ACTION OF PORTLAND MINISTERS.

Rev. Cline on behalf of the Portland
ministers association reported Monday
the action of a committee of ministers
who waited on Mayor Howe and asked
him to approve of the new high license
ordinance.

This is a change of front of some of the
clergy who have in the past looked upon
high license advocates as being in league
with the evil one to deprive morality
and degrade humanity.

The facts seem to be that high license
makes it impossible to run saloons out-
side the thickly settled business parts of
a city. Under high license saloons in
suburbs cannot exist if those suburbs are
taken into the city with the understanding
that no licenses shall be granted in the
residential portions.

The action of the Portland ministers,
in recommending high license to the
Mayor of that city is a step in a new
direction, and indicates a break from the
ranks of the prohibition party.

**CITY
COUNCIL
PROCEEDINGS**

**Largely Taken Up With Wind
Exercises.**

The regular session of the city council
Tuesday evening was much given over
to rambling discourses, that occasionally
had to be pulled down by Mayor Bishop,
although good careful business judg-
ment prevailed as usual.

The city fathers assembled finally fixed
the official grade of High street at the
intersection of Ferry, at 35 feet, instead
of 36.

In the matter of securing a public
dumping ground for the city, the place
selected is that portion of Liberty street
lying between the south line of Ferry
street and the grade of the Southern
Pacific railway company on Trade street,
as a public dumping ground for all clean
and healthful refuse matter and that
provisions be made for the dumping
upon these grounds of any garbage
or waste substances likely to create foul
odors and unhealthful influences, a
penalty to be imposed for the violation
thereof.

The Greater Salem Commercial Club
presented a communication to the coun-
cil pledging their support in the matter
of cleaning the streets and alleys of the
city, and other means of municipal im-
provement.

A petition was presented and referred
to the proper committee relating to the
painting of the Yew Park hose house. It
is to be painted with good paint and re-
ceive two coats, except on the south
side, where it will receive three coats,
the cost of the work not to exceed \$200.

A petition was filed, and promised im-
mediate attention, for the rebuilding of
the sidewalk along the north side of
Ferry street, between Commercial and
Liberty streets.

The old hand engine now stored in the
Salem fire department is ordered re-
moved to the Yew Park hose house, for
safe keeping and as there is more room
for its disposal there.

It was ordered that the fumigating
lamp of the city be placed at the disposal
of the citizens of the city who have
been afflicted with contagious diseases.
The physicians especially are to have the
benefit of it. The disinfectants to be
used in it are to be paid for by the one
using it.

The matter of the cess pool over the
cross-walk on Winter and State streets,
caused by the low grade of the street
and the little car track turning so
near the curb, is to be taken up by the
committee on streets and public property
with the superintendent of the S. L. P.
& T. Co.

The city will make arrangements with
the county court if possible to secure
their rock crusher for a few weeks, un-
til such time as it is needed by the
county, and use it to improve the streets
of the business part of town.

The opinion of W. H. Holmes regard-
ing the authority of the city to act in
the matter of cleaning and grading the
alleys of the city, was unanimously ac-
cepted. After discussing the manner of
proceeding with the work, it was
ordered that the committee on streets
and public property engage a civil en-
gineer to survey the alleys and establish
an official grade for each, when the
matter will be again taken up.

The only bills ordered paid were: T. S.
Burroughs, \$2; N. J. Judah, \$8.70.

**Rescued from
the Floods.**

The members of the Salem fire de-
partment had a drill Tuesday night of
an unusual character. Instead of ex-
tinguishing a blaze they were making
it possible for a fire to be kept burning.
As the result of imperfect drainage and
recent copious rains, the basement at
the city hall became flooded and but for
the service of the department, the keep-
ing of a fire in the furnace and the
warming of the large structure would
necessarily have been abandoned. The
faithful Sibley engine was employed
for the major part of the night in pump-
ing water from the basement. The flood-
ing of the I. O. O. F. Temple basement,
the result of the insufficient drainage,
has also prevented the keeping of fire
in that building for a number of days.

**ANOTHER
INTEREST
SUIT**

**Over the Illegally Deposited
State Funds.**

**Will be Heard Today Before
Circuit Judge Boise.**

The case of Theodore Nolf versus the
Williams & England Banking Co., is for
the purpose of obtaining an order of the
court requiring the repayment of inter-
est paid on state moneys deposited in
the bank.

These claims were formerly allowed by
Judge Boise, but a recent decision based
upon the objections of Ladd & Bush,
finds that the deposits were state funds
unlawfully deposited on which interest
was asked.

These claims are as follows:
E. C. Giltner, agent, \$25,000 00
Phil Metachan, state treasurer, \$5,613 60
Phil Metachan, " " 789 73
W. H. Odell, " " 5,047 27
E. J. Swafford, " " 7,349 33

The last sum was deposited by Mr.
Swafford while city treasurer. The claim
of Odell was fully justified by
Judge Boise in his decision.

Nolf the petitioner in this case, was a
depositor in the sum of \$600.

As the state funds were unlawfully
deposited, he represents that in justice
to all other creditors, the receiver, W.
T. Slater, be enjoined from making fur-
ther payments until the court so orders.

That Metachan be required to reimburse
the receiver on account of all moneys
wrongfully diverted from the general
fund and obtained by him and that the
receiver retain any money found law-
fully due to Metachan or Giltner so as to
reimburse the fund in his hand on ac-
count of all money so wrongfully re-
tained by him. He also asks that the
receiver be required to bring action
against all obtaining money unlawfully,
as said Metachan & Giltner. All funds
so received to be divided pro rata
among the several claimants lawfully
entitled to receive same.

John H. and C. L. McNary are at-
torneys for Nolf, L. R. Webster and Car-
son & Adams for Giltner; L. H. Mc-
Mahon for Odell; Carson & Adams for
Swafford, Baker and the same with
Webster for Metachan.

Notice of appeal to the supreme court
from the recent decision of Judge Boise
has been filed, in the case of J. A. Baker
v. the Williams & England Banking Co.
The decision was based on the petition
of Ladd & Bush, creditors of the bank,
that no interest be paid upon the claims
of Phil Metachan, E. C. Giltner, W. H.
Odell E. J. Swafford and the petition
was granted by Judge Boise.
