THE ORGANIZER VERSUS THE POOR MAN.

The Oregonian of Thursday has an entire column devoted to contrasting Mr. Chamberlain and Mr. Furnish. Personally, the general tenor of which is that since Mr. Chamberlain is about 50 years old, and still a poor man, he is unfit to govern, while Mr. Furnish is an ideal man for the position because he has made money.

The Journal wonders how many Republican farmers and workmen of the Oregonian will combine over themselves to vote for Mr. Furnish for this reason. If the Oregonian is going to try to carry this agricultural state by making this contrast, it is tackling a pretty big job. The less said along this line the better.

It is true that Mr. Furnish's friends have continually "pointed with pride" to the fact that he is an "organizer." Beyond that, little has been said in his favor that has got into the papers. In this connection it may be said that all the great trust magnates, from Morgan down, are magnificent "organizers." It is from under the banner of the "organizers" that the country is just now trying to escape. Better let us along that line. Thomas Jefferson said a poor man and the Republican candidate will in no wise compare with him, at least not yet.

And yet, alongside this column of personal contrast is another editorial declaring that "the coming election is to be decided on high consideration. The personal element will not be great. Then why devote a whole column to the 'personal element'?"

OUR PRIDE NOT IN POLITICS.
"Politics is rotten" is one of the commonest expressions heard in our country. It is a hopeful sign that it is coming to be recognized as having a basis of fact.

The cause of Spain's degeneracy, from the rank of a proud world-power to the tattered remnant of a decadent nation, is said to be found by historians in the laws of regulating her political organizations.

If the forms of our republican institutions are becoming corrupt, shall we reap a different harvest from that gathered by a corrupt monarchy?

By the arbitrament of war vast territories formerly belonging to Spain have fallen under the sovereignty of the United States. The first of these possessions to adopt civil rule was the island of Negros, that in October 1899, held an election to choose officers by direct vote of the people.

How the natives of Negros must have rejoiced at the successful substitution of self-government for the centuries of monarchial rule! It is our aspirations to give democratic institutions.

tutions to nearly twenty millions of population taken from Spain.

But the Malays of the Asiatic archipelago and the Spanish and the Negro races of the West Indies whom we have taken under our flag should also be told that popular elections under the American system are not unimproved blessings. We should tell them that in our country candidates for office are sometimes robbed of all freedom to serve the people who elect them to office but are pledged to serve interests directly opposed to the people's interest.

We should tell them that our forms of political organization carry with them features not known to the laws and the constitution, creations existing in defiance of statutes, disgraceful in the absence of an aroused public sentiment.

We can proudly tell them that American homes are the best in the world that American women possess the dreams of the poets in their varied excellencies; that a thousand American citizens taken anywhere from the great body of the people of the United States are the peers of any race in existence in all that comprises intelligence, enterprise and patriotism.

But how can we explain or justify to them a person called a political boss, the thing known as a packed primary, the nominating convention going through the farce of deliberation over a slate of tickets, the public office mortgaged in advance to some faction, ring or private corporation.

Of sixty applicants for admission to the Northwestern University, at Evanston, Ill., recently only twenty could pass the examination in spelling. Yet the English language is presumed to be taught in the public schools.

To get a full vote in Oregon this year under the present registration law would cost thousands of dollars in each county, and a hundred thousand dollars in the state. That is the way we put a premium on the rich man operating in politics.

As both Chamberlain and Furnish held several offices, it ought not to be difficult to ascertain which worked the graft the hardest. So far, Chamberlain has not even been accused of it.

Governor Murphy, of Arizona, announces in his paper that he will resign. Alexander O. Brodie, Lieutenant Colonel of Missouri's Rough Riders, will succeed him, having already been named by the president.

As the beef trust is regulating the price of beef, and most of the hopes are contracted for in Oregon at big game, the election of a Democratic governor like Furnish or Chamberlain cannot paralyze these industries.

Til Ford will make a speech next Saturday at the Marion square mass meeting that will warm up some of the boys. He has "bin there an' helped skin 'em."

The day is rare when the German or English press does not insult the government of the United States. But Uncle Sam keeps right on smiling.

THE WAY TO ELECT SENATOR. Petitions are in circulation for Geor for senator on the Australian ballot plan, election by the people. The plan was provided for by the factor in control of the last legislature.

The Portland Citizens' delegation was elected two years ago on two propositions: to give the people a direct nomination law, and the other to pass a bill to give the people a vote direct on senator.

That Citizens' delegation passed the Lockwood primary law, that legislator machine slates and the unit rule, and struck out of the bill Mr. E. W. Bingham's provision for direct nomination.

Mays bill, under which a state convention can nominate and place on the ballot a candidate for United States senator, to be submitted to a direct vote of the people.

That faction used the Lockwood law to get control of Multnomah county and run the unit rule on their delegation and state convention, but refused to put up a candidate for popular vote.

They failed to keep their pledges and the friends of Governor Geor will not be justified in putting him on the ticket by petition, and if Governor Geor would go out and show up the methods of electing a senator usually resorted to in Oregon the people would give him a big vote.

He would expose the way legislators are lured to buy senatorships, and the way the dominant faction conducts their convention, and dodged nominating a senator.

About the only bill Congress can pass under its present rules is the appropriation bills, and bills to increase offices. The present congress has passed a bill to make the census bureau a permanent thing. It might as well be so, because they never get through taking one census before another ten-year period has rolled around. Now many have been invented to do all the counting and counting, but the million clerk will be kept employed just the same.

Senator Mitchell had to go before the people of his party for a re-nomination as United States senator, as Jones of Arkansas had to, (and was defeated). Mitchell would never have voted for the Hanna-Payne ship subsidy bill.
