DO NOT BE ALARMED, BRETHREN

The newspapers that rush to the defense of Mr. Whitney, the Republican candidate for state printer, are not making much headway.

The plain fact is the Republican nominee is the editor of a Republican paper at Albany, controlled by the faction that nominated him; his partner is already the postmaster of that town, and for doing party service for the Mitchell faction that newspaper is to be given another office that now costs the people of the state \$25,000 a year.

Now all this is nothing against Mr. Whitney, but all the facts amount to a great deal to the people of Oregon.

The further facts in the case are that the state printing office has been a good thing for its owner, Mr. F. C. Baker, of Portland, who has made from \$50,000 to \$100,000 out of it, and still owns it, and the state doesn't even own a proof press, but furnishes a large part of the state house for Mr. Baker's printing office, rent free, and Mr. Baker naturally wants Mr. Whitney elected, so he can continue to rent the plant to the state through Mr. Whitney if he is elected.

There is a further connection, and that is Jack Matthews and W. P. Keady, the faction leaders at Portland, and professional lobbyists, who secured the enforcement of the unit rule on their delegation of 67 votes, and landed the nomination for Mr. Whitney, are to have a rake-off for services rendered, and they will not be at all modest about demanding it, if there is any such arrangement.

But the state printing press need not be alarmed. Jim Godfrey, the Democratic nominee, is a poor man. The Journal is a small "freak" paper, and only reaches a part of the people. Whitney has a ten-thousand majority in his favor, and the indications are that the state printing graft will not be broken. The robbery will go on.

ONE FAIR PARTY PAPER.

The Astoria News, Republican, is fair enough to print this:

The Salem Journal says "The Portland Oregonian misrepresents the Democrats of Oregon in saving their platforms on the Philippines represents a policy of 'scuttling.' Their platform does not advocate the abandonment of the islands. On the contrary, it takes intelligent and patriotic ground in favor of asserting American sovereignty in trade relations to give us the benefit of their commerce. This is advocated by men like Corbett, and has been the policy of Mr. Scott until his recent flop."

NOMINATIONS ARE TOO EXPENSIVE.

Friends of good government should attend the direct primary meeting at Salem Saturday.

The plain facts about the way primaries are now held, and were conducted in the very campaign now going on, and less than a month ago, ought to insure a great interest in any honest effort at reform.

It is charged that one man to get nominated on the ticket in this county spent nearly a thousand dollars in a single precinct, and then did not get on the ticket.

That others spent large sums in carrying slates at the same primary election is well-known. This abuse has been growing until large numbers of voters refuse to go to the primary elections unless well paid.

Those who have helped carry primary elections, and this writer is willing to admit that he has had experience, know that it takes tremendous efforts to get out anything like a full party vote.

A system that will get out a larger and more representative vote of both parties, prevent repeating, and not mortgage candidates to the sack, will be an improvement.

It is believed that direct nomination will do this, at least it will make the people more effective in selecting candidates, and make it possible to get nominations without large expenditures of money.

Direct nomination is democratic, and if the Australian ballot is sound in principle, then direct nomination is sound in principle.

MEN WHO CAN BE "USED."

On June 1st, two years ago, the Oregonian said:

"Pierce Mays is to be the beneficiary of the Mitchell-McClure machine's special effort to defeat one Republican state senatorial candidate. If Smith, Inman and Hunt can pull themselves through with such help as the 'push' can find it convenient to give, well and good; but if not, let them go to the deuce. The first interest of the gang is in Mays, because Mays has been tried by Mitchell, and not found wanting. He has often been used, and is always 'usable.'"

Here we find reference made to the "push," the "gang" and to Mays, who has always been found "usable" by Mitchell. Mr. Scott is now found to be the chief dependence in the dirt-throwing process of this same "gang."

"Push," etc., and so far as the average country Republican can see, is an "usable" by Mitchell as Mays was two years ago.

In fact, to make this matter plain will Mr. Scott favor the people of Oregon with a column editorial explaining why he himself is not now being "used" by the "gang" and Mitchell full as much as Mays was two years ago? A column should suffice, but, if not, then just a few words along that line.

DON'T FORGET THE SOCIALIST BROTHER.

R. R. Ryan, of this city, is the Socialist candidate for governor, and there are some strong points in his favor. He is a farmer, and in reality the only farmer running for office.

As against a lawyer and a banker and a preacher (the Probi) he ought to run well, if the farmers rally to the support of a man of their own occupation.

It is charged against him that he is a very active and successful real estate man, and is really laying up some money, and on that account liable to be scratched by the most radical Socialists.

In his defense it can be said that he is not a landed monopolist, as his farm consists of only a few acres. Mr. Ryan is probably as free from objection as any man in that party.

In making up his staff, if elected, we hope it will not be inconvenient to give Capt. Northcutt a pretty stiff position. Northcutt is a monopolist in several directions, but not enough to hurt.

But let us not forget that the Socialists are in the race, and may decide the election in favor of Furnish or Chamberlain.

TIME FOR A CHANGE IN OREGON.

The last Oregon legislature was entirely under the control of the Brownell-Pulton-Kuykendoodle stripe of politician and it appropriated so much money for grafts that it takes 7.4 mills state tax this year.

There is urgently needed a different stripe of men in the legislature, and owing to the record made by the Republicans in putting Marion county on a cash basis, we believe the Marion county ticket should be elected.

The next legislature ought to cut down the state tax, and enact some laws to put some money in the treasury besides a land tax—as is now the case—the whole load is put on property.

In the Ohio legislature they have just cut the appropriations, the total being \$2,228,256 less than the amount asked for in the estimate submitted, and in consequence a number of clerkships were reduced.

The total appropriation of the Ohio bill, when it left the hands of the committee, was \$4,156,537.37. The bill for 1900 carried appropriations amounting to \$5,239,934.66. The bill this year is \$1,982,297.19 less than 1900 and \$633,795.63 less than the bill for last year.

Ohio has eight or ten times the population and about twenty times the wealth of Oregon, but the last legislature in Oregon salted the people of this state for nearly three millions of appropriations.

That was about a million dollars too much on account of the high state tax. When the people get the referendum they can kill some of the jobs.

ALL SCUTTLE TALK AN INVENTION.

The Oregon Democrats demand the withdrawal of the United States from the Philippines!—San Jose Mercury.

The exclamation point is well put. Where is the man in Oregon who imagines that the "anti-imperialists" will not make a great deal over this proposition of the Oregon Democrats in case of the success of that party in June—in case of the election of Chamberlain for instance? It must not be done—Salem Statesman.

The San Jose Mercury man used to work on the Portland Oregonian, and, like many other people, he gets no other paper, and so he believes what it says, and his mistake is never corrected.

But the Statesman knows the Oregonian lies, for it has said so, and it should not blindly follow a lying state platform like that of the Oregonian, that the Democratic platform demands a scuttle from the Philippines.

The Journal challenges the Oregonian or the Statesman to show from the Democratic platform any words that mean scuttle. Show a single word that demands recall of our troops or lowering our flag.

You can't do it, although you will never be honest enough to admit it. There is nothing but good sentiment in the Democratic state platform, and sentiments that are backed by eminent Republicans.

The Democratic and Republican parties are had enough without lying about them. The Democratic platform is not a scuttle platform, but it takes a sound and patriotic position on the Philippines.

The scuttling element is present in all parties, but it was very small in the Democratic state convention, and it was voted down, and the Oregon Democrats have gone on record for just what McKinley advocated.

They advocate independence for the Philippines whenever the people are ready for it, and that is just about soon enough.

WHAT NEXT?

And now the Oregonian says "In 1898 the Simon ticket was again recognized as the Republican ticket, though the Mitchell men forced the nomination of Geer for governor."

Considering that the entire delegation of Mitchell men from Multnomah county was expelled from the Astoria convention, what power they must have had in a body where they had
