GREATER SALEM RACES
Early Closing Stakes for Oregon State Fair Announced.

The speed committee of the State Board of Agriculture has announced the following early closing stakes for the Oregon State Fair of this year:

Greater Salem stake, for 2:18 pacers, \$2000.
Capital City stake, for 2:24 trotters, \$1000.
Webfoot stake, for 3-year-old trotters, \$500.
Inland Empire stake, for 3-year-old pacers, \$500.
Illibeek stake (added), for 2-year-old runners, \$300.

Announcement will be made later on of the complete list of stakes and purses for the events of the entire week. Entries for the early closing stakes must be made on or before April 15.

The Greater Capital City stake, subscribed by the citizens of Salem is the largest ever offered on this coast, and the race horses men of this city are of the opinion that horses from all parts of the Pacific Slope will be entered in the event. Already entries have been made from Utah, Colorado, Montana and California, as well as from all of the Northwest states and British Columbia.

Secretary M. D. Windom, of the State Board of Agriculture, is of the opinion that the racing at the state fair this year will be "the best ever." On account of the large purses offered and the excellent circuit which has been arranged, horsemen from all parts of the country have turned their eyes towards the Northwest, and many of them will be here with record-breaking animals.

First Motor Cycle in Salem
Millard, better known as Eli Lee, on the road for Mitchell, Lewis, Staver Co. came up from Portland today with one of the new motor cycles sold by that house. ALBANY OPERA HOUSE
Will be an Accomplished Fact.

ALBANY, Feb. 25.—Yesterday afternoon the contract was signed for the construction of the of the new opera house. H. R. Schultz, after considering the bids several days, awarded it to John McCheeny, the well known contractor, and the papers were signed. The contractor has until July 1 to complete the structure.

Work on the building will begin at once and no time will be lost in finishing it. The building is designed by Chas. H. Burggraf, the architect, and is a model of neatness. The stage is 30x50, with a height of 45 feet, giving ample room for the best productions. The pit will have a capacity of 400 and will be seated with steel frame opera chairs. A commodious and convenient gallery with ample elevation will seat about as many more.

On each side of the stage neat and tasty private boxes for parties will add materially to the beauty of the interior. The lower floor will have sufficient elevation to make every seat desirable. The latest and best scenery will be placed on the stage, and when completed Albany will have one of the best opera houses on the coast.

It will cost about \$5900. Although the contract price is only \$3900, yet the furnitures, fixtures, heating, plumbing and stage fittings will swell the cost to the greater sum. This city has been sorely in need of an opera house for several years, and at last through the untiring work of Messrs. Burggraf and Schultz it will soon have one.

Lane County Golden Wedding
