arizona and New Mexico.

Immoral School.
During the consideration of the Indian Appropriation bill today by the House the subject of the immorality alleged to be rampant at Mt. Pleasant, Mich., Indian school was again taken up. The reports of Indian Inspector O'Connell, which corroborated the charges that the school made no attempt to prevent the mingling of the sexes at the institution, were read.

The House this afternoon passed the India Appropriation bill and adopted a resolution to investigate Nardin's administration of the Mt. Pleasant School.

Taft's Testimony.
Governor Taft began his testimony on the House side today, appearing before the committee on Foreign affairs to discuss the question of Chinese Exclusion. He said the Filipinos did not object to Chinese laborers but to Chinese merchants. Taft himself favored the general exclusion of all Chinese.

OREGON FISH REPORT

Salmon Planted in the Columbia.

DALEY DIED GAME

Paid the Penalty at San Quentin.

SAN QUENTIN, Cal., Feb. 21.—Isaac Daley was hanged here this morning for the murder of Lemuel Watts in Le-moore, Kings County, July 10, 1900. After a quarrel over a twenty-five cent bill for repairing a wheel, Daley secured a shot-gun and returning shot Watts in the back while the latter was at work. He died game.

FIGHTING IN COLOMBIA.
Forces of Castro and Herrera Engaged Near Agua Dulce.
PANAMA, Colombia, Feb. 21.—It is positively known here that the forces under the government General Castro and the revolutionary General Herrera are fighting.

General Salazar, U. S. recently appointed Governor of Panama, has called his acceptance, and is due here next week.
The Colombian Government had perfected arrangements with a British steamship company to transport reinforcements to General Castro, when, at the last moment, the agent of the company's acting cruiser Amphion, refused to permit the company's steamer to move the troops in question.

BLOCKS RUSSIA'S GAME

Russo-Chinese Alliance not Approved

By the United States--Protest Has Been Made.

With Anglo-Jap Alliance will be Effective.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—At the State Department it is admitted that the text of the notes of the protest sent by Hay to China and Russia which were published on Thursday are substantially correct. While the outcome is still in doubt and it is impossible to determine whether or not Russia and China have ceased from their secret negotiations, it is believed that the action of the State Department taken with the formation of the Anglo-Japanese alliance will go far toward putting an end to the Russian machinations, at least along this line.

"L" Yards Fire in Gotham

New York, Feb. 21.—Fire in the "L" yards at Fifth Avenue and Thirty-sixth street at midnight caused a quarter of a million damage.

GHASTLY FIND IN GOTHAM

New York, Feb. 21.—The body of an unknown man horribly slashed by a knife was found in the North River today. The face was crushed in, there were stab wounds in the breast, the throat was cut, and the top of the skull was cut off and missing.

SPANISH CRISIS IMMINENT

Spread of Barcelona Strike

Causes Grave Anxiety--A Revolution.

May be the Outcome of the Trouble.

MADRID, Feb. 21.—The strike situation has become so serious at Saragossa that martial law has been proclaimed there. The strike still continues to spread. Valls, Villefranche, Lasnor, Cuenca, Llobregat and Cardener are all affected and there is no telling where the movement may end. Should the Carlists seize this opportunity to hoist their flag Spain may be the scene of a revolution in the near future.

From Barcelona.
LONDON, Feb. 21.—Barcelona dispatched dated yesterday fails to confirm the report of a serious collision between troops and strikers in which five hundred were killed or wounded. The dispatch declares that up to last night only forty had been killed since the rioting began. A few rioters were killed on Thursday while attempting to take a number of their comrades from jail.

A Madrid dispatch says the condition of Barcelona is improving this morning though the danger is still great. Arrests of anarchists continue. Stringent measures are being taken to protect trade and traffic. Food is extremely scarce, however, and the distress is increasing. The soldiers who are known to be lukewarm in their allegiance to the government have been approached by Republican leaders and urged not to use their arms against the strikers.

A heavy rain last night had the effect of dispersing the rioters, but there were a number of collisions during the earlier hours. Trains cannot enter the city, the rails having been torn up.

Trouble at Seville.
SEVILLE, Feb. 21.—Anarchists are attempting to incite an uprising among workmen here and at Huelva.

Body Cut to Pieces

One of the trainmen on the north-bound passenger train which passed through Eugene this afternoon at 1:42 o'clock told of a most shocking death which occurred to a young man at Talent, the first station this side of Ashland, some time last night says the Guard of Thursday.

As the passenger train reached Talent about 4 o'clock this morning the engineer saw the remains of a man lying on the track ahead of him. He stopped the train and the crew found the body crushed and mangled in a horrible manner, a freight train having run over the young man who was only about 20 years old. The head was completely severed from the body and had rolled down a steep embankment. One arm and one leg were cut off and the body badly cut up.

The young man was well dressed and had considerable money in his pockets. The trainmen did not learn his name. The remains were left near the track for the coroner's jury to deliberate over.

BOISE WRECKERS BUSY

Epidemic of Dynamite Explosions in Idaho

BOISE, Idaho, Feb. 21.—Boise was shaken at 8:40 o'clock last night by another dynamite explosion, which makes three of the kind that has taken place this week. The one of last night was of tremendous force and occurred near the military reservation on the ground occupied by the Boise Gun club. The costly trap of the club was blown to atoms and the loss will be \$350.

All the residences in the neighborhood were more or less shaken by the explosion. The party or parties who are engaged in this devilish work will be hard to apprehend, for they select the extreme portion of the city where there is no police surveillance, and have no difficulty to escape.

The first explosion which occurred Monday night was at Sixteenth and Front, the second at South Thirteenth, and Grand, and last night near the entrance to Cottonwood gulch—all isolated parts of the city.

NEAR AN UNDERSTANDING.

Hanna Hopeful of Results of Labor Arbitration.

New York, Feb. 21.—Senator Hanna, who presided yesterday at the meeting of the executive committee of the National Civic Federation, said today: "As to the results of the meeting, I am highly gratified. It shows an increasing interest in our work. The fact that 30 out of 36 members were present, many coming from a great distance, shows but one thing, and that is that labor and capital are closer to an understanding. Among those present the greatest enthusiasm prevailed, and all seemed impressed with the same purpose. As to the permanent results? Well, I am not able to say anything as to that. All I can do is to hope.

The repeatedly futile efforts to bring labor and capital to an understanding make no doubt any new plan. Individually, however, I have every confidence in the efforts of the National Civic Federation, and as yet I see nothing that should discourage us."

DETROIT, Feb. 21.—Additional warrants were issued today for Vice-president Frank Andrews and Cashier Henry Andrews of the wrecked City Savings Bank. The charge is uttering false statements of the bank's condition. Frank Andrews is still in jail, and the cashier is at home mysteriously ill. It is now stated that Frank Andrews hypothecated at least \$600,000 worth of securities which the authorities are unable to locate.
