SCHEME ADS PASSED UP.

San Jose Merchants Decide to Stick To Newspapers in the Future. The Merchant's Association of San Jose, Cal., has put itself on record to protect its members from itinerant advertising solicitors and subscription advertisements for programs, booklets and such like schemes by pledging themselves to abide by the action of a committee appointed some weeks ago to first pass upon the merits of all such propositions.

Like the merchants of other cities the merchants of San Jose are wrestling with the question of what is known as snap advertising, to use an every day parlance. Hardly a day passes but business men are called upon by a half dozen solicitors for advertising for small papers, school publications programs for anything and everything under the sun from a charity bazaar to a fraternal benefit.

These calls have been increasing to such an extent as to become a serious problem among merchants. They declared that it was impossible to patronize all the propositions submitted, and if any preference was shown it was sure to bring on the head of the merchant the combined attack and persuasive recrimination of the remainder.

The result is that many business houses have refused every advertise-

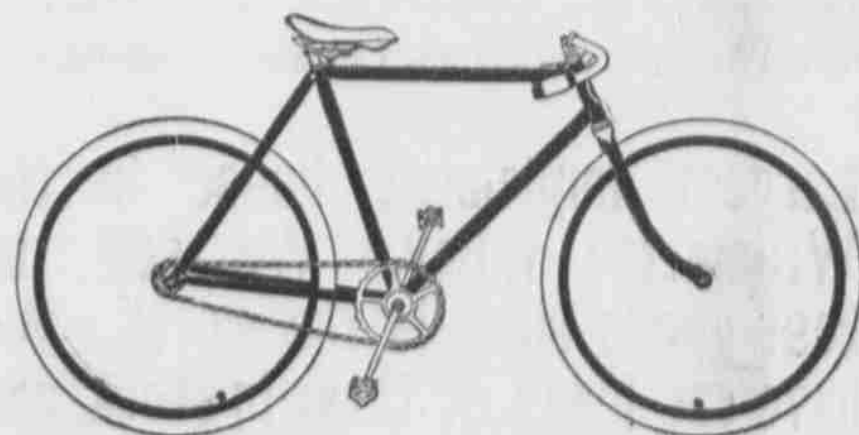
