HOP POOL A SUCCESS.

Francis Feller Reports on Oregon Hop
Deal.

Francis Feller, of Butteville, who re-
turned from London this week, was in
Salem today. Mr. Feller is treasurer
of the Oregon Hop Growers' Associa-
tion, and went to London as representa-
tive of the Oregon hop growers, to
assist M. H. Durst in the sale of a
pool of 2,200 bales of choice Oregon
hops, that was formed through the
agency of the association.

"The pool was a complete success,"
said Mr. Feller this morning. "The
hops averaged the growers represent-
ed in the combine 11 1/2 cents per
pound, net, which was better than
would have been realized in the Ore-
gon market, except for the formation
of the pool. The least any of the hops
brought was 10 1/2 cents, and ranged
upwards, according to quality. The
advance in the Oregon hop market re-
sulted from the organization of the
pool, and the growers who did not join
the combine reaped a benefit. This ex-
planation of the stimulated Oregon
market cannot be truthfully contra-
dicted. The sale of the pool was ac-
complished in competition with 600,
000 cwt. of English hops which were,
however, of an inferior quality."

When the pool had been sold, Mr.
Feller visited Sussex and Oxford coun-
ties, and also spent some time in the
Kent hop district, where he made a
thorough study of the methods of Eng-
lish hop culture.

"English growers are very generally
reducing their acreage of hops," con-
tinued Mr. Feller, "and the successful
disposition of the Oregon hop pool es-
tablishes the Oregon Hop Growers' As-
sociation as a factor in the world's hop
market. Since the pool consisted of
only choice quality hops, a reputation
for a first-class product has been
achieved that will prove valuable in
marketing the crops of succeeding
years. There will always be a good
market in England for hops from Ore-
gon."

Mr. Feller is one of Marion county's
staunchest Democrats, and reached
home just in time to participate in his
party's love feast, being held in Sa-
lem today.

COSTS WILL BE ADDED

Monday Final Day for Paying
Taxes Without Penalty.

Today is the last day upon which
taxes can be paid without the addition
of penalty and interest charges. The
1901 tax roll for Marion county rep-
resented in the aggregate about \$220,
000, and of that sum approximately
\$160,000 has been collected, leaving a
balance unpaid and delinquent of
about \$60,000. Of the \$160,000 col-
lected probably \$100,000 was collected un-
der the rebate system of 3 per cent.,
which was allowed on all payments
made previous to March 16th. Many
taxpayers, however, paid one-half of
their assessments before today, and
the law provides that such persons
shall have until the first Monday in
October to pay the remainder without
the addition of penalty and interest
charges. Persons who have not paid
half of their taxes by 5 o'clock this
afternoon will be liable for 10 per
cent. penalty and 12 per cent. per an-
num interest from today, April 7th,
until the date of the tax payment is
made.
