THE AFTERNOON PAPER LEADS. The "Editor and Publisher," the leading publication in this country devoted to the newspaper business, devotes considerable space to discussing the question of the relative merits of the morning and evening newspapers.

At the present time this authority asserts that the evening papers have the best of it, because they have the largest circulation, citing the Evening Journal and Evening World, of New York City, as being the widest read of any newspapers in the world.

This condition, says the "Editor and Publisher," is due to the fact that the evening paper contains fresher news, and is issued at a time of day when the people have the most time to read, especially in the family circle, and generally sells at a lower price.

THE BOER CAMPAIGN. The South African republicans in rebellion against England are carrying on a campaign for the conversion of Americans to the justice of their cause.

They have men of ability making addresses in all of the principal Eastern and Western cities. While the burghers keep the field against the British, their leaders are using moral suasion with the nations.

If the Boers maintain themselves in the field for several years, as they now seem confident of doing, these orators can make a great deal of sentiment in the next few years, and they may be able to get political action.

The Boer campaign is liable to divide England, and create revolutions in other countries.

The justice of their cause, and the progressive spirit of the times is making sentiment in favor of these virile republics, whose armies are the heroes of modern times, and command the admiration of the world.

FOR SMALL POSTAL CURRENCY. There has been a great need for many years of a small postal currency to send through the mails without expense for exchange.

The demand grows out of the difficulty and inconvenience that many people experience in remitting small amounts when out of reach of banks and postoffice.

Postal currency ranging from ten cents upwards would be used extensively in small remittances, and the loss would not fall on the government, as all such would fall on the person sending.

A commission, consisting of three officials each, from the postoffice department and the treasury department are in session at Washington to consider the question of the establishment of a postal currency.

The present plan is to provide for a small currency to take the place of one and two-dollar bills, which, it is believed, will prove a safer method for the transmission of small amounts through the mails, as it is intended that these notes shall be payable only at the place designated thereon by the purchaser.

The people would get a safe and inexpensive means of sending small amounts through the mails, and the government would be the gainer on all wear and tear and loss from any cause whatever.

TWO PHILIPPINE POLICIES. Philadelphia Press.

The two opposing policies on the Philippines become more defined and distinct. The bill for temporary government reported by the majority of the senate committee embodies the Republican purpose. The substitute bill presented by the minority embodies the Democratic plan.

The first is what its title signifies. It creates a temporary government. For this purpose it takes the existing administration, gives it legislative sanction with some modification, and carries it further on the lines already marked out. As soon as peace shall be established a census is to be taken with the full information necessary to enable the organization of a permanent popular representative government. Meanwhile provision is made that the public lands may be utilized and the development of the islands may proceed.

In the substitute bill the Democrats for the first time adopt a clear and definite policy on the Philippines. They have heretofore divided, evaded and unitedly scuttled. This bill is unambiguously scuttled. This bill is unambiguously supported by the Democrats of the committee, and frames what they have deliberately agreed on as the party policy. As such it presents a tangible and vital issue which will be fought out in the campaign of this year and in the presidential election.

convention, assure the fulfillment of the obligation of the Paris treaty and organize an independent Philippine government. Then we are to recognize the Philippines as an independent and sovereign nation and withdraw all our forces, except at such naval stations as may be fixed upon. At the same time we are to negotiate with England, France, Germany and other powers for the inviolability of the Philippine republic from foreign interference.

That is, we are to haul down our flag, withdraw our forces, give up all power and authority, and yet stand sponsor to the world for the conduct of the Philippines and sponsor to the Philippines for protection from the rest of the world. That will be a mighty interesting issue, and there will be plenty of time to discuss it.

THE EXCLUSION BILL. The Chinese exclusion bill has already been amended in the interest of the big corporations, and will be further amended, or defeated, as suits their interests.

The bill does not exclude coolie laborers that are employed in connection with railroads and steamboat traffic.

The coolies employed on all section gangs and track and bridge gangs are an injustice to white labor.

On all Eastern roads the section hands are white men, and live with their families in neat cottages along the tracks.

They support the government, the schools, the church and the business of the community and are taxpayers. The exclusion bill is better than no legislation, but it is unjust to favor the big rich corporations, as the measure certainly does.

FACTS ABOUT TERRITORIES. A Washington correspondent furnishes the New York Tribune with some facts concerning the population, wealth and industries of Arizona, Oklahoma and New Mexico, which constitute strong reasons for their admission to statehood.

Arizona has a population of nearly 200,000. New Mexico combined, possesses taxable property worth \$200,000,000, and has the richest mines on earth.

Oklahoma has 500,000 inhabitants, raises and exports more live stock and farm products than any other equal area of the United States, and has as fine cities and towns within her borders and as good a system of public schools as can be found in many of the states.

New Mexico has a population of 330,000 American citizens, taxable property worth \$300,000,000, an area equal to all of the New England states, New York and New Jersey combined, is second in the nation as a cattle grower, first in the amount of money it has invested in public buildings per capita, first in the non-sectarian public school buildings which it possesses per capita and in the money invested in them and annually spent in the education of its children.

These facts ought to commend themselves to the favorable consideration of Congress, and induce it to pass enabling acts for the admission of all three territories to statehood. They have doubtless a better right to favor than some now incorporated in the Union.

THE SHIPPING SUBSIDY BILL IN THE HOUSE. The immediate consideration of the shipping bill in the house is unlikely.

The outlook for favorable consideration is by no means rosy at any time; for in addition to a practically unanimous opposition to the measure by the Democrats, there are other sources of hostility to the measure that would insure its certain defeat if it were called up at this time.

The bill will go to the house committee on merchant marine and fisheries. There are four Republican members of this committee who have already gone on record in opposition to a ship-subsidy measure. They are Minor of Wisconsin, Stevens of Minnesota, Jones of Washington and Fordney of Michigan. These members opposed the ship-subsidy legislation in the last Congress and amended the Frye bill out of all semblance of its original form. They are far from being ready to support any measure of the kind and decline to commit themselves in support of the measure which has just passed the senate.

The Republican members of the committee who are opposed to the ship-subsidy legislation are also, by coincidence, aligned with the best sugar men in the fight against the ways and means committee's proposition for tariff concessions to Cuba. This fact is the cause of much enthusiasm among the best-sugar advocates who feel that they are now in a position to force a fight on ship subsidy legislation if Senator Hanna and other friends of the ship subsidy persist in bringing pressure to bear in support of the ways and means program for a reduction of the tariff on Cuban sugar. Without question the friends of beet sugar will use their influence to have the subsidy bill held up so long as the ways and means committee persist in its present attitude on the Cuban sugar concessions.

The committee on merchant marine and fisheries is composed of eleven Republicans and six Democrats. The defection of four Republicans will prevent a favorable report upon the measure.

The opposition of Senators Allison of Iowa and Spooner of Wisconsin is considered an indication of the feeling on the matter in their states, and it is expected to have considerable influence upon the vote of western members of the house. Speaker Henderson has been placed in an embarrassing position. If he supports the bill he will place himself in the position of antagonizing the two senators from his state, who have already demonstrated the hold they have on the Iowa people by their re-election to the senate. If he opposes the bill he places himself in the position of antagonizing the administration, Senator Hanna and the powerful influences behind the bill.

Two Democratic members of the New York delegation are reported to be favorable to the bill, and it is probable that six votes for the bill would be secured on the Democratic side. Preliminary polls among the Republicans indicate that there are more than thirty members of the majority who will openly oppose the bill, and there are nearly as many more who will vote for it under pressure, but will make no effort to secure support for it.

News of the State. When Mrs. Matt Shores, of The Dalles, awoke Tuesday morning she found her baby son, aged three months, dead upon her arm. She was much shocked by the discovery. No particular cause can be found for his sudden demise.

Considerable indignation is felt at The Dalles because a smallpox patient named Hastings, who had but just recovered from the disease, and who was in the "healing stage," walked all over that town, unnecessarily exposing others.

Michael Neeley, of Wamic, was placed under \$100 bonds at The Dalles for making threats upon the life of a woman named Campbell.

There is an eccentric man named Jorgenson in a railroad camp near The Dalles. He claims that he has been commanded by the Lord to fast until he could eat. He has already been without food for 28 days, it is claimed. Though somewhat emaciated he is otherwise well.

H. Kern, of Waterloo, cut his left wrist with an ax very severely while splitting kindling wood.

The channel of the Elokomat river is being changed near Cathlamet to a straighter course.

Mrs. Mary Brittain's chimney burned out at The Dalles the other day, and the sparks caught the roof. She turned in an alarm calling out the fire department, which arrived on a trot. Meanwhile she got up on the roof with a bucket of water and put out the fire herself.
