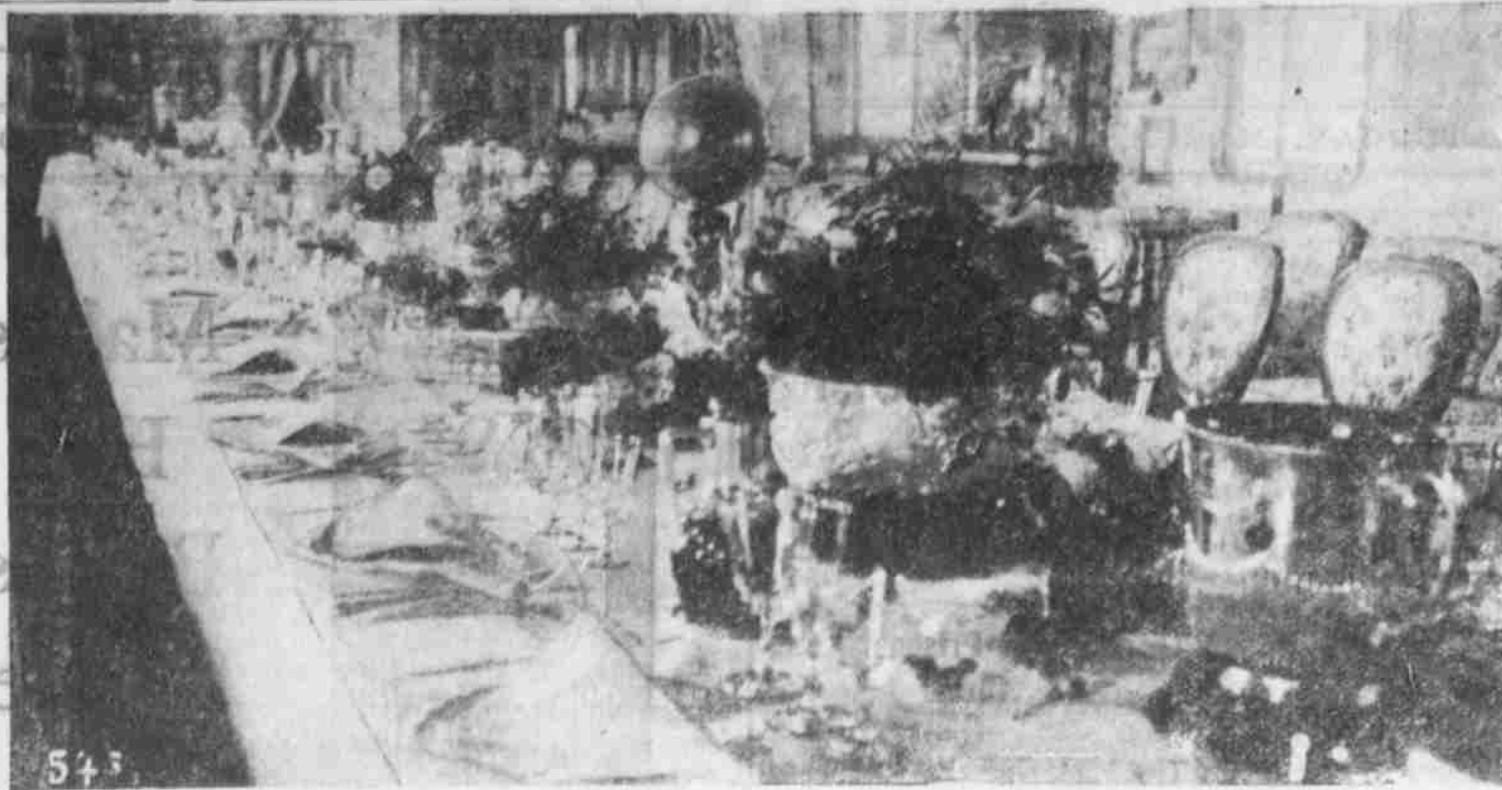




How Table Looked at Prince's Dinner Given By the New York Newspaper Men.

MEDICAL COLLEGE SUBJECTS

Some of the Difficulties in Securing Them.

How the Bodies are Prepared and Disposed of.

It is probable that many people still consider the method of securing subjects for medical schools to be by stealing them. A law enacted a few years ago provided that all bodies of the inmates of the asylum, penitentiary and poor farm, which were not taken in charge by relatives or friends, shall be used for the advancement of science in the medical schools. Thereby the medical schools are supplied with material for study by legitimate means.

The subjects secured in the above manner in Oregon are apportioned among the Salem medical school, the Portland Dental school and the Portland Medical school. It is true that each school believes the others are favored in receiving subjects, but a competent person is always placed in charge to send the subjects to the schools. According to the average, the Salem school should receive about twenty-five bodies per year.

The dissecting rooms of this school are located near South Mill creek near Willamette University. The students are supposed to know nothing whatever of where the bodies are from, their first knowledge of them being when they are found on the dissecting tables.

The bodies are first injected with an arsenic preparation through the jugular vein in the neck, in order to longer preserve them. A thin mixture of plaster of paris is then injected into the carotid artery. This traces the blood vessels. Although the blood is stagnant the plaster is carried directly to the heart, which causes a natural contraction and forces the plaster discolored with blood all over the body. From the plaster being colored by the blood, the veins, arteries, and even the finest capillaries can be traced perfectly as long as the body lasts. This is from three to six weeks, as the result of the special arsenic injection.

After these preliminaries the bodies are divided into five parts, and disposed of to these students.

The bodies are secured through the dean of the school and each student buys the part he wishes to study.

When the bodies are thoroughly dissected, they are taken in charge by those who delivered them to the dissecting room, and receive the same burial that they would have secured had they not been used as subjects at the school.

The students often disagree as to the part they shall secure, and when several students desire the same part, the matter is settled by the faculty. The one who first signs for it usually secures it however.

A slight difficulty arose in the local school during the past winter, which was interesting while it lasted. For some reason the faculty failed to secure any subjects for the students for a period of several weeks and the students attempted to arrange for purchasing bodies for themselves. They were trying to make arrangements with a local undertaker to get bodies from him, when the faculty discovered their plan and frustrated it, but it resulted in the

school being better supplied. The students have a right to secure their own bodies if it is done in the right way.

Last year out of the thirty-five subjects handled by the Salem school there were only four female bodies, which is about the usual percentage.

The faculty of the school are talking in order to erect a better and modern dissecting room in Salem.

A recent matter which came up regarding the school here aroused interest among outsiders and amusement among the students. One of the most prominent professional men of the city was walking past the school and readily detected a peculiar odor was located there. He believed it to be a subject which had been kept too long, and at once informed the faculty that he intended to bring suit against the institution for being a public nuisance. Among those to whom the affair was told, interest was at once alive.

The fact of the matter was that while performing some of their work, the students were generating hydrogen sulphide, and the passerby could not detect the exact odor, but recognized a similar one.

Some Movements In the Building Trades.

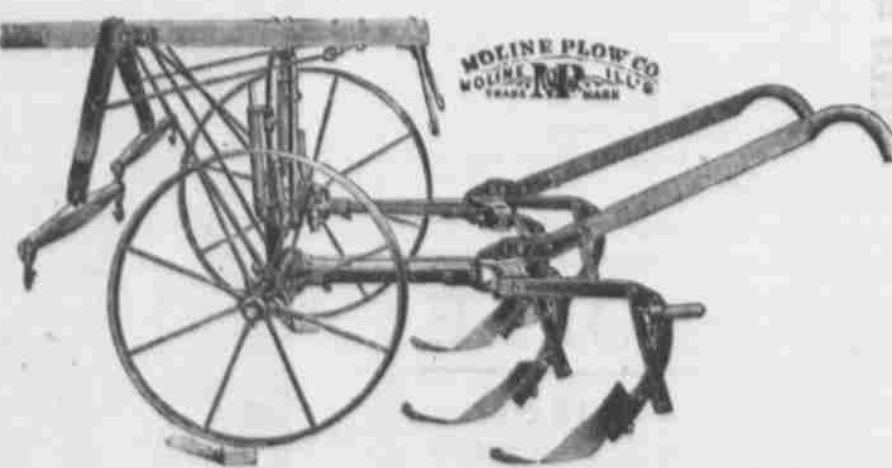
