A PEOPLE'S CHURCH FOR SALEM.

Salem has become a labor union town. Salem is a live commercial city. Real estate is jumping upward. Indications point to opening a new and broader highway to heaven.

Rev. P. S. Knight has gained great prominence of late for his liberality of views on religion, and might become the founder of a broader theological movement, if he were not too modest.

The people's church movement of Chicago, headed by Dr. Thomas, has gained a foot hold in many cities, including Portland, and may extend to Salem.

In a New England city recently, a Universalist was to be inducted to the pastorate. The sermon was by a Methodist, while a Unitarian and a Second Congregationalist extended the greetings of the community. The Episcopal rector sent a letter of welcome. This service probably represents the high-water mark of church federation and ministerial brotherhood thus far.

The above is from the Boston Congregationalist, and gentlemen who still incline to the view that the "world do move" will please take notice.

The argument of the people's church is that many men subscribe to the fundamental principles of Christianity, but have not been educated to or do not understand the importance of multiplying creeds.

The federation of a number of small and weak Christian churches into a large and powerful organization, able and capable of rendering a large service to humanity is possibility, even in Salem.

The Eugene Register—the local organ of Ku Kluxdom in state politics—has the following, which is complimentary, to say the least:

"The Salem Journal is supporting Chamberlain for governor, but every idle word that blows catches Hofer's sails, and he is forever tossed about upon the waves of political uncertainty, that sooner or later engulfs him, and those to whom he throws his influence. Somehow it would seem that Hofer is encompassed with the irony of fate that wastes his brilliancy on the desert air. Hofer is neither a Republican nor a Democrat, Populist or Socialist. His wisest and most effective service ever rendered the state and his readers has been the several rational dissertations he has published on strawberry culture. If he would bury his politics and raise the berry he would be doing himself and the state a better service."

The Journal is enjoying a big sale, because it is showing up the inconsistencies of the Oregonian. Some day a daily paper will exist in Portland big enough and broad enough and just enough to not size down men and measures to its one-man's conceptions. Then the people of Oregon will come nearer getting justice, and this state will be placed in its true light before its own people and before the world.

Until then Oregon will have to stay under the cloud of its own creation.

The Capital Journal is the only People's Church of this city—but it is a poor substitute for the real thing.

The big new battleship Illinois is a complete failure. She was built by the shipbuilding trust. Another evidence that the trusts are not to be trusted.

It is the idea of the Jack Matthews papers of the state that The Journal editor ought to confine himself to writing editorials on how to raise strawberries. There might be more in it for The Journal and for them.

C. E. S. Woods, the Democratic nominee for United States senator, is in New York on account of the illness of his son, and may not make the canvass. He is a talented man, but takes extreme views on public matters. He favors complete abandonment of the Philippines, and absolute free trade, and in those two respects does not agree with the party that has nominated him. Nevertheless, he is a brilliant and able man.

WILL TALK ANYWAY.

Socialists Will Conduct an Entirely Independent Canvass.

At a meeting of the Salem Socialists Tuesday evening, held in the W. C. T. U. rooms, the party decided tonight to conduct an independent canvass of the county. The party was denied participation in the joint discussion with the Republican and Democratic candidates and they now propose to follow right on the heels of the joint canvass, and as R. R. Ryan, Socialist candidate for governor, has rather forcibly expressed himself, "give the two dominant parties thunder right from the shoulder."

The Socialists expect to cover the same itinerary that has been mapped out by the two parties, and will arrange to speak at the various points on the night following the debate. This party will manage to have its representatives in attendance at all of the joint discussions, and with the knowledge of the discussions that will be thus afforded, will "show up" both the Republican and Democratic parties on the succeeding night.

The Socialists promise to make the campaign interesting, if they don't accomplish anything else, and judging the situation from this view, it is generally admitted the campaign may be interesting. Mr. Ryan says the Socialists will poll a larger vote this year than has been conceded. In this county Mr. Ryan says the party will elect G. L. Brown, of Stayton, on the legislative ticket, but that is the extent of their hopes in the June election. Mr. Ryan says he will make a partial canvass of the state in the interest of his candidacy for governor. He will tour the state in company with Rev. J. Stitt Wilson, a Socialized Methodist minister, of Chicago.

Boat Load of Monuments.

J. D. Bohannon, sexton of the City View Cemetery, on Tuesday evening received a boat load of monuments and curbing materials. Mr. Bohannon does an extensive business in the sale of monuments, and has the material for the improvement and beautifying of cemetery lots. He is doing considerable work of this character in City View cemetery, and the improved appearance of the grounds attest the first-class work being done by Mr. Bohannon.

SERIOUS CHARGES PREFERRED

Administrator Charged With Misappropriating Funds.

County Judge Scott, sitting as Marion county probate court, on Tuesday afternoon overruled the demurrer to the petition for the removal of J. F. T. B. Brentano, as administrator of the estate of B. DeLorme, deceased. DeLorme died in France some time ago, leaving an estate of the value of \$2500, as shown in the inventory as returned by the appraisers. Petition was afterwards filed by Mrs. Foley asking for the removal of Brentano as administrator, alleging that while serving in that capacity Brentano had wrongfully appropriated to himself between \$3000 and \$4000 belonging to the estate. A demurrer was filed by Brentano's attorneys, alleging that petition did not state facts sufficient to constitute a cause of action, and this was the demurrer overruled by Judge Scott.

Ask Whale To Explain

In the Cooper-Gilbert Bros. litigation, plaintiff, by his attorney, Wm. Kaiser, asks that C. A. Whale "be required to state in full the terms of his alleged contract with the said Gilbert Bros., and with Claud Gatch, receiver, respecting the sale by said petitioner of pianos and organs, and that he be required to state whether said contract is in writing, or whether it is a mere verbal contract."

MANY DELINQUENT ELECTORS

Total Registration This Year Is Only 4519

As Against 6409 for 1900--Books Close May 15

The total registration of voters in Marion county to date for this year is only 4519, as against a total registration of 6409 for 1900, the initial year of the registration law, and that number does not represent the total voting strength of the county, since there were many electors two years ago who neglected to register. There remains but two weeks additional time in which voters may register and make themselves eligible for participation in the June election. There are over 2000 voters in the county who have not yet registered. In many of the rural precincts less than fifty per cent. of the voters have complied with the registration law. The registration books will be closed at 5 p. m. on Thursday, May 15th.
