

TARIFF BILL IS NOW LAW

Twenty Five Per Cent Reduction

The Vote as Taken was 138 to 109.

Senate Considering War Tax Repeal.

WASHINGTON, March 4.—The House by a vote of 138 to 109 approved the conference report of the Philippine Tariff bill which now becomes law. It provides in the main a reduction of 25 per cent on existing duties. The Senate committee on finance today considered the bill passed by the House providing for the repeal of the war revenue tax. No conclusion was reached but it is believed the committee will report the bill without change.

Squadron Goes South.

WASHINGTON, March 4.—Word has been received by the Navy Department that the North Atlantic squadron sailed yesterday from Cienfuegos, Cuba, for Colombia. The squadron is composed of the battleships Kearsarge, Alabama, Massachusetts and Indiana, the most powerful ever assembled in these waters by the United States. Its presence, it is believed, will have a quieting effect and prevent any damage to American property interests.

Fighting in Colombia.

WASHINGTON, March 4.—The American minister at Bogota, Colombia, has telegraphed the State Department that five hundred of the best soldiers in Colombia have re-enforced the government troops near Bogota. Fighting has continued for several days.

Extradition Papers Issued.

WASHINGTON, March 4.—Extradition papers were issued at the State Department today to Detective Sergeant Joseph Day of Portland, Ore., for Charles and Frankie Savage, colored, now in the hands of the police in Montreal, Canada, for the alleged theft of \$11,000 worth of cut diamonds, said to have been stolen from A. L. Lowenthal.

DETAILS OF MOODY'S VICTORY

Has 72 Votes, County Convention Saturday.

THE DALLIES, Ore., March 4.—Completed returns from Saturday's Republican primary were filed here today from outlying precincts. Of the 107 voters in the county convention, 72 are claimed by the Moody supporters, and 34 by Williamson. There is one vote in the hands of the police in Montreal, Canada, for the alleged theft of \$11,000 worth of cut diamonds, said to have been stolen from A. L. Lowenthal.

Terrific Storm in Mexico.

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, March 4.—The first news of a terrific wind storm that swept over Monterey, Mexico, Thursday and Friday, was brought to the city last night by passengers from Mexico. The storm began Thursday morning, increasing in fierceness until Friday, and at times was cyclonic in strength. No lives were lost in the city as far as is learned, but the property damage was very heavy. Roofs were torn from business houses and the walls of a number of large brick structures blown in, doing great damage to stocks of goods. The damage will foot up over half a million dollars.

CUNARD LINER IS SAFE

Tidings of the Etruria Received.

New York, March 4.—A dispatch from Faval says the missing Cunard liner has been sighted in the town of the steamer William Cliff, four hundred miles to the west. The Etruria reported she had lost her propeller.

ROME, March 4.—The Pope today celebrated private mass with his household and a few intimate friends. He returned thanks for being allowed to celebrate his jubilee.

War Eagle Sold.

VANCOUVER, B. C., March 4.—It is reported here that the War Eagle mine at Roseland, one of the most extensive properties in the Kootenay country, has been sold to a company of London capitalists. No details of the deal are given, except that the stated price is about \$3,000,000.

HANDS ACROSS THE SEA

Germany Would Join With U. S.

St. Louis March 4.—During the course of a brief address at St. Louis Club Prince Henry partly said "You all

know who I represent in this country and I wish to state that Germany is not wooing the United States but she is ready when hands are held out to her to clasp them across the Atlantic. I represent a fighting nation but my sovereign has endeavored since he ascended the throne to maintain peace and this he will continue to do."

FRISCO RAILWAY COMPANY

Formed to Work with the Santa Fe.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 4.—The Oakland and East Side Railway Company was incorporated by a realty syndicate of Oakland today for the purpose of acquiring franchise rights by way of the California and Nevada Railway Company between point Richmond and Oakland with terminal facilities at Emeryville, converting the road into a broad gauge, double track one. The franchisees will be turned over to the Santa Fe Ry., whose terminal will be Emeryville instead of Point Richmond.

PRINCE INSPECTS CHICAGO

Drove About the City Today

Kind Reception of a Little Girl.

News of the Royal German Visitor.

CHICAGO, March 4.—With bright skies and a sharp, crisp temperature Prince Henry was this morning driven about the business section of the city visiting banks, the board of trade and prominent mercantile houses. He began the day by receiving after breakfast little Barbara Osburn, aged ten years, who presented him with his portrait burned in basewood. The Prince chatted gaily, complimented the artist, promised to treasure her gift and gave her an autograph album.

The Prince drove about down town without the accompaniment of huge crowds. His visit included besides savings banks, Field's wholesale drygoods store the Rookery office building, the fire insurance patrol in Monroe street, and the public library, where a fire alarm was sent in and the department responded. Returning to the hotel the Prince received Governor Van Sant of Minnesota and his staff, who presented resolutions.

The Governor made a little speech praising Minnesota. Introductions to the staff followed.

At 11:30 the royal party proceeded to Lincoln Park, where the Prince laid a wreath at the foot of the statue of Lincoln, saying: "I am proud to be able to do this." Robert Lincoln and Admiral Evans occupied a carriage with the Prince. After shoveling some dirt at the foot of a newly planted tree near the monument, the Prince and party proceeded to the Germania Club, where at noon an elaborate luncheon was served.

NEW YORK, Feb. 28.—Eight parcels of diamonds, valued at \$104,000, have been confiscated and ordered sold by Federal Judge Wheeler, says a Burlington, Vt., special to the Times. The stones were seized at St. Albans. Hiest Stavitzka, who was arrested with the jewels concealed in the sleeves of his undershirt, claims he was hired to take the diamonds from Montreal to New York by a firm in the latter city.

PEORIA, Ill., Feb. 28.—Jos. Hinkle, was hanged here this morning for wife murder. A peculiarity of the execution was the fact that the murderer was accompanied to the scaffold by two women who had been his spiritual advisers. They didn't stay however to witness the execution.

Salem Building Improvements are Active

The farm of Mrs. Charles Bailey a few miles south of Salem has been sold to a Miss Minthorn.
Chitwood Island has been purchased by Joseph Tiele, who recently arrived here from the East. The island contains about 250 acres and is located in the Willamette river opposite the Labor Exchange building. There is considerable wood on the land, which will be cleared by Mr. Tiele.
Under the direction of Chief Johnson, box stalls are being fitted out for the horses in the fire department at the city. The stalls are almost twice as large as the old stalls and have straw beds so the horses can lie down at anytime. The stalls open by means of automatic hinges worked with an electrical process which simultaneously opens the doors of the stalls and the harness at the ringing of the telephone bell.

The residence located at the northwest corner of Chemeketa and Twelfth streets is being improved by the painting of the entire building inside and the porches and fences outside. This property belongs to G. A. Bach, and was recently purchased from the Costello heirs.

NOTES OF SALEM'S PROGRESS

Capital City Alive to its Opportunities

Push Club's Methods are Bringing Results.

Fall Chimneys Already in Sight.

The methods of the Greater Salem Commercial club are like good advertising—they bring results. This is now clearly seen and already the members of that body and the citizens of Salem in general have cause to rejoice in their work. Improvement Leagues.

Another result of the agitation to produce the Greater Salem is the formation of improvement leagues. There is no town in the United States which will surpass Salem in beauty within the next two or three years. Her magnificent streets, her favorable location and her genial climate, absolutely without extremes of heat or cold, is the basis upon which the leagues will work, and under the energetic hands of their members the already pretty Capital City of Oregon will be made "a thing of beauty and a joy forever."

Immigration.

It is stated by those in the best position to know that more than 200,000 of the residents of the parched and blizzard swept states of the middle west will this spring emigrate to Oregon. Recognizing the value of the opportunity, the Push Club has been active in presenting the merits of this section to intending immigrants and day by day the increasing mail of Secretary Judah contains requests for information of the beautiful Willamette valley and not a few declarations of a decision to locate at Salem by those who are seeking a home in this favored land.

The Future.

All this is the result of four months earnest work. Dropped Dead On the Street
