AN ORIENTAL NUISANCE.

The Chinese minister, Wu Ting Fang, is an international nuisance who should be abated, or this country has good grounds for declaring diplomatic war against China.

This week both Republican and Democratic candidates for governor are to be at Salem. The public demonstration first planned for Mr. Furnish has been abandoned, and it has not yet been decided what will be done for Mr. Chamberlain.

It was planned to have three or four prominent speakers here for Furnish, and have him speak, but that was called off, and he will be put in charge of a committee of the Republican Club, and shown around to the people he ought to meet.

Mr. Chamberlain will come to Salem probably to hold a public meeting, and will receive a cordial welcome in this Republican stronghold, where he lived for about six years when he was attorney-general.

publican, and got great applause on both sides of the House. Washington is bound to be advertised in the eyes of the world, even by its members.

Cushman showed rare courage and ability to do as daring a thing as attack the speaker, and yet do it good-naturedly, and win general applause, even from Republicans.

He declared that no bill, public or private, could be considered without the speaker's approval. If there were more men in Congress like Cushman, that fetish of rules and speaker-worship would be broken.

The rules of the House and the exalted one-man-power of the speaker have become the cloak behind which members of Congress hide and excuse themselves for not getting measures through Congress that they have promised the people.

Two facts stand out prominent in Mr. Cushman's performance: A man don't have to be in Congress a lifetime to get a national reputation. Second, the present rules of the House are not in the way of the official class passing any bill to increase their swag, while only one river and harbor bill has passed in ten years.

ROBERT INMAN FOR MAYOR OF PORTLAND.

The Citizens' ticket in Portland will be headed by Robert Inman for mayor, as against Geo. H. Williams, nominee of the Scott faction.

Inman is an energetic business man, at the head of a large lumber and saw-mill business. He is a man in his prime, a man of affairs, one of the captains of industry and employers of labor.

His opponent has held high office, but there is no evidence that has ever exerted a restraining influence against predatory politics that has sunk Portland in the mire of debt and high taxes.

Geo. H. Williams offers no opposition to the schemes of the Jack Matthews gang, or he would not have been nominated. As a world's fair mayor he is a pretty slow proposition, except as a dead-end proposition for the present push.

The people of Portland should elect a man of the character of Robert Inman very easily, and take their city out of factional politics.

PROTECT THE SAVINGS.

A court in Michigan has just decided that the savings deposits in a wrecked bank at Detroit must be given preference over the commercial deposits.

The Journal still holds that the deposits of the school children in the wrecked Gilbert Bros. bank should be given preference over all other depositors.

The children were innocent parties, and their deposits were received through the action of the school board, in designating that bank as a depository.

If there is no way to pay the children's deposits out of the proceeds of the bank's assets, then the school district should reimburse them fully for all less than 100 cents on the dollar that the bank pays.

The board of education did not protect the school children by taking any bond, or even by having the books kept so as to show an account with each child. Let the community be honest with the children.

THE TRUE NEWSPAPER VIEW.

About men and measures a newspaper should take the public view. If it really wishes to serve the public it should never descend to the treatment of politics as a private snap.

The theory that in public affairs some one is going to ride on the backs of the people, and that the whole struggle is who shall ride, is the Tammany idea, and is founded on spoils.

Political parties must stand for certain principles. If the managers lose sight of principles for spoils, as they generally do, one party is as good as the other.

A newspaper that is not a mere spoils organ should labor to help the people fully understand any given situation or campaign, and then strike hard blows daily to get the best result out of that condition.

The Journal cannot see the justice or fairness or protection to public interests that comes from striking down men who have made a good record in public service, because some faction demands it.

The faction may have the power to control party programs and conventions, but that does not make it right, and the people have a right, and at the polls should protect themselves against such outrages.

Baker City Will Have it in Connection With District Fair.

BAKER CITY, Or., April 17.—At a mass meeting of citizens held this evening under the auspices of the Chamber of Commerce it was decided to hold a street fair and carnival here in September next, in conjunction with the first district fair of Eastern Oregon, which is held alternately in Baker City and La Grande.

Cottage Grove to Bohemia.

EUGENE, April 17.—The contract for grading 20 miles of the railroad from Cottage Grove to Bohemia has been let. The greater part of the distance has been secured by the Alexander & Campbell Company, of Cottage Grove, the remainder going to a Portland firm.

It is announced that the work of grading will commence next Monday. The surveyors have finished setting the grade stakes, and everything is ready for the beginning of actual construction of the road. It is claimed by some that the road will be finished before next winter, while others contend that only a part of it will be built this year, and the remainder next summer.
