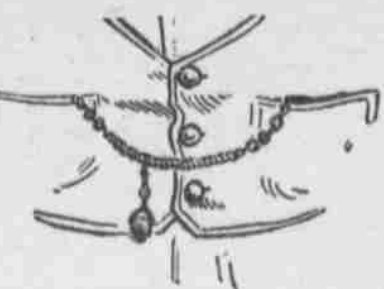

DEPEW DENIES CHRISTMAS

Had No Dealings With the Dane

Knox Was to Get a Good Graft

If the Proposed Sale Went Through.

WASHINGTON, April 7.—The special committee appointed to investigate the charges made by Captain Christmas, in connection with the purchase of the Danish West Indies, reconvened today. Senator Depew was the first witness. He denied knowing Christmas, or of having conferred with any one concerning the sale of the islands. Charles Knox, who is mentioned in Christmas' report as a friend of Hanna, testified that he entered into a contract to further the enterprise for which he was to receive \$350 a month and \$15,000 if the deal went through. Later Christmas entered into objectionable contracts, and he washed his hands of the entire affair. Knox declared that there was no understanding that he was to bribe any one. All he had done was to get the views of senators as to the prospects of the proposed sale.

Senator Bacon, of Georgia, testified he saw Captain Christmas twice, but denied he had promised to use his best endeavors to bring about the purchase. A letter from Secretary Hay was then submitted. In it the secretary stated he thought Christmas' story to be of sufficient interest to be worth investigation, and that he would send a trusted agent to meet Christmas in Copenhagen. He has decided to send Henry White, assistant secretary of the American embassy in London, and gave Christmas an introduction to him. Hay then says his connection with the matter ceased entirely.

MUST DIE IN CHAIR

Patrick to be Executed May 5.

NEW YORK, April 7.—Lawyer Patrick, who was convicted of the murder of Millionaire Wm. Rice, was sentenced this morning to be electrocuted during the week beginning May 5th.

The Merger Fight.
WASHINGTON, April 7.—Attorney-General Stratton, of the state of Washington, in the supreme court, this morning, entered a motion for leave to file a bill of complaint against the Northern Securities Company, in behalf of the state. The briefs were accepted by the court.

After the Beef Trust.

WASHINGTON, April 7.—Resolutions calling on the attorney-general to inform the House what steps have been taken to investigate the alleged beef trust, and what has been done to prosecute the violators of the law was introduced in the House today.

EAST SALEM FIRE

Irvine Bunce Thinks Somebody Destroyed His Home

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Irvine Bunce, corner of 21st and Center streets, was burned to the ground about midnight Saturday night. At the time of the fire the family was visiting in North Salem, and did not learn of the destruction of their home until Sunday morning. Mr. Bunce valued the residence at about \$1800, and says it was insured for \$1200. Most of the contents were secured by the neighbors, who fought the blaze gallantly and saved the surrounding buildings until the city fire department arrived. The fire boys are deserving of credit for their faithful work. Although the burning structure was four blocks outside of the city limits, the fire fighters laid a line of hose for three blocks and extinguished the blaze before it spread to adjoining buildings, which were in serious danger. Some alarm was occasioned by the fire by the report that the three young children of Mrs. Bunce were in the burning building. The house was searched, but the report proved without foundation.

Mr. Bunce says he is satisfied that some malicious person set the house on fire. He says there was no fire of any kind in the building when the family left Saturday afternoon, and he is of the opinion that the incendiary improved the opportunity presented. Mr. Bunce suspects no one person of the crime.

The Democrats held a successful and picturesque convention at Salem Saturday. They have put up a ticket that is of more than average ability, and they expect to win with some of them.

An amusing feature of the convention was the sparring of the friends of Wm. H. Holmes and J. A. Jeffrey for joint senator, which now goes to the state convention. Both gentlemen seemed to be willing to push each other for senator, which both declined.

Next came the incident of refusing to leave a blank for L. H. McMahon, independent for senator. This the convention flatly refused. Then Mr. McMahon appeared, and with the management of a few well-timed remarks, the convention reversed itself without se-

GRAVE CHARGES FROM DELAREY

Tells of British Atrocities On Helpless Boer Women and Children.

AMSTERDAM, April 7.—President Kruger has received from General Delarey harrowing stories of the cruelties perpetrated by the British. The stories are supported by affidavits. Delarey says that Boer women are placed as a human screen around the British, as a protection against his attacks. He declares a number of Boer women have already been wantonly killed. Delarey's own wife, according to his reports, has been prosecuted by Methuen's orders, for the past twelve months, and is now wandering homeless about the veldt with her six children. Delarey's mother, aged 83, he claims, has been driven from Klerksdorp, after being robbed of all her cattle, and having her house burned. The Boer general then enumerates specific cases of defenseless women who were shot, and also tells of the cold-blooded murder of prisoners.

Delarey appends to his report a story of gruesome atrocities perpetrated on aged and decrepit Boers, pregnant women and small children.

Erasmus Killed.
LONDON, April 7.—Kitchener reports today the death of Commandant Erasmus, the well-known Boer leader, who was killed in the engagement on April 30, near Boschof.

The Latest Fight.
KLERKSDORP, Transvaal, April 7. Details received of the battle at Dorn-halt Farm, March 31st, in which the British had three officers and 24 men killed and 16 officers and 131 men wounded, while the Boers had 137 killed or wounded, show that quite

The Regular Proceedings.

He said Mr. McMahon was not a Democrat, but claimed to be a Populist. He thought he was mistaken in that, as the speaker considered him a loyal Democrat. He made a strong plea for his amendment.

Grant Corby made an argument against leaving a vacancy on the ticket. It was his duty to make a full ticket and take Mr. McMahon into this convention, and nominate him. His remarks were warmly applauded.

Mr. Croner, of Macleay, said he was a Democrat from Nebraska. He

County Chairman Chosen.
F. W. Durbin called attention to the fact that the first thing on the program was the election of a county chairman, and he named James Coleman, John A. Jeffrey nominated Henry A. Downing. Result, Coleman 76, Downing 92. On motion of Coleman Downing was elected unanimously.

Joint Senator Incident.
Geo. S. Downing nominated J. A. Jeffrey for joint senator from Marion and Linn. He moved that the delegation be instructed for Jeffrey. Wm. Kaiser argued that it was unfair to tie up the convention to any one candidate. He believed the delegation would favor Wm. H. Holmes, and opposed instruction.

Mr. Downing replied that in a caucus Friday night it was unanimously decided to nominate Jeffrey. He thought Jeffrey was the proper nominee. Mr. Corby wanted the convention to express itself for the guidance of the delegates. Let a vote be taken. F. W. Durbin said he was opposed to instructions by this convention, although he was willing to abide by the vote of this convention. W. T. Slater made the point that this not the regular order of business.

The Representative Ticket.
The nomination of senators was passed. For representatives Lewis Savage, of Salem; Dr. Fitzgerald, of Gervais; Mayor Tomlinson, of Woodburn; Fred Revue, of Stayton; W. T. Slater, of Salem, were nominated.

Colbath for Sheriff.
Jack Harding, Jr., of East Salem; Ben Colbath, present deputy, were nominated, with great good feeling. Colbath 105, Harding 77.

This was four more votes than there were delegates, and a second ballot was ordered, resulting Colbath 93, Harding 81. Total vote of convention 178. The nomination was made unanimous.

McMahon Goes on the Ticket.
Grant Colby called for the regular order and nominated L. H. McMahon for senator. S. Tomlinson nominated Hon. J. B. Dimick. Geo. S. Downing nominated Grant Corby, but he declined. On motion L. H. McMahon and J. B. Dimick were nominated.

Mr. McMahon was called for, and made a short speech, saying his record in the past ought to convince them where he would be in the future. "It has been my experience in the past at different times to run up against the soft side of the great unwashed," said Mac amid a general laugh.

A. M. Dalrymple was nominated for clerk by acclamation. He was called for and made a short speech, which was well received. Mr. Dalrymple is editor of the Marion County Democrat, and secretary of the county committee.

The rest of the ticket was rapidly made up, as follows, no one seeking the honors, and many refusing:

W. T. Rigdon, of Salem, for coroner. In selecting justices of the peace and constables J. O'Donald received the nomination for justice in the Salem district, after five ballots had been taken, while John Lewis was nominated for constable by acclamation.

After a vote of thanks to Chairman Finzer for his excellent work, the convention adjourned.

RACE WAR AT LAWTON

All Indian Territory is in a Turmoil

Four Hundred Armed Blacks Waiting Developments

Fearful a Desperate Battle Will Ensnare.

FORT WORTH, Tex., April 7.—A Lawton, Oklahoma Territory, dispatch says the situation there as a result of the efforts to drive the negroes out of the city continues serious. Four hundred armed negroes are now at Ft. Hill, awaiting developments, before marching on Lawton. An equal number of armed whites are ready to repulse the attack of the negroes.

Governor Determined.
GUTHRIE, O. T., April 7.—April 6th, the last day set for the negroes to remain in Lawton, O. T., passed with no direct attacks on the colored people. Many of the negroes have left. A number, however, are determined to remain. The county officials expect trouble, and have arranged matters as well as possible to preserve order. One hundred deputy sheriffs have been sworn in, and an attempt will be made to control the situation, however serious it becomes. The governor stated today that if necessary he would use extreme efforts to quell any lawless action, and he has the proffered assistance of the federal authorities also.

Senate Was Wrong.
WASHINGTON, April 7.—The House and Senate conferees on the war revenue repeal bill have come to an understanding. The House wins in its contention, the Senate receding from its amendment that the war tax on bucket shops should remain in force.
