WILL BE A HUMMER

Salem Independence Day Enthusiasts Are Active

Will Raise Funds and Provide Superb Program.

Anyone who thinks the spirit of patriotism in Oregon's Capital City is even dormant, should have attended the raising mass meeting held at the city hall Monday evening, where the enthusiasm was so marked that the American eagle had to flap its wings in an unusually demonstrative manner, in order to be heard at all.

It was an adjourned meeting of citizens, called for considering appointment of committees and details of a program for an Independence Day celebration at Salem this year that will discount any previous attempt in Western Oregon. The meeting was largely attended, and the spirit and willing desire to aid in the projected celebration that was apparent at the meeting leaves no doubt as to the eventual success of the undertaking.

After considerable discussion regarding the character of the proposed celebration, and the nature of the various attractions to be provided for the day, the meeting awoke to a realization of the fact that the matter of finance was the essential factor in holding a celebration. Further construction of air-castles and a visionary feast of unique and attractive forms of entertainment were abandoned, and the matter of raising the required sum of money for giving the big show was tackled. After some talk on this subject, the matter was left to the finance committee, with instructions to raise at least \$1500, and \$2000, if possible. The success of the finance committee's canvass will measure the scope of the proposed celebration, but the voluntary subscriptions that have already been offered, and the very general willingness manifested by others to contribute to the fund ensures the successful and expeditious raising of a large sum.

Chairman Meyer will sub-divide his finance committee and apportion the work of canvassing the city among his colleagues, so as to admit of a thorough and systematic canvass of the city. The committee will be organized at once, and will soon have a subscription agreement in circulation. When the canvass has been completed, then the details of the celebration will be mapped out, the celebration fund apportioned among the several funds, and active preparations begun for the gala day.

In the discussion incident to the proposed celebration Frank Davey suggested as an important factor in a successful celebration, the securing by the committee of an orator of semi-national reputation, as an attraction that would draw people for miles away. P. H. D'Arcy, who is a member on the committee to secure orators, facetiously remarked that there were a number of distinguished orators on the committee to whom had been delegated the selection of an orator for the day, and that each of the members had been desirous of contributing his services for the occasion, but, after a conference, it was decided to get some one from abroad who might be more appreciated.

City Recorder Judah, chairman of the meeting, suggested as an unique attraction, a parade on the river of decorated boats, by day and by night, and the giving of the fireworks display from a raft in the river. The suggestions were both well received, and will probably receive the consideration of the proper committee.

Along this line of entertainment, A. Hucklestein suggested a boat race on the river, and his suggestion recommends it to the consideration of the committee on sports.

The sense of the meeting was unanimously for the protection of the local business people from the operation of transient vendors, and this disagreeable problem will probably be regulated by municipal legislation of a prohibitive character, at any rate, legitimate business houses will be given proper protection from transient grafters.
