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DOING GOOD WORK

Greater Salem's Active Commercial Club Meets Thursday.

The best interests of the Capital City are being greatly advanced by the energetic work of her creditable commercial organization—"The Greater Salem Commercial Club." Results attending the work of the club are appearing in many ways. The systematic and organized effort made by that body is laying the foundation for an extensive growth of a substantial and permanent character of a greater Salem, commercially, numerically and industrially.

The club now has a membership of 226, and is an effective agency for the promotion of Salem. The membership consists of practically all of the business and professional men of the city, who are identified with the city's interests, and knowing best her wants will make every honest endeavor to supply them. They are a vigorous and energetic body of men, and are deserving of credit for their unselfish devotion to the city's welfare.

A visit to Secretary Judah's office will dispel all doubts as to the activity of the club, and remove all question as to the efficient work being done in relation to the flux industry, which is being fostered by the club, the agreement covering a 15-months' lease of the North Salem brick mills, as a suitable building in which to install a glass plant, was forwarded to Manager Wilcox, in Portland today for his signature. The postmark at the mill is being repaired, and soon everything will be in readiness for the handling of this important crop.

The committee on German Immigration has had placards printed in German and English, directing the intending locator to call on Secretary Judah at the city hall for detailed information. These are being distributed in the most prominent public places in the city.

The blackboard that has been ordered to be placed in the secretary's office will be ready and in place this morning. The board will be for the use of the club members, who can indicate upon the same any kind of labor they would desire to employ. This will virtually give the city of Salem a free public employment agency.

The second quarter's dues are being collected, and the members are contributing loyally, feeling that the nominal sum asked is a splendid investment when the good work being accomplished by the club is taken into consideration.

A political convention interfered with the date for the last regular meeting of the club, and no conference was held. Another meeting will be held this Wednesday afternoon, when there will be a good attendance, as there are several matters of interest to come before the meeting.

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MORE ROOM NEEDED

Third Story of New Wing At Asylum to Be Occupied

The asylum board on Monday afternoon received the regular monthly report of Superintendent Calbreath for March. The average attendance of patients at the asylum last month was 1233, which was the largest in the history of the institution. Superintendent Calbreath reports that the increased population will necessitate the opening of the third story of the new wing, which is nearly completed. It has been arranged especially for the treatment of a special class of patients.

State Veterinarian McLean recently visited the asylum and inspected the herd of cows kept there, which he reported in first-class condition.

Superintendent Calbreath recommends the erection of a building in connection with the asylum that would prove suitable for a quarantine station. The matter was discussed by the board, and taken under advisement. It will probably be favorably acted upon.

Thirty-eight patients were received during March. During the month 14 were discharged, 11 died and one eloped. The number remaining March 31st was 1241.

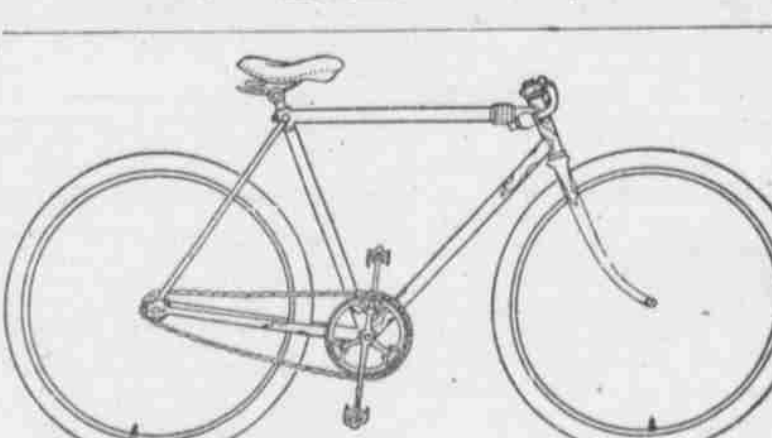
