CLEANER POLITICS FOR AMERICA'S DIRTIEST CITY

Battle for the Purification of the Babylon on Lake Michigan

Direct Nomination of Candidates to be Secured by a Referendum Vote That Will Do Away With Slates at Primaries and Nominating Conventions.

CHICAGO, April 1.—Voters of Chicago are casting ballots for 36 members of the council today, bringing to a close one of the most interesting and dramatic campaigns of recent years. Bitter warfare has been waged by the clean government organizations against the so-called "gang" candidates, particular attention having been paid to "Bathhouse John" Coughlin, who represents the richest and toughest ward in the world. He is opposed by David Frank, a prominent business man. To prevent Frank's place has been held at the various polling places college athletes. A heavy vote was cast early. In addition to slotted men, referendum questions are being voted on. The propositions are ownership of public utilities by the city, and nomination of city candidates by direct primary vote.

Not the least important of the municipal election is the referendum vote being taken on the proposition to wipe out the town government anachronism. For years the government of Chicago has been grievously handicapped by the retention of the form of township rule, adopted when the city was little more than a struggling village. It is proposed now to centralize the management and responsibility of the city's affairs by doing away with the cumbersome system of having three town supervisors, collectors and clerks, which will mean a saving of \$500,000 a year, in salaries and fees. The Municipal Voters' League has been working strenuously to bring about this reform, and has high hopes of a successful issue at the polls today.

INMATES OF COUNTY JAIL

Engaged in Fierce Fistic Encounter Monday Morning.

There was a lively time in the Marion county jail Monday morning. Frank Daily and George Barker, two petty larceny thieves, who are serving a sentence in the county jail, had a difference, and attempted to settle the matter in an exciting fistic and club encounter. In fact, hostilities did not end until both combatants were severely locked in separate cells. When the smoke of battle had cleared away, the jail interior looked as though it had been visited by a Kansas cyclone. Stove wood and broken dishes were scattered around the floor, while scarcely a window light escaped unbroken.

When Sheriff Durbin reached the jail corridor, having been attracted by the disturbance, he found Barker armed with an oak club, beating Daily in a frightful manner. As a result of the fracas, Daily received a severe scalp wound, besides innumerable bruises. At the time of the trouble, there were two other occupants in the jail, but they remained in hiding, the hurrying of many missiles through the corridors by the fighters making that the only safe course.

O. V. Hall, salesman in Dr. Stone's South Commercial street drug store, lost his 1901 Rambler bicycle Monday afternoon, a thief being responsible for its disappearance. Mr. Hall had scarcely left the wheel in front of the store when it disappeared. He promptly located it at a Court-street second hand store, where a young man had just sold it for \$7.50. The thief represented that he had just arrived in the city from California, and a pressing need for funds was all that caused him to sacrifice the wheel. Local police were given a description of the stranger, and they are looking for him.

RUSHED FOR A HOME.
At the San Jacinto Forest Reserve, in California
LOS ANGELES, Cal., April 1.—The San Jacinto forest reserve, comprising 34,000 acres of San Bernardino county, was thrown open to public entry this morning. A rush occurred during the night of squatters upon the choicest sections, and trouble is feared. The land office at Los Angeles, where places have been held in line for two weeks, is also crowded.

Wong Sam's Assailant Fined

Richard Ely questioned the policy of standing trial for his unprovoked assault Saturday evening upon Wong Sam, the diminutive Celestial, and when his case was called before Justice O'Donald this morning he changed his plea of "not guilty" to that of "guilty."

"I never wanted any Chinamen in this country, anyway," remarked the venerable Justice in pronouncing sentence, "but since we have made it possible for them to be here, and never fail to punish them for an infraction of our laws, it is but right that they should be afforded protection, especially from an assault that was entirely unprovoked." Ely was fined \$15 and the costs of the action, and went to jail.

Articles of Incorporation.

Articles of Incorporation of the Pacific Coast Adjustment Co., capitalized at \$20,000, with headquarters in Portland, were filed in the office of the secretary of state today. The objects of the company are to engage in the adjusting of fire and marine insurance. The incorporators are W. D. Wheelwright, L. R. Webster and J. Flanders, of Portland.

Grand American Handicap.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 1.—The second day's program of the Grand American Handicap opened this morning with a largely increased number of participants. The feature event of the day is the Nitro Powder Handicap at sixteen birds, with handicaps of 25 to 33 yards.

Biggest Coke Plant.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., April 1.—This is the date set by the Republic Iron and Steel Company for the blowing of its new blast furnace at Thomas, near this city, and the lighting of fires in its 400 new coke ovens. This is the largest single coke plant in the United States.

Stratton Wants to Fight.

ST. PAUL, April 1.—Attorney-General Stratton, of Washington, expects to go to Washington, D. C., tonight to make application for leave to file in the federal court an action against the Northern Securities Company.

Notorious Horse Thief Caught.

MISSOULA, Mont., April 1.—Sheriff James Davis, of Blackfoot, Idaho, captured near here today Charles Carey and Charles Irwin, notorious horse thieves of Southern Idaho. Their pursuit has been kept up since August.

Taxes Paid Today.

Linn county today paid into the state treasurer the sum of \$24,169, being one-half of the state and Agricultural College tax of that county for 1901.

Captain Mead's New Duties.

WASHINGTON, April 1.—Captain W. W. Mead, of Kentucky, reported for duty today as a member of the Board of Inspection and Survey.

Dayton Mine Victims Found.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., April 1.—The bodies of fifteen victims of the Dayton mine disaster have been recovered. Three or four more are missing.

NEWARK, N. J., April 1.—Thomas Dunn-English, the author of "Ben Bolt," died here this morning.

Russia Lands Arms in Persia.

BOMBAY, April 1.—It is asserted here that the Russian subsidized steamer Korniloff, on her last visit to the Persian Gulf, landed 60,000 rifles at Benderabad, a seaport of Persia, on the Persian Gulf.

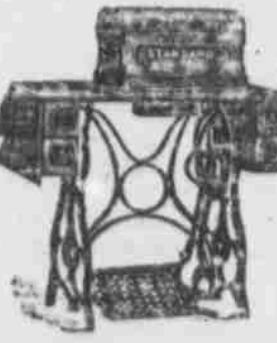
