GENERAL MILES IS RIGHT.

It is time the United States were inaugurating a more humane and statesmanlike policy toward the Filipinos, if they are ever to be pacified and made part of a free, self-governing nation.

The Journal is inclined to think General Miles is right in his views, that he should invite prominent members of the Filipino nation to come to this country, treat them well, and reason with them.

Three years of suppression of the revolts there by military force have accomplished little, and it is time some other plan of civilization were followed.

Great Britain has taken an army of 200,000 men to South Africa and has not quelled 100,000 people by force. How can we expect to rule by the sword over ten million.

It is true, there is no comparison between the Filipinos and the Boers, but it stands to reason that the longer we continue a policy of military occupation the stronger they will become as a military power.

We should set them the example of intelligence, and not of the Old World military force, that Spain tried for centuries, and failed. It is time to change our policy in the Philippines.

A DEPARTURE FROM NEUTRALITY

A subscriber at Jefferson writes to The Journal "Your politics are all right just now, but you should stop your yapping about the neutrality law. You are not quarrelling with your bread and butter. Every horse and mule sold out of this country has added to the value of every farm in the country, and that is how we are able to take your paper."

The writer should look at the other side of the case. If the United States were supplying the Boers with guns or horses and mules to maintain their war against England, would not England justly complain at our infraction of neutrality laws? And she would have a right to complain.

But the pro-British advocates will say let the Transvaal republics buy munitions of war and horses and mules here if they have the means and the ships to get them to South Africa. But we know they have no ports and no navy, and England would not permit such shipments.

The attorney-general of the United States tacitly admits that there has been an infraction of the neutrality laws of nations, by permitting the maintenance of a forwarding camp in Louisiana by England.

It should be remembered that horses and mules are more necessary to British success in South Africa than shipments of men. England has the men and the money, but we alone can furnish the remounts for the cavalry.

That such a camp has been maintained on American soil to assemble the supplies to carry on the war by Great Britain, is as great an offense as though we had permitted the establishment of a recruiting station.

The moral distinction cannot be established in the minds of the common people. Technically it may be shown that it is all right to let England make this country its base of supplies, but never morally.

THE CHICAGO ELECTION.

The recent Chicago city election was a great triumph for direct nomination and for direct legislation. The proposition to nominate direct received an overwhelming majority at the hands of the people and they have decreed the death of the slated primary and the logrolling convention, the two most corruptive influences in modern politics.

A special feature of the election was the test of the public pulse on the referendum applied to the affairs of the people. The ballot held these propositions:

"For ownership by the city of Chicago of all street railroads within the corporate limits of said city."

"For ownership by the city of Chicago of gas and electric lighting plants, said plants to furnish light, heat and power for public and private use."

"For the nomination of all candidates for city officers by direct vote of the voters at the primary election to be held for that purpose."

All the propositions carried by a heavy vote.

President Cruise, of the Referendum League, said "The voters have expressed themselves. They have declared in favor of the initiative and referendum. Hereafter questions of public policy must be submitted to the vote of the people of Chicago. The victory of today shows conclusively that a majority are in favor of municipal ownership of public utilities. The vote is further evidence that the people are in favor of a direct vote on the election of United States senators."

Out of this effort the officials of the Referendum League hope to establish a non-partisan federation for the majority rule in Chicago. The plan of organization is to put the candidates elected today under a pledge to carry out the will of the voters as expressed in their consideration of the propositions expressed in the referendum ballot.

THE REPUBLICAN NOMINEE.

William J. Furnish, the Republican nominee for governor of Oregon, is a native Oregonian who is on the under side of 40, though hard work and hard thinking have traced some lines in his countenance. He typifies in a strong degree the energy, enterprise and manhood of the new West. He has won success of more than one kind under difficulties that would have overwhelmed a man with less grit and determination. As far back as he can remember he was the son of a widow who had other mouths to feed, and he had to shift for himself—not an easy thing for a small boy to do in the bunchgrass hills of Umatilla county. But he did it successfully, as he has done everything else in life. He had an end to accomplish, and he set about it very early in life. Knowing instinctively that an education was essential to success, he proceeded to get an education with the same force and energy that won him a fortune and political honors. He groomed his neighbors' horses; he drove a milk wagon; he acted as janitor in the little college. He got what he wanted—not a polished education, but enough for the practical affairs of life. Then he went into business, and when he took hold of a Pendleton bank a few years ago he made it successful, and became a wealthy man. In politics Mr. Furnish had been the leader of the Democratic party until the free silver craze came along. Then he stood with the minority, but the Republicans refusing to let him remain in this isolation called him to become their leader, and Republican captains became his lieutenants. He has had strong political opposition in his county, but none of it has been effective, for he has won at every turn. Perhaps not all of Mr. Furnish's qualities are admirable, but he has force and integrity, and so he stands as the type of a successful man whom other men envy and to whom mothers point their sons with pride.

Good Words for Geer.

It was a graceful thing for Governor Moody to pay a hearty tribute to Governor Geer. It is a courtesy too often forgotten, to let the defeated man go his way without a thought as to the good service he has rendered in the past, and with reckless disregard as to where he will be found working in the future. Governor Geer is a man of more than state reputation. It is safe to say that he would have been renominated in any state in the Union except Oregon. But Oregon has never given a Republican a second term. Either the party is more finical or fastidious, or it has less consistency and loyalty of purpose than other parties, or it is strangely infatuated by greed for office to want to swap horses in the middle of the stream so often. An Eastern Oregon paper says the Republican convention in turning down Geer ensures the election of Chamberlain. Another paper says Furnish is certain of election and if Geer had been named he would have been beaten. All this aside Geer has made a good governor.
