MONEY RAISED EASILY

To Supply Power for Flax Industry

Salem Business Men Show Public Spirit.

The Business Promises Rapid Growth.

Again the Salem business men have been asked to subscribe for a public benefit. Notwithstanding they have been crowded pretty severely in such matters the past few months, the subscription yesterday for the flax mill subsidy was met with a promptness that is a great credit to their liberality. Six hundred dollars in a subscription, where the amount asked is but a small percentage of what will come in the way of returns, is a good thing for a town to foster. The flax industry, as set forth in the Journal a few days ago, has the possibilities of doing more for Salem and the surrounding country than all the other enterprises of the valley combined. The flax industry has transformed many an obscure town into a manufacturing metropolis of vast proportions, and, as Salem is getting the start in this line on the Pacific coast, she will surely reap the benefit.

In an editorial on the future of the flax industry in Oregon, the Portland Oregonian says:

"The effort made by a number of women of the state a few years ago, headed by Mrs. Governor Lord, to introduce flax culture on a scale commensurate with opportunities in that line, looking ultimately to the establishment of a flax factory, seems at last to be about to bear fruit. The adaptability of the climate of the Willamette valley, and of the soil of certain sections to flax growing was fully demonstrated by the experiment four or five years ago. The history of the effort is of recent date and familiar to all. While it cannot, in one sense, be said that it failed, it did not meet with financial success, and it has been dormant for several years, awaiting resurrection, that has at length come. The work will now be taken up where the Women's Flax Culture Association was forced from lack of funds to drop it, and placed on a commercial basis. As the projected enterprise is outlined, it cannot be called a venture in business. The preliminary steps have been carefully taken, and, with a practical man at the head of affairs, there is little danger that it will fail. On the contrary, there is every reason to believe that it will become a valuable adjunct to the agriculture of the state, and flax manufacturing in due time one of its paying industries."

INSPECTION OF CO. F

Salem's National Guard Boys Doing Their Prettiest.

The regular quarterly inspection of Co. F, Fourth Regiment, O. N. G., was held Friday night at the Armory. Colonel Moran, of Eugene, was the inspecting officer, and about 35 or 40 members were present. Half an hour was spent in drilling, before the inspecting officer, which was one of the best drills ever given by Company F at an inspection. Of late several new members have been taken into the company, making it full to the limit, which is 65. The order for the election of a captain and first lieutenant is expected from headquarters in the near future, and the Salem company expects to be among the best, if not the best, that goes to the encampment this summer. The Armory has been fitted with gas lights throughout, and, with its other improvements, makes it one of the best in the state. Lieutenant H. A. Kurtz, who is now in command of the company, takes great interest in its welfare, and when the weather is fit, some fine street drills will be had.

OIL IN YAMHILL.

Yamhill Coal & Oil Co. is Satisfied With Results.

Hon. D. M. Watson, of Portland, one of the proprietors of the well-known Watsons' restaurant, but who is interested especially in oil field development, being himself a professional promoter, was in Newberg Monday to investigate the prospects of the Yamhill Coal & Oil Company. He came direct from the Polk county prospect, in which he is interested with Mr. Hirschberg. He says they have struck a fine quality of illuminating gas, and fully believes they will strike oil at 1,000 feet. After thirteen years' effort Mr. Watson has invented an appliance by which he claims he can locate oil fields and tell the exact place for sinking the well. It seems that his claims are well founded as he has tested his machinery fully in the California oil fields. He was taken out into a territory with which he was wholly unacquainted, but which had been thoroughly prospected, as he traversed the territory he located the "dry" wells and the real oil wells, without a single mistake, and fully satisfied his companions who were acquainted with the local conditions. As a result he is now going to Texas and then to East Pennsylvania, in answer to calls from companies to come and locate for them. Having heard of the prospects here, Mr. Watson came to Newberg at his own bidding, as he says that every oil well he succeeds in locating is that much in his favor as a promoter. He was taken out to the Follett place and arranged his indicator, which works by its susceptibility to certain currents. He started out over the hill, and soon stopped short, marked a certain line, and assured Messrs. Churchill and Follett that there was no question as to the presence of oil, and furthermore said he believed they would find it within 1,000 feet. He seemed very positive of his position, and declared to his companions that he would rather have their holdings than any prospect in California. It goes without saying that the local company is gratified at his encouraging words, and will sink the well according to Mr. Watson's directions—Newberg Graphic.
