EDITORIAL

WHAT HAS BECOME OF THE HI PLUMMER LETTER.

Hi Plummer was in town last night. Has that feature of the Republican newspaper fight on Geer at Salem dropped? Has the man who saw the papers and would publish them forgotten all that he published? Was it all a bluff? Is he bluffing in other matters, or has Geer promised him an office? A fight on a bad man to be effective should not be dropped at its most interesting point by a reform newspaper trying to purify the Republican party lest the suspicion be permitted to grow that the reformer is fading the party too pure to suit his fastidious taste.

THE CASE OF THE ANTIS GETTING DESPERATE.

If all that is being said by some of the Republican papers derogatory of Governor Geer and some other officials is true, those papers did the state a grave injustice when they advocated their election. An apology is due the people of Oregon from them.—The Dallas Times-Morning, Dem.

Perhaps the fact that the officials did not prove as useful and profitable to the Republican push has something to do with the fight on them at Salem. As we look at it the outlook for the disgruntled Republican push is not brilliant. If Geer goes in few changes will be made and they will get nothing. If Chamberlain or Farnish go in the Democrats will have something to say and the anti will have no room for consolation. Their case is desperate either way.

MORE THAN CAMPAIGN PROMISES REQUIRED.

THE JOURNAL is an independent paper and has written a letter to all the Republican candidates asking them what they propose to do on the question of putting all state officials on a flat salary and turning all fees into the state treasury? Also what they will promise in the way of putting the state affairs on a thoroughly business basis? It expects to get some good letters from the gentlemen who want to become governor. Political platform promises count for very little with the people, any more than do pledges made on the canvass—for instance Dr. Smith's pledges sincerely made in the last county campaign. If a man of his ability and political sagacity, placed in a prominent position as he was on the Chairmanship of the appropriations committee, could not keep his pledges, what can the people expect of less determined men who make platform and campaign promises? A business program to be effective in state politics has got to be put through the county and state conventions and the state and legislative candidates must be men of such character and stamina that no small personal advantage will swerve them from a sense of duty to the over-burdened taxpayer.

THE GROWING TRADE OF SALEM.

This has been one of the stormiest weeks of the winter—rainy and blustery day and night—yet there has been a good run of retail trade at the Capital City.

Several of the retailers have had special sales with good success and their stores have been filled with customers—this in spite of the fact that it is the dull month in the year, lent and sickness. The trade of this city has developed to the point where there is no longer a dull season. The fruit industry has grown so that the first half of the year is full of business as the harvest season in fall.

There are more people on salary at Salem, counting the city, county, school and state departments, and the federal work, than in any city in the northwest. These people spend their money at all seasons.

The live business man or woman is after the public with inducements for business. Such firms make new business and bring business to Salem. They are public benefactors as much as any college or factory.

MISS SHIRLEY IN CLEAN DRAMAS

Miss Shirley (Mrs. Smith) deserves the thanks of every clean-minded man and woman for her demonstrations that all dramas worthy of the name can be placed on the stage in a manner not inconsistent with the requirements of art and yet be perfectly pure, moral and elevating.

She played last season at Salem, Wyck's Country Wife, one of the most malicious comedies of the Restoration in a manner that was full of all its intended charm and humor but without a breath or word of offense.

The play of Nell Gwynne Wednesday night was of the same character the part of a reputed mistress of King Charles, surrounded with low court intrigue and scandal yet presented as fresh and pure as a rose from the garden.

The actor or actress who cannot rise above catering to the clamor for what is low in humanity and caters to the coarseness in life, is not true to histrionic art.

Miss Shirley deserves the commendation of all thinking people, whether they attend theatres or not, for her nobility in the direction of a purified stage. It is so easy and cheap, and yet profitable to go in the other direction.

But who would be benefited by the innuendos and suggestions that might be thrown by a clever actress into such characters as are above referred to? Not manhood or womanhood in any walk of life.

ADMISSION TO LAW SCHOOLS.

During the last three or four years at meetings of the bar associations and legal educators throughout the country, the question, what amount of preliminary training should a student have before entering upon the study of law? has given rise to much discussion. Probably more than 75 per cent of those admitted to the bar at present are graduates of law schools or men who have studied for some time at a law school. The standard of preliminary examination before county and state boards throughout the country is in most cases considerably lower than that required for graduation from the average high school, and in many localities it amounts to little more than a grammar school examination. In some law schools of the United States, of which there are now over one hundred, the requirements for admission vary from a common school education to a college degree.

Each year this subject gives rise to numerous articles, papers, and discussions as to what standard would be the most fair for all desiring to enter one of the large schools. No satisfactory solution to the problem has yet been reached, and the difference of opinion are perhaps greater now than ever. Some advocate the requiring of college degrees, many think the training necessary to pass the average college entrance examination sufficient, while others would have each applicant take a special course of a few years in college, and still others think a common school education is sufficient.

- IX.—Hot Air Chapter of the Amalgamated Order of Get Rich Quick Protectors in Black Maria—typifying Prosperity.
- X.—Practical Politicians in carriages with appropriate banners.
- XI.—One hundred thousand historical novelists on foot.

At the conclusion of the parade Hon. Richard Croker will deliver an oration in his well-known personal style on civic purity as a factor in our national life.

vention, and that may be accomplished by taking a proper position upon the Philippine question. It is useless to expect the American people to relinquish the islands, hence why carry the dead body of an issue that is a corpse and cannot be revived?

Suppose the Oregon democracy proclaim to the world that it is the demand of this state that the policy of the federal government be not abandonment, but proper recognition of the rights of the islanders, the just alteration in tariff schedules, the carrying out of the promises to the Cubans, the pursuing, in short, of a policy such as is based upon consideration of the wishes of the people who appear to have been bound to us by the ties that are not severable, and yet have sacred rights.

Suppose the Oregon democracy does this. Would it not have the same moral effect upon the east, in influencing national pronouncements, as the acts of the Oregon republicans have upon the trend of sentiment in that party throughout the country.

This, with such a position upon the trusts and tariff reduction as the present status suggests, will place the democracy in the vantage place, and create some confidence that success may come efforts in the 1904 campaign.

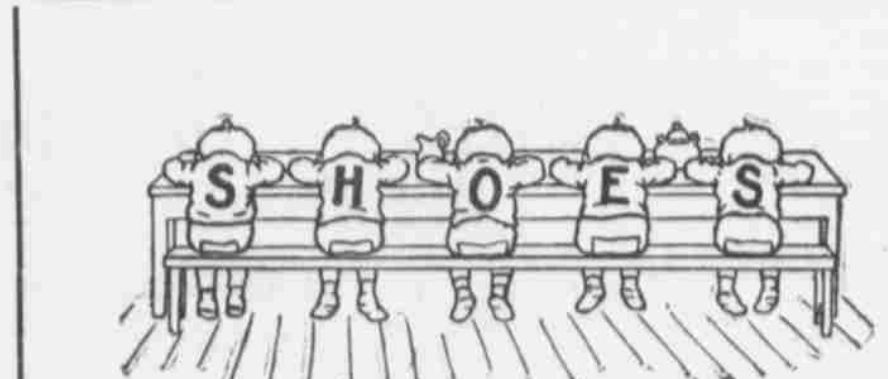
