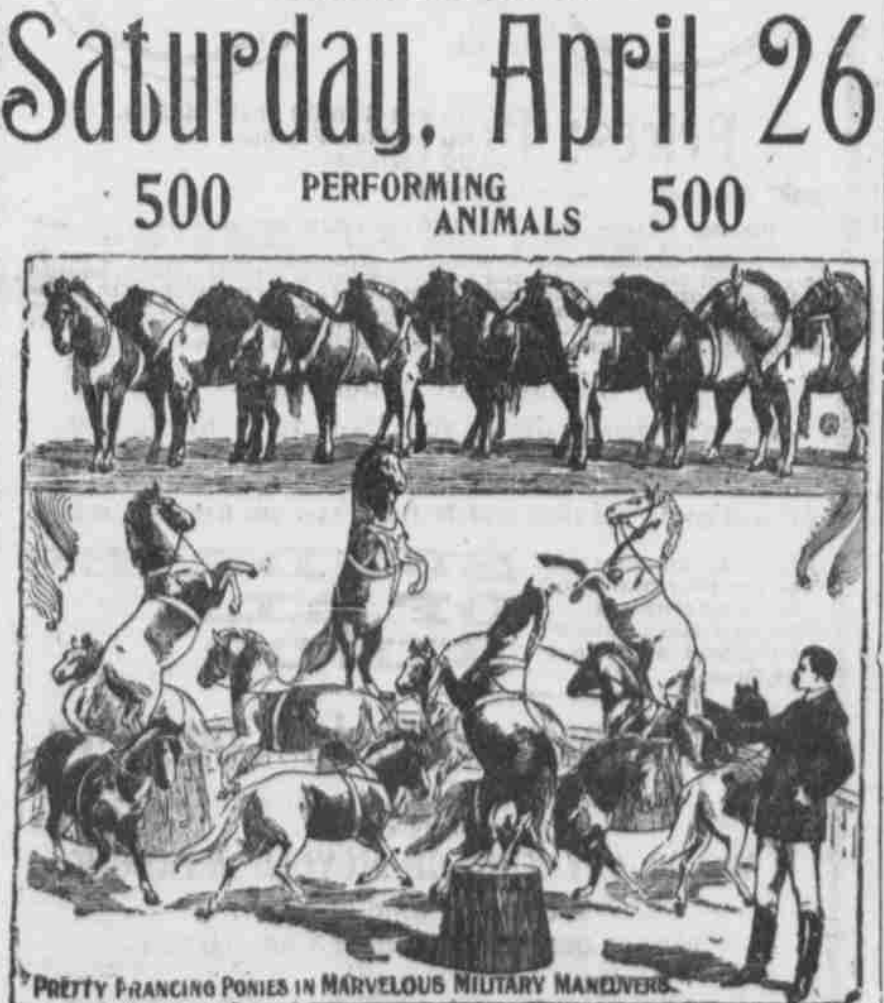

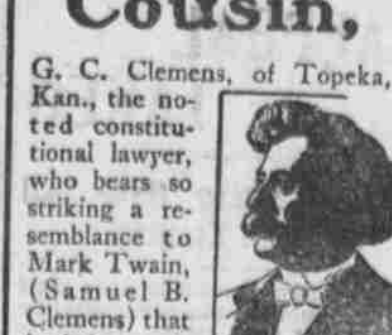
**Recital Tonight.**

**Traffic At The Locks**  
The Portland General Electric Company filed with Governor Geer a report for the quarter ending March 31st, and showing the amount of river traffic on the Willamette river, as compiled at the Oregon City canal and locks. The number of steamers passing through the locks was 347, representing a total passenger list of 3884 and an aggregate freightage of 5363 tons. Other items in the report were the following: Number of cattle, 272; sheep and hogs, 210; feet of lumber, 310,188; feet of logs, 133,000; cords of wood, 106.

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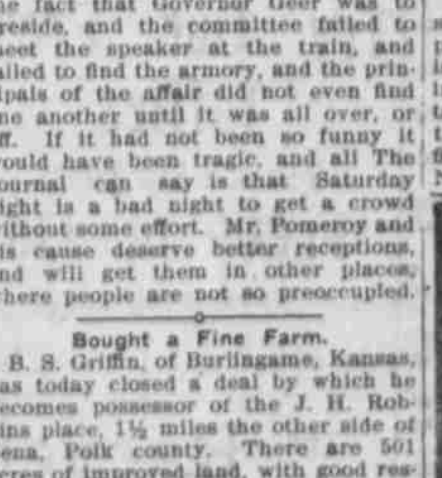

**CATTLE VS. SHEEP.**  
Trouble is Brewing Fast in Grant County.

Word comes from Northern Grant county to the effect that the war between sheep and cattle men of what is called the Greenhorn section has again been renewed. For the past several years a bitter fight has been on between the rangers of the sheep and cattle country and where the trouble will end cannot be foreseen. The cattle men have declared that no sheep can run at large in their territory and they have issued the following notice, which they declare they will not deviate from:

"We, the undersigned miners and residents of the Greenhorn district, situated in Grant county, do solemnly refuse to let sheep graze on said ground."

This edict is said to be against every hoof of sheep and does not simply mean that people of other parts of the country cannot bring in their sheep and range on the cattle man's territory, but means that a single sheep will be allowed to run at large in the territory that this notice covers. Not even the man who lives in the immediate section will be allowed to range his sheep off his own land.

The notice is said to be signed by most of the cattle men in the Greenhorn country, and trouble will certainly result if they undertake to carry out the order.—Pendleton E.O.

Outside. Railroads Planning a Campaign.  
CHICAGO, April 12.—A new competitor to the "community of interest" plan evolved by the Harriman and Hill-Morgan syndicates is expected to be born of a conference held at the Auditorium Annex, in which Frank Rockefeller, of Cleveland; Charles E. Perkins, former president of the Burlington line; Stuyvesant Fish, president of the Illinois Central, and A. B. Stickney, president of the Chicago Great Western, took part, says the Inter-Ocean.

The road controlled by Mr. Stickney is reported as the backbone of the proposed enterprise, which, if carried out, is calculated to disturb the harmony in the railroad world that has obtained since the two great money interests of Wall street fought to a finish last May over the control of the Northern Pacific.
