But will the new delegation do any better? This will depend in a great measure upon the amount of intelligence of the new men, and this again will depend upon the kind of intelligence these representatives possess; mostly nominations are not made from a standpoint of wisdom and fitness. But from a view of the amount of political adhesiveness contained in their makeup, and, of course, the amount of political work done for the party in the past.

The new Marion county delegation will have the satisfaction to congratulate themselves that the obnoxious burdensome laws on the statute books are not the child of their creation, and, therefore, need not feel reluctant to repeal them, on account of relationship, because it would not necessarily humiliate their ancestral pride.

But, in order to do anything successfully, the question must be studied, so as to know wherein the fault lies, and when the defect is discovered it is still another thing to find a remedy, and apply it.

The taxpayers will be interested to know that their chosen servants will immediately go to work to qualify themselves for the work in hand.

To me it is a foregone conclusion that they are not prepared for the undertaking, because they have been educated and trained to follow in the ruts and beaten paths of sophisticated political apologetes.
