## THERE IS NO SCUTTLE PARTY IN OREGON.

The Portland Oregonian misrepresents the Democrats of Oregon in saying their platform on the Philippines represents a policy of "scuttle." Their platform does not advocate abandonment of the islands.

On the contrary, it takes intelligent and patriotic ground in favor of asserting American sovereignty in trade relations to give us the benefit of their commerce instead of taxing it for the trusts. This is advocated by men like Corbett and has been the policy of Mr. Scott until his recent flip.

On the Philippine question the platform says:

"The inhabitants of the Philippines have petitioned for free trade with the United States and the request has been seconded by the Philippine commission and the sentiment of the American people, yet the Republican congress refuses any proper relief, but enacts a tariff law for those islands more burdensome and less defensible than the acts of the British parliament against which our forefathers rebelled."

"The policy which makes one law for the Hawaiian islands, another for Porto Rico, and another for the Philippines, cannot be upheld on any ground except that of subservience to the sugar and tobacco trusts."

"Our insular possessions are either part of our country or are foreign territory. If part of our territory, the people are entitled to the same trade conditions and privileges that are granted any of our territories. We believe that the true policy is to prepare the people of those islands for self-government as speedily as possible, and when so prepared, to grant them independence, retaining such coaling stations and ports as may be necessary to protect these islands from foreign interference, and to maintain our trade relations with the Orient."

The Democratic platform advocates the human and enlightened policy that characterized all of McKinley's messages on the subject, and the sentiment of the best and most enlightened Americans today.

## HARVEY SCOTT ON STUMP SPEAKERS.

In an editorial on the candidates for governor the mouthpiece of the present dominant faction at Portland has this:

"Mr. Furnish is a man of ability, of character and of force. He is not a stump speaker, which is no defect, for your stump speaker is usually a shallow man, whose flutulent eloquence confuses the matter of discussion and darkens knowledge."

Without reflection on Mr. Furnish, who has said he will take the stump in his own behalf, the above is not complimentary to men like Mr. Geer who are relied on to carry elections in states like Ohio and Oregon.

After all is said and done, public discussion cannot be done away with and maintain free institutions. Talk is among freemen the avenue for full presentation and the channel for reaching conclusions.

It is public speaking that carries great national campaigns. In Oregon men like Timon Ford, C. B. Moore, Willis Dunaway, and even Geer have more than once helped materially save the day for the Republicans. That does not make them shallow men, whose mental flutteness works injury to the cause of good government. If the above slur on all stump speakers were true, it is a question if it is not honest and better in all ways to carry an election by such shallowness than by use of money.

Of course a state that had only one great man, and he the editor of the only "great" paper, and that editor in control of the dominant faction, and make him in addition U. S. Senator, no speakers are needed.

One great mind would be the whole thing and all the rest could be mere silent citizens, reading what is put at them, "dumb and driven cattle." But even Oregon is not yet in that state of perfect political vassalage. In the meantime the people will hear some stump speakers.

The John Stout planing mill had it difficult to get enough lumber to make stock for buildings already ordered, and the proprietor has written to Hanson & Landon to get them to start up their mill in Linn county. ## PROGRESS OF THE PEOPLE.

In spite of the warring factions and the corruption of politics, the people of Oregon can get some progress out of the situation. The last legislature passed a law that candidates for the senate can be put on the Australian ballot, and voted on at the regular election.

The amendment to the constitution should be adopted at the June election giving the people direct legislative powers. While the bosses hope that will be a dead letter, there will be some good got out of it.

The third great step in the development of popular government is direct nomination—really the first and most important of all—because the bosses have the power to nominate they are still in the saddle.

With the general use of money and corporation influence, and the corruption of the primary by office-seekers, conventions are no longer representative.

With the election of senators taken out of the legislature, with the power of direct nomination in the hands of the people, and with direct legislation Oregon would be a model government.

While the government will never rise much above the virtue and patriotism of the people, it should be at least as good as the people, and that is not now the case, owing to corruptive systems.

With systems in which the people will be trained in the right direction, and away from the corrupt practices of leadership that rests on boodle, the people will be benefited, instead of demoralized.

Politics in Oregon is fought out by the people on a very small margin of success for honest men or decent measures. What little progress is secured in the way of better government will be gained by the people holding onto a large-sized club of independence, and using it to the end of the fight.

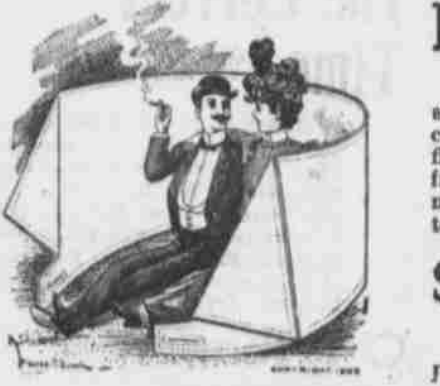
