SALEM WILL CELEBRATE

Independence Day To Be Fit-tingly Observed.

Celebration Will Eclipse All Previous Attempts.

A mass meeting of citizens Monday evening unanimously voted to celebrate July 4th at Salem this year in a manner never before attempted in Western Oregon. The result of the meeting was the appointment of a committee of seven on general arrangements, consisting of County Judge John H. Scott, C. H. Hinges, W. Merriman, H. D. Patton, C. A. Murphy, H. W. Barr and J. G. Graham. This committee will outline a definite program for the celebration, appoint its various sub-committees and report at an adjourned meeting to be held at the city hall on next Monday evening, April 28th, when further details of the celebration will be mapped out.

The meeting Monday evening was attended by nearly 100 citizens, and enthusiasm was everywhere. There were no attempts at oratory by the various speakers, but the announcement of determination to hold a grand celebration, made individually, was greeted with applause. City Recorder N. J. Judah, upon motion, acted as chairman of the meeting, and F. J. Wilson was made secretary. There was great unanimity of feeling among those in attendance favorable to the celebration, and all that was necessary was organization for the utilization of the restrained patriotic sentiment.

Some remarks were offered by S. Friedman and P. H. D'Arcy advocating a lively celebration of Independence day. Mr. D'Arcy hoped to hear the eagle clap its wings so emphatically that he echo would reverberate from the Coast range to the Cascades. County Judge Scott was called for and responded in the same vein. He looked to the newspapers to aid in the agitation. C. A. Murphy wanted to have a celebration that was the reason he was at the meeting. A. W. Prescott advocated the policy of early action on the part of Salem people, that minor celebrations throughout the valley might be forestalled and an attractive celebration provided at Salem for the entertainment of the entire Willamette valley population. He moved that it be declared the sense of the meeting that Salem celebrate the Fourth of July this year in a manner never before attempted by any city in Western Oregon. The motion prevailed by a unanimous vote.

G. Stolz hoped to see the matter of the celebration largely delegated to the young men, and stated a motion to that effect, but, after some discussion, the motion was withdrawn, with the understanding that the young men were willing and ready and would assume their share of the work and responsibility that attached to the projected celebration.

C. H. Hinges moved that a general committee be appointed by the citizens assembled, to consist of seven members, that committee to select its own sub-committees, outline a definite plan of entertainment for the celebration and report at an adjourned meeting, to be held next Monday evening. The committee as above indicated was nominated by acclamation, and, after a vote of thanks, upon the motion of H. D. Patton, had been extended to the Salem Military band for its gratuitous service in parading the streets and discouraging music in the interest of the mass meeting, adjournment was taken.

EXPERTING NEARLY FINISHED

Work Has Been Transferred to Treasurer's Office

Report Will Be Received By County Court In May.

Experts Clarke and Buchanan, who are investigating the records of the principal Marion county officers, practically completed their work in County Clerk Hall's department on Monday evening, and this morning began checking over the records in Treasurer Downing's office. The work in the treasurer's office will require only a few days, and that will complete the investigations undertaken under the contract. The report will be completed and submitted to the county court at its regular monthly meeting in May, but until that time no part of the report will be made public.

The expediting of the Marion county records was commenced last November, and, with the exception of two months, February and March, has been continued regularly and without any material delay. The cost for having the work done will likely approximate \$1000. The compensation to be paid the expert accountants has not yet been determined. The court directed that the matter be left to a committee consisting of Claud Gatch and Joseph Albert, who, in connection with the county court, should fix the pay, not to exceed \$5 each per day. The matter has not yet been referred to the committee, officially, and no action has been taken by the members thereof in relation to the subject. The compensation to be allowed will probably be arranged when the work of expediting shall have been completed.

STATE SEWER WORK

To Be Resumed When Weather Is Favorable.

Work on the partially constructed state sewer will be resumed as soon as weather conditions become settled and favorable. Such was the statement made Monday evening by C. A. Gray, who holds the construction for the construction of the sewer. The work was begun last fall, and about 2000 feet of the canal was completed. There remain about 2000 feet to dig and Mr. Gray estimates that it will require from two to three months to finish the job.

The sewer being constructed will serve the insane asylum, state penitentiary and state house.
