FOR A JOINT CANVASS

Itinerary Will Be Arranged This Week.

Socialists Ask for Recognition On Canvass.

Saturday was a busy day, politically, for Salem. The county central committees of the Republican, Democrat and Socialist parties, were all in session.

The Democrats declared for a joint canvass with the Republicans, who, in the committee meeting, voted to do whatever the Democrats might desire in the matter of the campaign in this county. A joint canvass is, therefore, ensured. The Republicans delegated the work of arranging the details to Chairman Culver and the candidates. The usual committee was appointed to raise a campaign fund. It consists of A. O. Condit, A. F. Hobart, E. M. LaFore, J. F. Jones and H. A. Johnson. The matter of procuring campaign buttons was referred to J. M. Poorman, of Woodburn, Marion county member of the state central committee.

The Democrats held a largely attended meeting in the Hughes-D'Arcy building. After a general discussion as to the best means of polling the full party vote, and other details pertaining to the campaign, Chairman W. H. Downing and Clerk P. L. Frazier were appointed a committee to confer with the Republicans and arrange for a joint canvass.

Special importance was urged by members of both committees of securing a full registration of electors before the time expires on May 15th, and much missionary work in this direction will be done.

The purpose of the meeting of the Socialists was to complete their ticket. The resignation of R. H. Ryan, as state senator on the Marion county ticket, was accepted and John Hunt, of South Salem, was named to fill the vacancy. Mr. Ryan was nominated Socialist candidate for governor subsequent to his senatorial nomination in this county. In his action Saturday, Mr. Ryan evidently decided to stay with the nomination carrying the greatest honor with it, if possible, the least chance of a successful result. The Socialists named T. Y. McClellan and J. E. Murphy as a committee to meet with the Republicans and Democrats, and, if possible, arrange for a representation of their party candidates in the proposed joint canvass.

Tax Money To Treasury

Sheriff Durbin this morning turned over to Treasurer Downing \$24,650.16 collected on account of 1901 taxes. Of that amount there is placed to the credit of the City of Salem \$3109.14, and to the Salem school district \$2669.27. This is the fifth payment of 1901 taxes that has been placed in the county treasury by Sheriff Durbin. The five payments represent in the aggregate \$124,155.96, or over 50 per cent of the entire roll, which amounts to about \$218,000.

How's This for Oregon Cattle

J. W. Hunt, of Macleay, today sold E. C. Cross 10 head of 3-year-old steers of the Shorthorn family, that averaged 1400 pounds each. The animals were splendid pieces of cattle flesh, and indicates what the Willamette valley is capable of producing in the way of beef cattle.

The Republicans Have Accepted

W. J. Culver, chairman of the Marion county Republican central committee, this morning filed with County Clerk Hall the acceptances of all the Republican candidates for legislative and county offices. The Democrats and Socialists have not filed any of their acceptances, but, by law, have until May 1st to do so.

Mr. Cleeton is an advocate of the election of Mr. Fulton to the Senate to succeed Senator Simon.

Mrs. Simonton was the mother of thirteen children, most of whom are still living. Mrs. H. William Thelisen and Mrs. James Gibson, of Polk county, and Mrs. A. Smith, of Portland, are among the surviving daughters. Miss Kate Simonton, who formerly attended Willamette University, is another daughter of the deceased. Funeral services were held at Rickreall this afternoon, and were attended by Henry B. Thelisen and family, of this city.

SALEM LABOR ORGANIZED

Local Branch American Federation Formed

An Enthusiastic Meeting Held Sunday Afternoon.

Organized labor in Salem received a strong impetus Sunday, as the result of an enthusiastic conference of wage-earners, held in Popular Hall. The result of the meeting was the organization of a local branch of the American Federation of Labor. C. C. Worrick served as chairman of the meeting. The officers are: President, W. E. Miller, a cigar maker; secretary, A. N. Dalrymple, newspaper man; treasurer, T. J. Clark, a fruit grower. The application for a charter was signed by the following persons, representing the various trades: G. F. Sherwood, B. S. Drake, H. E. Miller, W. L. Davis, A. Benson, James R. Musgrave, H. A. Dougherty, J. S. Benson, A. M. Dalrymple, T. J. Clark, E. P. Dove, A. B. Wood and A. Ashblman. The lists were being circulated today, and when the required number of names have been secured, the application will be forwarded to the national secretary. When the charter is received, the Salem branch will effect permanent organization.

Before organizing, the gathering of laboring men, to the number of about 100, listened to short addresses by A. W. Dennis and E. Hofer, who urged the importance of organizing the various trades, as a protective measure to the laboring classes. State Organizer G. Y. Harry, of Portland, followed, and in a plain, business talk told of what had been accomplished by labor unions in procuring better wages, and in maintaining a remunerative wage schedule, to the great improvement of conditions among the laboring classes. Mr. Harry showed the need of keeping up the interest in local unions, as a business proposition.

Died From The Operation

Ross Pemberton, the 17-year-old son of Clarkson Pemberton, of Rosedale, died at the Salem Hospital early Sunday morning, from the effects of an operation performed last week for appendicitis. Funeral services were conducted at the family home south of Salem this afternoon, and burial took place in the Rosedale cemetery.
