WOODBURN PARTNERS IN COURT

Differ as to Accounts and Third Parties Interested.

There is trouble between the partners of the firm of Wright & Durant of Woodburn. They have been conducting a general business, dealing with lumber, oils, paints, building materials, etc., for almost one year and now one of the firm is asking that a receiver be appointed for the business.

The men are L. W. Durant and E. H. Wright, the former being the plaintiff in the suit recently filed in the circuit court.

Each shared equally in the enterprise, putting \$1428 apiece into the business. Durant is a mechanic and worked with that part of the business and Wright sold goods and kept the books.

Durant alleges that since they have been conducting the store together he has drawn out \$109.95 for his own use and Wright has received \$130 according to the books. But this he claims is not correct, and he states that Wright has collected about \$700 belonging to the firm which he has not accounted for, and for which amounts he has made false entries on the firm's books.

Durant claims to have known of these actions being committed, and has asked Wright to settle up the business and to reimburse the firm for what he has fraudulently received. This request has been refused, and as he can otherwise get no settlement of the affair, he has applied to the court.

There is due third parties by the firm about \$200 and there is due the firm from outside parties about \$400. The interest held by Durant in this business is all the property he owns and he asks to have that protected. He asks the court to appoint a receiver to settle up the matter and distribute the funds among the creditors and the interest of each partner in proportion as is just with the facts shown by the books. He also asks that Wright be enjoined from collecting any more accounts of the firm, or be allowed to dispose of any goods belonging to the firm. Corby & Corby and H. J. Bigger are attorneys for Durant.

Fourteen Cent Hop Contract

Hop dealers in this city today received a report that the George Perkins crop of hops of 200 bales at North Yamhill was sold today to Paul Weidner at a little better than 14 cents.

Arrested for Larceny.
Peter Rasmussen of Howell Prairie, has been arrested, charged with the larceny of a cross cut saw, valued at \$6. He is alleged to have stolen it from one of his neighbors, M. Christensen. The case will go to trial before Judge O'Donnell at 10 o'clock Saturday.

On the complaint of some others of his neighbors, Rasmussen was recently examined for insanity. In view of the many moves made by his neighbors to get him out of the community, this action may be in the same line.

Petition for Bridge Denied.

The County Court Thursday denied the petition of O'Neill Bros. and others for the construction of a bridge across the Santiam River at Niagara. A stone dam 200 feet long and 60 feet high is being built at Niagara, and water power will be developed there for manufacturing purposes. O'Neill Bros. & Callahan are building the dam.

Sugar Prices Dropping.

PORTLAND, March 7.—"Sugar is down again."

This is the stereotyped expression in Pacific Coast markets. The drop yesterday was 15 cents per hundred. Declines have succeeded each other in such quick succession that the Coast trade is wondering where it is at.

The derangement in prices is the result of a war among refiners. It began January 1 in a dispute between San Francisco jobbers, presumably instigated by the interests of the Western Sugar Refinery. All attempts to patch up a truce have been futile. Not long ago an attempt was made by the allied jobbing interests of the Coast, which assembled at San Francisco.

The jobbing price to the retail trade in the local market is \$4.35 per hundred for cane granulated. Best sugar is 10 cents less. The refiners' price at San Francisco is \$4.25 per hundred. Local jobbers, therefore, are selling at a loss, for it cost at least 12½ cents per hundred freight and cartage, to bring sugar here from California. The actual freight charge is 11 cents.

This last reduction is another hard jolt to retailers who thought they were safe when they bought direct from the warring jobbers of San Francisco. They paid about \$4.55 at the Bay City, and since then the price has dropped 30 cents. Beet sugar interests are also hard hit.

Gift of a Liverpool Shipowner.

LIVERPOOL, March 7.—William Johnston, a Liverpool shipowner, has given \$25,000 to the University of Liverpool. This gift is made for the purpose of promoting research in pathology and physiology, and will be partly devoted to endowing three research fellowships, one of which is to be held by a graduate of medicine in the United States.

THREE POLITICAL FAITHS

Combine to Down Brownell in Clackamas

OREGON CITY, March 7.—Colonel Robert A. Miller, chairman of the Democratic County Central Committee, has named a committee of nine for the purpose of providing for a citizens' convention and to formulate an address to the citizens of Clackamas County. This committee was authorized at a mass meeting held in this city February 18. It is composed of three Democrats, three Populists and three Republicans, as follows: Democrats—Robert A. Miller, Gladstone; O. W. Robbins, Molalla; W. W. Jesse, Barlow; Populists—George Ogilvie, Molalla; Harvey Starkweather, Milwaukie; Henry Bright Haupt, Damascus; Republicans—O. W. Eastham, Oregon City; E. E. Charman, Oregon City; Charles F. Clarke, Clackamas. The committee will meet in a short time and issue a call for a convention.

Dark Days in Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, March 7.—The first colored jury in the history of the state is today trying David Anderson, colored, for petty larceny. The prisoner was summoned by a colored policeman.

Good Coin For Bad

SAN FRANCISCO, March 7.—O. T. Woodworth was today found guilty of having counterfeited coin in his possession and fined one hundred dollars by the federal court.
