ANOTHER YEAR'S LEASE

Post-office Will Be Completed in August

An agreement was today filed in the county recorder's office for a renewal of the lease of the Commercial-street quarters for the Salem postoffice. The lease is given by Mrs. Mary Payton, owner of the building, to Henry C. Payne, postmaster-general, of Washington, D. C. The term of lease is for one year from June 1, 1922, "or until the new government building now being constructed shall be ready for occupancy." The rental is \$1200 per annum, payable quarterly.

Contractor Campbell, who is in charge of the construction of Salem's new postoffice home, expects to have the building completed and ready for occupancy some time in August, or, possibly, early in the fall. The cornice work is now being put in place, which gives the structure a finished appearance. The original date stipulated in the contract for the completion of the building was February 1st last, but the delay in procuring an adequate and constant supply of granite stone for building purposes has greatly deferred the work.

Local Negro Character Dead

Peter Waldo, a well-known Salem negro character, died at his home on Front street, in this city, this morning, aged about 40 years, of consumption. Waldo has for years been a familiar figure in Salem. He was raised by Joe Lane, of Douglas county. Funeral services will be held Friday, and burial will probably be had in the Catholic cemetery.

Northern Pacific To Irrigate

TACOMA, Wash., April 10.—President Melien and Vice-President Lamont, of the Northern Pacific railway, are here. The Northern Pacific Irrigation Company was incorporated today to complete and operate forty miles of an irrigation canal in Yakima county. The railway land department thus undertakes irrigation on a large scale as a means of promoting general traffic.

Citizens' Ticket in Clackamas.

OREGON CITY, April 10.—The air was filled today with comments on the Citizens' nomination, made yesterday. The strongest men on the ticket are J. E. Jack for sheriff; William Johnson for assessor; E. H. Cooper for clerk and A. L. Lelling for treasurer. The last two nominees are incumbents of the respective offices. Late last night, just prior to adjournment of the convention, Sheriff J. J. Cook was elected county chairman and Elmer Dixon county secretary.

To Search for Lost Vessel.

LONDON, April 10.—The Admiralty has ordered the cruiser Thames to search the North Atlantic for the missing Allan liner Huronian, which left Glasgow March 28th for St. John, and has not yet been reported.

PUSH CLUB IS HUSTLING

Strikes a Shrewd Blow for Salem

With President Theilisen in the chair, the Salem Push Club held its regular Wednesday meeting yesterday afternoon in the office of Secretary Judah, in the city hall. On recommendation of the executive committee it was decided to send to those of Salem's business men who have not yet joined the organization return postal cards, inviting them to attend the meetings of the club, and, incidentally, to contribute to its support.

The present membership of the club is 226, and by this device it is hoped to bring the names on the roll up to the 500 mark.

The matter of numbering the streets, and erecting name plates at their intersections, was brought up by G. Stolz, but, upon motion of the secretary, further action on the matter was deferred until a more opportune time.

The principal matter decided on at this meeting was the issuing of an edition of 5000 thirty-two page pamphlets, 1 pages reading matter and 12 pages of half-tone cuts descriptive of Salem and its vicinity, and setting forth the advantages of this section to the prospective immigrant. After some discussion it was decided that the contract for the above be awarded to the Statesman Publishing Company, the maximum cost not to exceed \$125.

After this matter had been decided the club adjourned to meet again on the evening of Wednesday, April 16th, at 7:30 o'clock, when the subjects of the long-deferred public rally of the club and the plans for a great Fourth of July celebration in Salem will be fully discussed.

STATE TICKET FILED

Prohibitionists File List of Candidates for Election.

The Prohibition party is the first political party to file its state organization in the office of Secretary of State Dunbar. A certified list of the candidates was filed at the state house Wednesday.

Prohibitionists throughout the state are confident the party will poll a large vote this year than at any previous general election in the history of the party in Oregon. At the June election, 1900, the party cast 4500 votes, but O. S. Jory, a prominent Prohibition worker of Salem, says the party will this year double, and, probably, treble its vote of two years ago. Mr. Jory bases his prediction on the encouraging reports received of unusually large and enthusiastic county conventions, and the evidence of an unprecedented interest and activity among Prohibition workers generally all over the state.

James A. Tate, secretary of the National Prohibition party organization, will canvass the state in the interest of the party, and substantial results are expected. Mr. Tate's itinerary has not been arranged, but his date for Salem will be announced in good season.

Attorney-General—T. H. Goynes, of Tillamook.

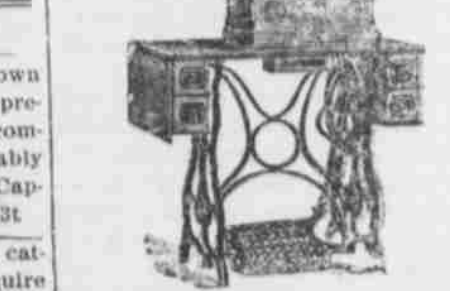
Congressmen—First district, Rev. Hiram Gould, of Yamhill; second district, F. R. Spaulding, of Wasco.

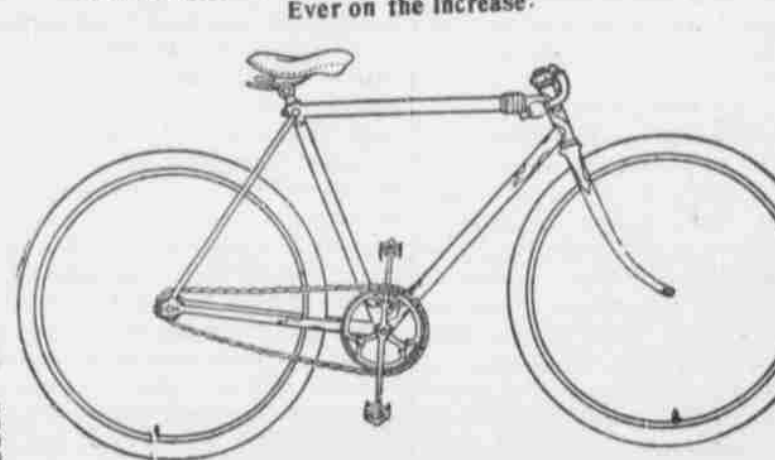
